Recent correspondence with ar Under-Secretary of State and L H. Hewitt, one of the commissioners, revealed the same information in their last letters to The Times.

The text of the announcement to Griffith follows. Since it is of such primary interest to all citizens of the county we feel that The Times should devote all space nec essary to its full context.

"Progress in studies and investi gations for the next major international dam to be constructed on the Rio Grande was outlined in joint statement issued this week by the Commisioners, L. H. Hewitt. for the United States and David Herrera Jordan for Mexico, of the International Boundary and Water Commission. The statement indicates that while final decision as to site has not been made, pending completion of geologic investigations, the Commission will recommend to the two Governments that the next international storage dam be constructed in the section of the river between Del Rio, Texas, Chidad Acuna, Coahuila, and the confluence of the Devils River. One of the principal advantages is that a dam in this section of the river will control floods of the magnitude of the disastrous record flood of June July 1954 which resulted from unprecedented discharges from the Devils and Pecos rivers and caused loss of lives and great property damage in both countries.

The Water Treaty of 1944 divid es the waters of the Rio Grande below Fort Quitman, between the two countries and provides for the joint construction by the United States and Mexico, through their respecive Sections of he Internamission, of the dams required for the conservation, storage and regulation of the maximum feasible may be determined by the Com- fits and construction costs. mission, subject to the approval of

In a letter received this week by I dams, the Commission determines

ed about 75 miles down stream from Laredo, Texas - Nuevo Laredo Tamaulipas, was dedicated on October 19, 1953, by President Dwight D. Eisenhower and President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines. The dam began to store waters last summer and fully controlled the Augst 1953 flood, which otherwise would have caused serious damage downstream. It also completely controlled the unprecedented June-July 1954 flood which, fortunately occurred at a time when conservation storage capacity was avail able to contain the entire discharge reaching the reservoir and which, without Falcon, would have been disastrous to the Lower Valley in both countries. It now conserves for beneficial use in both countries more than 2.000,000 acre-feet of water, very largely from the June-

July flood. Because of its great urgency from the standpoint of both countries, the treaty required that Falcon Dam be completed by November 1953. Accordingly, efforts of the Commission during the first years after the treaty became effective were largely concentrated on the planning and construction of that dam.
