Louisville newspaperman, is of priceless educational value to the people of America. Bradet was convicted of advocating sedition after being identified as Communist leader in Louisville b an FBI counterspy. The power and influence of a single Communist - for capturing the minds and controlling the behavior of loyal Americans - is vividly shown in the facts brought out in Braden's FOR TWO-GUN ACTION! trial.

#### Respectability' Valuable

The biggest factor in Braden's power and influence in Louisville was the front of respectability he was able to present by being a staff member of the Louisville Courier-Journal. A second factor was his membership in Louisville's St. Stephens Episcopal Church. whose rector, J. Erwin McKinney, testified in his defense just before he was identified as an influential Communist of long standing These two positions of respectability provided the base for the wielding of an astonishing mass of influence and power.

State's Attorney A Scott Hamilton introduced evidence designed to show Braden's membership in a long list of alleged Communist fronts, including the Civil Rights Congress, Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy, Council on African Affairs, the National Lawyers Guild and National Council of American Soviet Friendship. Communist fronts lure thousands of non-Communists into carrying out propoganda work advantageous to the Communist world conspiracy. The Communists in these fronts control the actions of the

#### memberships. Many Writing Connections

Braden himself testified that in addition to being a copydesk "editor" on the Louisville newspaper from time to time he did extra reporting for Newsweek Magazine. the Toledo Blade, Chicago Tribune, St Louis Globe-Democrat and the New York News. The prosecution brought out that he also was correspondent for the Federated Press, which serves the Communist Daily Worker. He was an influential member of the American Newspaper Guild's Louisville chapter, and said he had written articles, speeches and radio scripts for important CIO and AFL unions.

Testimony showed that Braden had been extremely active in the Progressive Party, whose top officials always disclaimed charges of Communist contro.l In Louisville he prepared radio scripts, recruited and otherwise wielded wide influence in the party. He was also secretary-treasurer of the American Peace Crusade which has mobilized considerable strength for admission of Red China to the UN and for trade with Red China. Its slogan, designed to attract the support of work-ing peoule, is: "China Trade Would Mean Two Million New







### **HOW TO CURE**

# HOME-MADE A BLACKOUTS

HOME-MADE BLACKOUTS occur when a short circuit or overload blows out a fuse.

Overloads are caused by too many lamps and appliances on a single circuit. Short circuits are usually caused by a defective appliance or cord.

To restore service quickly without waiting for a service man, keep spare fuses of the correct size on hand and follow the instructions below.



#### TO REPLACE A BLOWN FUSE

- 1 Locate the blown fuse. The metal link showing through the window will be broken or the window itself may be scorched.
- Disconnect the appliance or lamp that caused the short circuit or overload.
- Stand on a dry surface and pull the main switch to OFF.
- Unscrew the burned-out fuse and replace it with a NEW fuse of the correct size (usually 15 amperes).
- Throw the main switch back to ON position.

#### YOUR HOME HAS CIRCUIT BREAKERS INSTEAD OF FUSES

- Locate the tripped breaker. It will be in the OFF or TRIPPED position.
- Disconnect the appliance or lamp that caused the short or overload.

Reset the breaker to ON position, following manufacturer's instructions

on breaker panel.

REMEMBER, a fuse or circuit breaker protects your wiring from short circuit or overload damage. Never use a penny or other object instead of a fuse. It's dangerous.



INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT TEXAS



#### TEXAS UNDER SIX FLAGS

The overthrow by Cortez of the Aztec Empire in 1520, marked the beginning of Spanish Dominion over Mexico and the province of Texas. In 1685 La Salle landed in the vicinity of the present Lavaca Bay and founded a short-lived colony of a few hundred Frenchmen. France abandoned her claims to Texas after the war of 1719. In 1821 Spain's sovereignty over Mexico and Texas was overthrown and the red, green and white flag of the Mexicans flew under Texas skies. On April 21, 1836, General Sam Houston defeated Santa Anna at San Jacinto. This battle terminated the war and gained freedom for the Lone Star Republic. On December 29, 1845, Texas proudly took its place as the twenty-eighth State. The Southern Confederacy, 1861-1865.
