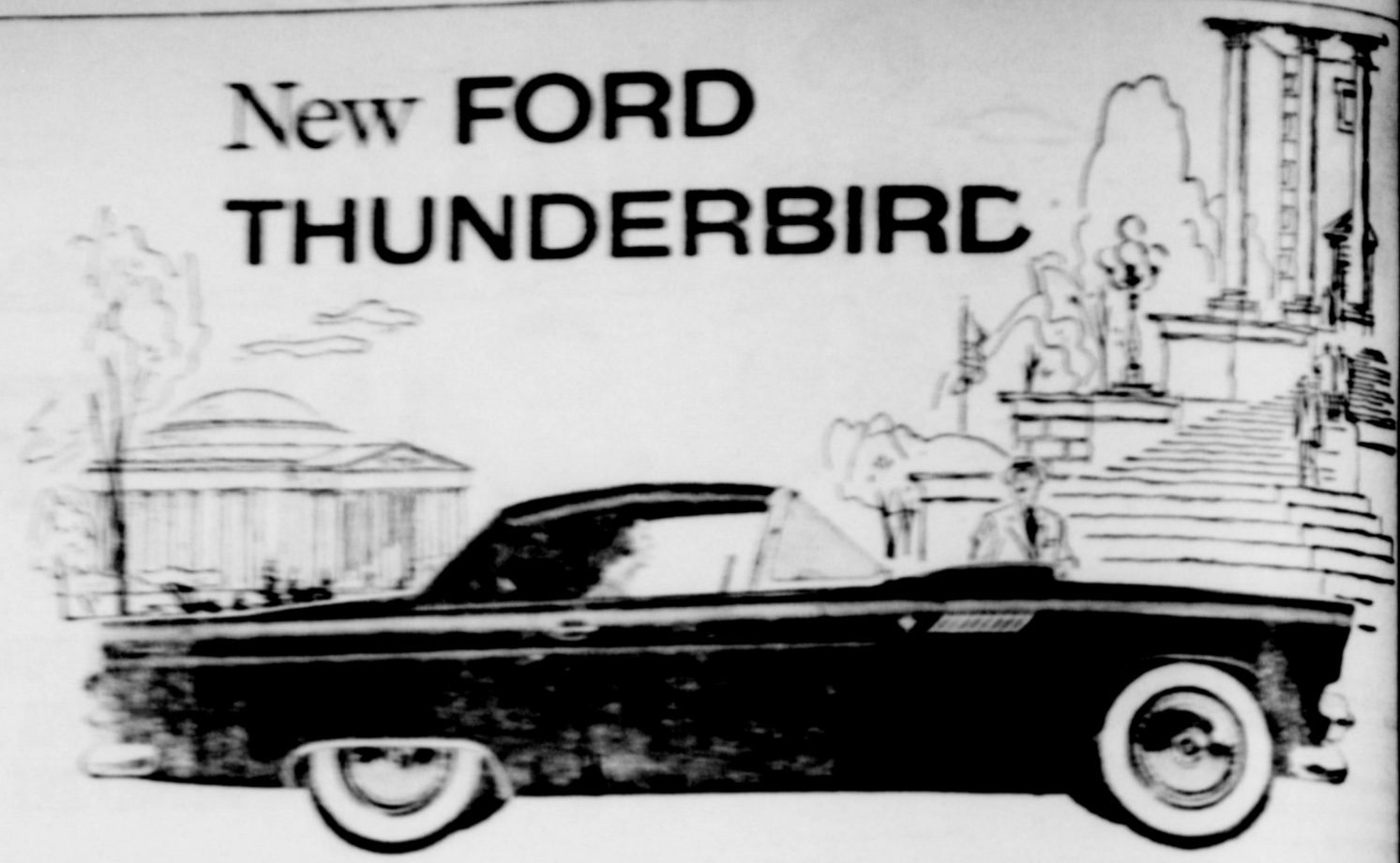

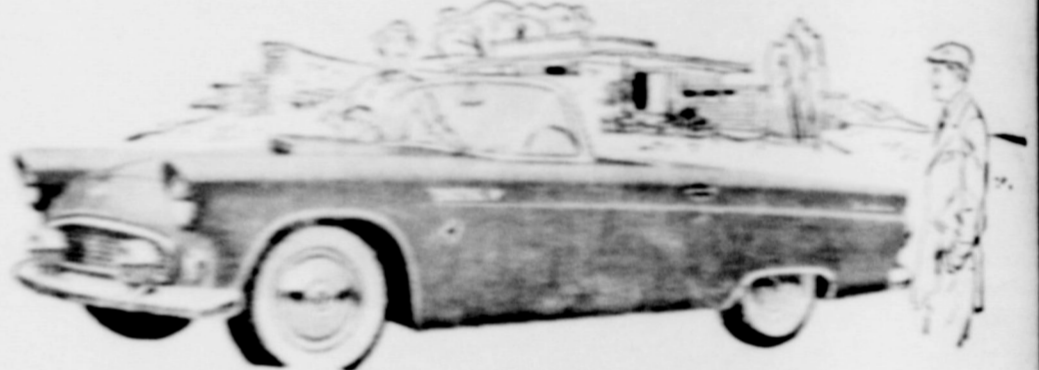

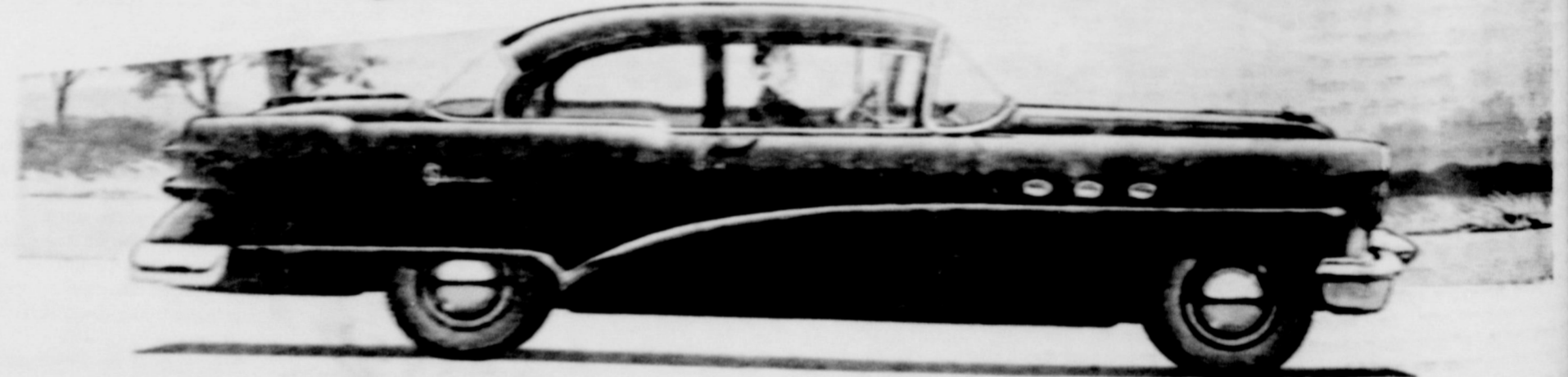

# State Capitol NEWS

**AUSTIN** — Absentee balloting for the November 2 general election started October 13 but no one is reporting the peak of interest that 1,400,000 voters turn out for the Democratic August run-off primary.

However, Governor Allan Shivers says he hopes Texas voters would bypass the election. He is supporting all eleven constitutional amendments on the ballot which he said are "very helpful" to Texas.

Besides deciding the official election of political candidates and amendments, votes cast in the election will determine representation at 1956 local political party conventions.

**Trust Laws**

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd has told the Texas Supreme Court that it hindered state efforts to enforce antitrust legislation when it ruled it had no jurisdiction in an El Paso case.

The court decided in July to let the National Labor Relations Board handle the case of Truck Drivers, Chauffeurs, Warehouse-

men and Helpers Local No. 941 against Whitefield Transportation Company.

By reversing decisions of two lower state courts against the un-

ion and ruling that it did not have jurisdiction, the Supreme Court had the effect "of placing labor unions, as well as employers who conspire in restraint of trade" beyond the jurisdiction and enforcement of the state, argued Shepperd.

**Minimum Wage**

A state minimum wage law has been advocated as part of a legislative program adopted by the executive board of the State Federation of Labor.

The board favors setting a minimum wage of 75 cents an hour. It also called for 200 additional state highway patrolmen and an increase over the present \$290 a month pay for a sixty-hour week.

**Road Financing**

A boost in gasoline taxes and a weight and distance levy on heavy trucks are being considered as ways of providing additional financing for Texas highways.

Pondering the ideas are members of 58 public and private organizations called together by the Texas Highway Commission at the suggestion of Governor Allan Shivers.

Texas has reached the point where added improvement must be made on roads, Shivers told the group.

Need was shown at the meeting for \$2.2 billion for necessary improvement and construction on Texas' 51,000 miles of roads. A

One-cent gasoline tax-hike would bring in \$20,750,000, a discussion of ways to provide financing pointed out.

The group will meet two more times with final proposals to be submitted to the governor.

#### Vandalism

Vandals operating on state highways are costing taxpayers \$200,000 annually, highway department officials point out.

Enormous expenses are inflicted by destroying and damaging highway signs, littering roads and roadsides, and tearing up roadside park facilities, spokesmen said.

Signs are the most popular victims, either being destroyed outright, taken home for souvenirs, or scrawled on with crayon or lipstick.

#### Drouth Plan

A federal drouth relief program for Texas stockmen "isn't doing anyone much good," says John C. White, State Commissioner of Agriculture.

White, attending a federal drouth committee conference in Washington, said state attempts to get rules simplified only resulted in an offer of "further complications."

Negotiations will continue for a better drouth program, he stated, but added that at present he is "bitterly disappointed."

#### Texas Construction

Construction activity over the state fell 6 per cent in August

from a June peak but is still high in comparison with 1953, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Statistician Richard C. Henshaw said the August dip dropped totals for nonresidential building permits to the lowest of the year. However, contracts awarded for construction this year are still 9 per cent over the first eight months of '53, he reported.

#### Crime Drop

A 3.7 per cent drop in Texas crime for the first half of 1954 is reported by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

#### Optometry Advertising

Optometrists who believe in advertising have won a fight with the Board of Examiners in Optometry which proposed banning the practice by members.

Rules adopted September 18 to become effective October 4 were repealed by the board after severe criticism from members and outsiders over prohibition of display advertising. The regulations also forbid optometrists from doing business under trade or assumed names.

Attorney Gen. John Ben Shepperd was named as the motivating force behind the decision by the board.

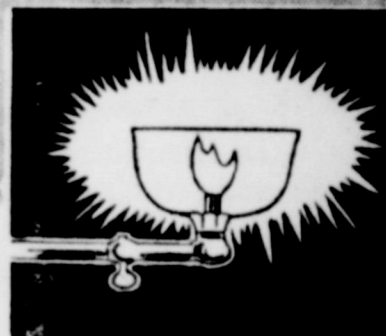

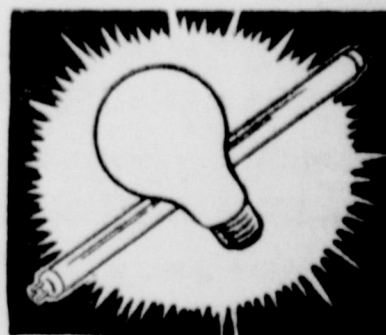

#### EDUCATION FOR FREEDOM

John Leighton Stuart, American Ambassador to China during the years in which America lost China to the Communists, has written a book "Fifty Years in China." Among other things the book reveals that a factor in the loss of China was the Communists' ability to hoodwink an important number of teachers and students in China's colleges and universities. Ambassador Stuart, who was president of Yenchin University for 27 years, confesses that he himself had a "rude awakening" about the Communists after they victoriously entered Nanking.

"The Communist propaganda was exceedingly skillful," he wrote in describing the events preceding the Red victory. "And the Kuomintang (anti-Communist government) propaganda was incredibly stupid. . . . Student strikes and demonstrations, many of them Communist instigated, became more frequent."

#### A Red Target

important question. Here are a few thoughts on it:

Teachers represent a profession built largely upon scholarship — education out of books and life in the cloistered atmosphere of the campus. Communist writers are cunning; they paint glowing pictures of a "paradise" for the "intellectual workers" — as the teachers are called. Students as a rule are idealistic; all are immature, with plastic minds. The crooked Communist propaganda promises an idealistic world, a world of comparative ease, without conflict, and with economic plenty for all. In so many countries, the students and teachers

getting this Communist come-on have not developed a genuine respect for the existing governmental and economic systems, whatever its merits or demerits may be. Thus, they have little, if any, resistance against the propaganda in America too.

The Communists and Socialists in America have directed much of their propaganda at students and teachers. That's why I have been recommending for years that we strengthen American citizenship education throughout our entire school system. Several years ago the Brookings Institution searched for but failed to find a single high school or college economics textbook which favorably compared the American private enterprise system with other systems. Recently, however, educators have been demanding textbooks which contain the favorable facts about our system.

At Harding College in Searcy, several textbook projects are underway. In these projects scores of texts now in use have been studied. Some of the books contain brazen propaganda against the American system; others subtly undermine

basic American principles. It is a genuine pleasure to find a book written by persons who obviously love America and respects its constitution and basic economic principles. Such a book is "Fundamentals of Citizenship," an 8th grade civics textbook, by G. L. Blough, and David S. Switzer (Laidlaw Brothers, publishers). Good Teachings

It unashamedly teaches the necessity for "moral fitness" — the age-old virtues of honesty, courage, sincerity, self-control, initiative; the attribute of thrift and the value of self-reliance. It talks of our founding fathers with highest respect. It places God and country in their proper perspective in the allegiance of American

boys and girls.

"Fundamentals of Citizenship" gives the American youngster an understanding of a system which he can respect and defend. It says in conclusion: "Government in America has preserved and has developed the best in civilization. The key that unlocks the door to its enjoyment is American citizenship. . . . If we want to continue our way of life, each generation must continue the principles upon which this way of life was built." American youngsters taught from sound textbooks will never parade for the Communists; but will, on the contrary, be more likely to develop the moral strength and the resourcefulness necessary to defeat Communism and preserve freedom.
