LISTEN TO LUKE

The people of Terrell County, along with the people of other counties along US 90, have planned another celebration due the first of next week. It is to celebrate the opening of the Pecos River bridge on its completion.

Business men all up and down the route will award certificates redeemable in merchandise of one or another to tourists who cross the bridge on the opening day. The merchandise, it is hoped, will encourage the travelers to stop in the town, look the place over possibly a little more, and advertise each individual town, as well as spread the word of the scenic route along the Mexican border is again open to travel and that the towns along the road are very eager to please the tourists.

The members and officers of the Travel US 90 Association feel that it is a good move and the town has received the whole-hearted support of all member towns. The people along the route realize what travel trade means to the economic condition of the towns. And places like Sanderson, which are completely isolated from tourist travel during such a fortunate as we now have, know too well, what travel trade means to the economic condition.

The most we can do to boost travel over US 90 is not too much, conversely, if we do not do all we can to boost travel over US 90 are not doing enough.

The Association is also pushing to expedite the construction of the permanent crossing of the Pecos Canyon, which will not be affected by high water that is part of the type that Noah encountered.

It would be an excellent project for some organization and one which could and would mean much to the town. It would be a matter of interest for local citizens and travelers alike.

It would preserve for posterity things that otherwise will one day be lost or destroyed by fire, the elements, or left some disinterested person to be disposed of in some trash pile because of a lack of knowledge of value or interest to others.

The second shot of the Salk polio immunization series was given here Thursday by Dr. J. D. Swanson, county health officer. He was assisted by several ladies of the town who are practical or graduate nurses.

The reception to the second shot was excellent, according to W. W. Sudduth, county chairman for the Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, who stated that the parents were cooperating wholeheartedly in the effort to stamp out the disease by permitting their children to receive the shots.

A complete count of the number of children is not yet available, since vaccinating began at 2 p. m. and had not finished before press time.

The Sanderson Culture Club members comprised the committee responsible for contacting parents and advising them of the time and place for the shots Thursday.

X-Ray Recipients Turn Out Wednesday

Equipment for the annual mass chest X-ray survey for Terrell County was put into use at 8:30 Wednesday morning in the building next door to the Princess Theatre. At the hour of closing 5:30 on Wednesday, 325 X-rays had been made.

Mrs. James Caroline was general chairman of the survey and chose most of her committee chairmen from the membership of the Ranch Home Demonstration Club. The survey was sponsored by the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

The equipment is furnished and manned by a team from the Texas Department of Health in Austin. The free X-rays were made available to everyone fifteen years of age and over and were given until 1 p. m. today (Thursday). A complete report on the number of X-rays made will not be available until next week.

Big Celebration Planned For Opening Pecos Bridge

A typical "biggest Texas celebration" is being planned on the first day of crossing the new Pecos River Bridge, according to J. L. Dodson, Jr., president of the Travel US 90 Highway Association at an executive committee meeting of the association in Del Rio Sunday. The State Highway Department, resident engineer Mac Hodges, and Dean Word Construction Co., of New Braunfels, believe the new bridge will be open for traffic by Monday, August 1.

Dodson, a Del Rio business man, in proposing this celebration said: "Once again the Pecos River in a devastating flood has washed out our bridge across the river. This time we were spared the loss of human life we suffered last year. But the twenty cities along US 90, members of our Association, were just beginning to recover from last year's economic loss, are now dealt another blow by the loss of this bridge at a time when vacation travel was reaching its peak. The Highway Department and contractor are doing a fine job to expedite completion of a new bridge. They believe it will be ready for travel by the first of next week. We suggest therefore that each of our twenty cities along the route make plans to celebrate the "First Day of Crossing". Our Association, through its directors, will cooperate with local Chambers of Commerce, city administrations, and service clubs, in order to treat the traveling public to the biggest "First Day Crossing" celebration ever staged along the 700 miles of the finest, shortest and best road coast to coast."

L. E. MILLS, FIRST POLIO PATIENT, IN SAN ANGELO

L. E. Mills of Sanderson is the county's first polio victim this year. After being ill for several days, he was taken by ambulance to San Angelo Friday night. Word received here Saturday morning confirmed the diagnosis of bulbar polio.

Mills was put in a respirator after a tracheotomy was performed following his arrival in San Angelo. He is considered to be in an unstable condition, according to reports, but had shown some improvement Wednesday.

It has been reported that paralysis at the present is in the throat and he was put in an iron lung on Monday afternoon.

Mills is employed by the GMX Co. and he and his wife have two small children.

His wife, parents and a brother from Louisiana have been at his bedside since Saturday.

Rain Falls In South of County Monday and Tuesday Afternoons

Some rainfall Monday afternoon late was a boon to ranchers in the southern part of the county. Rain was reported from the east to the west side of the county and south of the railroad.

This particular section of the county, usually considered to be the last to get moisture, was the recipient of heavy showers. Dense clouds and loud thunder visited Sanderson, but only a trace of rain showed in scattered drops on the streets and sidewalks.

Heavy clouds gathered about mid-afternoon Tuesday following a hot and sultry morning. Almost the same thing was repeated Tuesday afternoon with the rain falling mostly in the south and southwestern part of the county with some rain in the west central portion.

Wednesday morning dawned with heavy overhanging clouds which dispersed partially later in the day, but still showing hopes of gathering and producing more precipitation.

Tourists who stop in Sanderson to redeem a certificate, it is presumed, are more apt to visit for a while in our town and possibly find other articles that would interest their buying potential.

Ciudad Acuna, added the international touch to the celebration when their Good Neighbor Council announced they would join Del Rio and other towns along US 90 at the Pecos River bridge.

Fernando R. Lozano, chairman of the highway committee of the Acuna Chamber of Commerce, told Dodson that everyone in Acuna is interested in US 90 traffic and want to join the celebration.

Among those who have promised to be present for the occasion are Herb Petry, Carrizo Springs, ex-president of Lions International and newest Highway Commissioner, who will cut the ribbon for the first car crossing; Bette Ford, famous bullfighter beauty.
