Astronomer Expains **Origin of Galaxies**

College Station - 'Some five or six billion years ago all the matter that we now observe to be Stromgren's address; present in our galaxy and the ex ternal galaxies was concentrated at a graduate lecture at Texas nebula. A&M College.

"Somehow this super star exploded," Dr. Stromgren, who is director of the Yerkes Observatory in Wisconsin and the McDonald Observatory in West Texas, declared and "the matter separated out into single galaxies and these spread out and we still observe their spreading out - the so-called expansion of the universe, the expansion of all the nebulae, galaxies, one from another." Speaking on "The Foundation

and Evolution of the Stars", the world-renowned astronomer said, "after separte galaxies have been formed within each galaxy the stars of Population 2, the oldest stars, were formed. Their evolution and dissipation back into space may have changed the propcrties of interstellar space or other factors may have been at work that changed the nature of hese galaxies into what they are

"Then came a phase of evolution when stars of type Population 1 like the sun were formed. The chief difference between Population 2 and Population 1 is that a larger fraction of the heavy ele ments are present in Population 2

"After these stars began to be formed," Dr. Stromgren said, "the systems flattened and the picture was much like the picture that we own galaxy vast systems with interstellar matter still existing between the stars being formed galaxies like our own there are to some extent cycles of processes matter condensed into cloud banks A hot star is formed at the center and the action of the radiation from this star scatters the matter out into the clouds again.

"Stars are formed by this proess and some of the matter from the star goes back into interstellar space. The remnants of the blowing up of these clouds the remnants of the stars after they have finished their evolution and become white drafts, pass back in-

"There are facts of observation which show that space in between the stars is not empty.

"The temperature on Mars is on the average lower than on earth. When we go out to Pluto we encounter quite low temperatures. The temperature is controlled by the radiation from the sun - the energy that is received from the

"How can stars be formed out of gases that are so extremely tenuous as the interstellar matter? The evidence is actually very direct and we cannot escape the conclusion that even now in our present phase of evolution stars are being formed out of interstellar matter "We have clouds of the order of

thirty light years in diameter, very tenuous clouds, each of them containing enough matter to form something like thirty or forty years. These clouds will collide and gradually build up the cloud bank. Once a nucleus has been formed, through say consecutive collision of four or five clouds, this will, like a snowball, pick up more matter. Now comes the phase when there is enough to form ten thousand stars and still be at very low density. We do not see how this matter can get together to form a star, but somehow to start the process at least one star will be formed out of this matter in a particular still region. This presumably happens through the action of gravitation, and from then
