First Salk Vaccine Shot Given Students Tuesday

Intense drama has moved across Texas this week with the administering of a small injection of a red fluid, a vaccine that will protect against paralytic polio, in the arms of first and second grade school children.

Sanderson assumed her role and took the stage call Tuesday when 100 shots of the Salk vaccine were given by Dr. J. D. Swanson, county health officer, to students in the first two grades. Three of the children designated for shots were absent.

The job was completed by 2 p. m. and Dr. Swanson was assisted

LEMONS GAP ROAD CONTRACT IS LET

Word was received this week that the contract had been let for the reconstruction of U.S. 90 in the Lemons Gap area east of Marathon.

High McMillan of El Paso was awarded the contract for the reconstruction job of five miles of U. S. 90 from 14 miles east of Marathon for a reported sum of \$402,556.15.

It was revealed that much of the road will be relocated to eliminate curves. The road will be 24 feet wide and will have 10-foot shoulders on each side of surface asphalt, concrete penetration.

The project will require approximately eight months and deep cuts and fills will be necessary because of the rugged terrain.

In about two weeks the second shot will be given to the same group of children, both shots being given free. The booster shot will be given in November.

Of 127 children eligible for the vaccine, parental consent for its use was given by 81 per cent of the parents. No more free vaccine will be available.

W. W. Sudduth, county chairman of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, stated that he was of the opinion that it would not be many weeks until the vaccine would be available on a commercial basis where it may be obtained and administered by a physician to anyone desiring it.

It is planned for the vaccine to be administered to the first and second graders in each school in each state before the close of school. Children 5 and 6 years of age show the highest attack rate and next come the 4 and 8 year olds. After the age 13, the attack rate declines pretty steadily with age. Pregnant women also rate extremely high in the susceptible groups, according to reports.

After the free vaccine for the school children arrived in Austin, the supply for this area was brought to Del Rio by Mrs. E. A. Davis in her private plane. Mrs. Davis is the vaccine chairman for Val Verde County.

Sanderson's quota was picked up by E. J. Hanson Sunday afternoon when he came through Del Rio en route home from the Highway 90 Assn. meeting in Uvalde.
