Willing Walker Whistler To Walk In Walkathon

Clyde Whistler, T&NO employee who has walked down more deer hunters in these hills than possibly any other man, is all set to enter the third annual Padre Island Walkathon scheduled for May 6-8.

The 100-mile trek is scheduled to be held on that date because of the full moon at that time.

The walkers will begin their hike the morning of May 6 at the southern tip of Padre Island, opposite Port Isabel, and will end the long hike on the evening of May 8 at Bob Hall Pier in Gulf Park at the Corpus Christi end of the island.

Each contestant has to bring own bedroll and the necessary changes of clothing he wishes for the trip. These items and a cot and tent will be arranged for his camp site by paid county employees. Water barrels and refreshment boxes containing fruit, candy and sandwiches, will be placed at short intervals along the beach. These stations will be placed every five miles for the first 20 miles of the first and second day's march. On the third and final day, stations will be placed at the five and ten-mile points then every two and a half miles into the pier.

Deadline for each day's walk is 8 p. m. On the first day, the leading contestants will be started in the order of their elapsed time standing in order that they may reach the finish line in the proper order.

Whistler stated that he has walked many a mile over the terrain of this area, but that walking on the beach will be a new venture for him, as well as walking against time. He stated that he feels capable of the 100-mile trek in the three days and will give some walker a walk for the money. He added that he would like to have a big black-tail buck setting the pace for him though, and would probably do better if he had to carry a rifle.

Funeral Services Here Saturday For W. R. 'Son' Turner

Funeral services were held here in the First Baptist Church Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock for W. R. "Son" Turner, 52, who died suddenly at his home Thursday at noon following a heart attack.

Rev. John W. Byrd, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, assisted by Rev. Claude Bridges, pastor of the Baptist Church, officiated at the funeral rites and burial was made in Cedar Grove Cemetery under the direction of O. T. Sudduth, Inc., Funeral Home.

Born in Sheffield on August 3, 1902, Mr. Turner was the eldest child of Mr. and Mrs. Matt Turner. The family came to Sanderson in 1906 and he attended the Sanderson schools. At an early age he went to work as a cowboy on the old Downie ranch, leaving the ranch in 1930.

He was married to Miss Carrie Ivy of Vanderpool on June 10, 1929, and brought his bride to Sanderson.

Turner produced several rodeos here during the middle 1930s and was also an accomplished horseman and roper. He managed a bulk gas and oil distribution plant here for eight years and later was the owner and operator of a boot and saddle shop.

In 1947 he joined the Bureau of Animal Industry of the Department of Agriculture for seven years of service. During the quarantine of the Mexican border after the outbreak of the hoof and mouth disease, he served as foreman of the Terrell County area of the project.

Turner was considered an authority on the rugged terrain of southern Terrell County and took part in numerous investigations of smuggling and other illegal operations along the Mexican border.

Mr. Turner was named deputy to Terrell County Sheriff Lee Billings on January 1, 1955.

He had complained to several friends that he was not feeling well Thursday morning. When he went home for lunch, after lying down for a short period, he told his wife she should call a doctor. Death came soon after.

He was a member of the Baptist Church and of the Texas Sheriffs' Association.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Carrie Ivy Turner, survivors include four sons, Richard, Jim, Tommy and Dale, all of Sanderson; three daughters, Mrs. M. G. Northcut, Jr., and Miss Nancy Jean Turner of Sanderson, and Mrs. Weldon Blackwelder of Fort Stockton; his mother, Mrs. Matt Turner of Alpine; two brothers, James Madison Turner of Texas City and Cecil Vernon Turner of Alpine; one sister, Mrs. Albert Collins of Pecos; also eight grandchildren.

RAINFALL OVER COUNTY GAUGES VARIED AMOUNTS

The rainfall of 1.07 that fell in a few days in the middle of January of this year gave promise of relief from the drought that has existed in Terrell County for several years but three months passed before any more moisture fell in the area. So far as reports are available, the entire county received some rain Friday.

The Big Canyon country was the most favored area with from 1 to 2 1/2 inches reported from ranchers in that section and a similar rainfall gauged in the Independence country northward as far as Clarence Jessup's ranch. Dryden received one-half inch and larger quantities were gauged on the Brown, Riggs, Bell, Harrell and Rose ranches, according to reports.

The Goldwire, Downie, Mitchell ranches to the north of Sanderson had varying amounts of rainfall gauging near an inch.

The Cochran, Carruthers, Murrain and Gatlin ranches also reported at least one-half inch of rain.

In the western section of the county and out to the Stumberg ranch in Pecos and Brewster counties rains were reported to be up near 1 inch.

Showers were also reported in some sections of the county on Saturday and Monday.

Sanderson gauged .65 on the official gauge at The Kerr Mercantile Company but gauges in the northeast part of town registered at one inch.

Partly cloudy and cool weather has prevailed in this section since the rains. Fort Davis, Marfa, Marathon and Fort Stockton had good rains, similar amounts as reported in Terrell County, and there was a good rainfall reported from Del Rio to Dryden Monday night. Reports of a severe dust storm at Valentine Monday was brought in by railroad men.

R. T. Key reported the loss of about 400 sheep by drowning on the Circle Dot ranch Friday night. Two hundred and fifty carcasses were found after the draws began to run down. Several ranchers in that area and in the Independence country were unable to leave their homes Saturday morning on account of running draws.

Wallace returned to Sanderson Wednesday and was placed under \$2,500 bond.

Both men have been charged with assault with intent to murder by Terrell County Sheriff Lee Billings, who made the investigation following the affray.

Evidence indicated that the shooting occurred near the Wallace home in the north part of town about 7:00 o'clock Friday evening. Details of the shooting have not been revealed for publication. Haynes was apparently in his car when he received the small calibre fire as was indicated by bullet holes in the car.

Wallace drove his pickup to a local service station where the aid of a physician was sought.

Haynes was picked up at his home by Sheriff Billings and taken to a doctor for treatment before being sent to Fort Stockton.

Texas Rangers Forest G. Hardis of Sanderson and Jim Nance of Sierra Blanca assisted Billings in the investigation of the shooting.

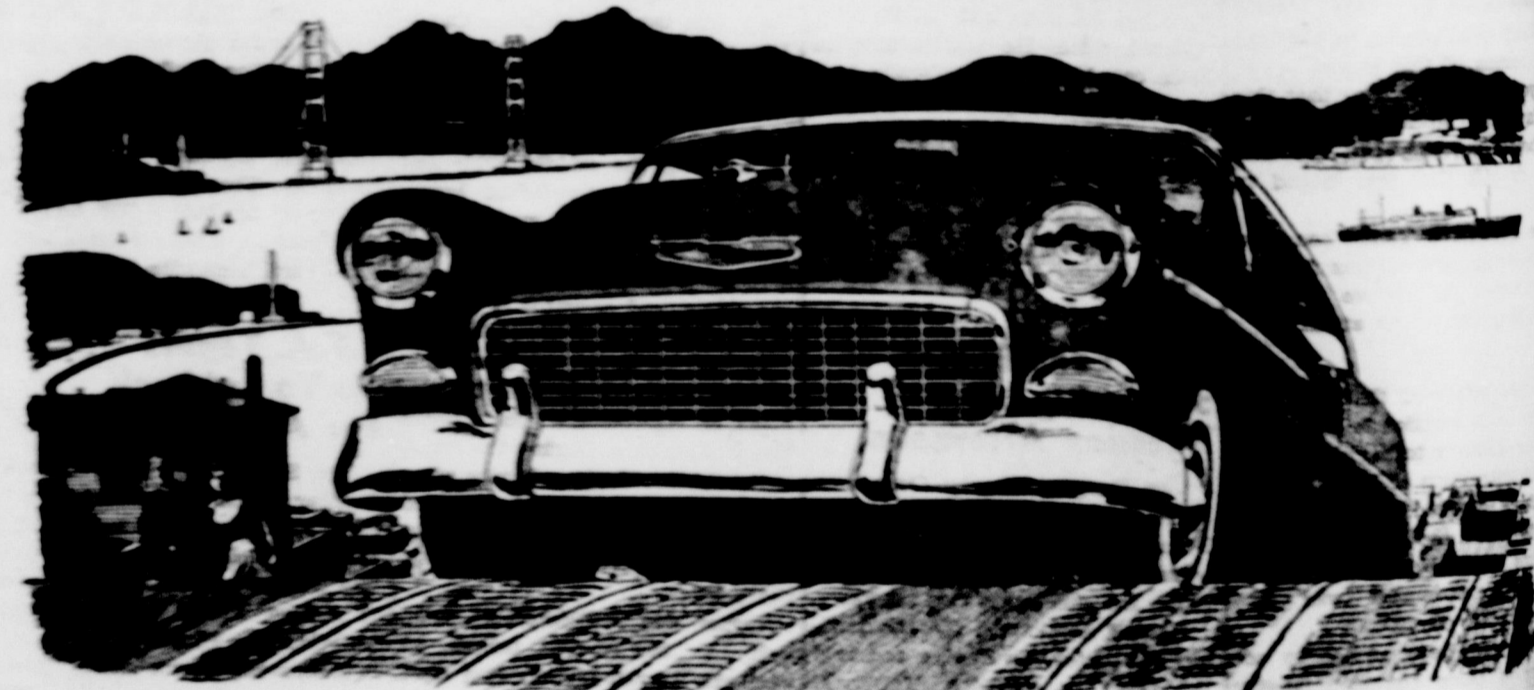
