Eldridge of Dryden. the Smith-Eldridge Grocery store was opened in the building next door to the fire station in 1920 and later moved to the corner location now occupied by the C. G. Morrison Co. store. When A. D. Brown decided to become a third partner in the business, it was incorporated under the name "Sanderson Garden Club, supervisors derson Mercantile Co., Inc." The business failed in 1930 at the beginning of the depression period In the meantime, Mr. Smith had bought an interest in a store at Dryden with J. D. Nichols, the store known as Smith-Nichols, and Mr. Nichols had acquired the interest of Mr. Eldridge in the Sanderson business. Mr. Smith moved to Dryden in 1930 to work in the store there and remained until 1947 when he sold the business to Jim Condra and came to Sanderson, putting in a stock of grocer-



Among the first white men to spend much time in this area was Capt. John L. Bullis, who led soldiers in raids against the marauding Indians, trying to drive them out of the country; the Reagan brothers who settled on a ranch in the southwest part of the county, and O. R.
