Court Appeal In **RR Comm. Ruling Filed This Week**

week that an appeal to a district court in Austin will be filed this week. The appeal is for court action to reverse the ruling of the Railroad Commission in allowing the abolishment of Sanderson and Valentine as home terminals in lieu of establishing terminal facilities in Alpine. The Commission ruling came after a petition by the Texas and New Orleans Railroad for such permission and the Railroad Commission's decision favored the carrier.

Intense and bitter opposition on the part of the railroad employees and the people of Sanderson and Valentine were voiced at the original hearing, held in Alpine, and at a subsequent hearing in Sanderson. Further hearings in Austin before the Commission proper were opposed by representative groups of railroad employees and Sanderson business men

Judge Brian Montague of Del Rio and Bennett Smith of Fort Worth, attorneys representing the people of Sanderson through all of the hearings and related law days, giving some moisture to matters, stated that the motion to the district court had been mailed to Austin

The people of Sanderson through Bad for Health, court action, are seeking to have the decision of the Railroad Commission reversed on the ground that insufficient evidence was submitted by the plaintiff in the original petition to the Commisson, to warrant a decision by the Commission in favor of the plaintiff.

ASC GROUP TO NAME COMMITTEE OF RANCHMEN

All ranchers of Terrell County are advised that on August 19 an election will be held for the purpose of electing the 1956 ASC County Committee, The nominating committee selected the ten following men to appear on the ballot: Leo Adams, R. N. Allen, Jr., John W. Carruthers, Jr., Roy Deaton, W. H. Goldwire, Jack Hardgrave, E. E. Harkins, B. A. Kerr, G. K. Mitchell and Jack Riggs. Additional eligible persons may be placed on the ballot if requested by petition and signed by at least ten eligible voters. Persons, other than those named on the ballot, may be elected to the County Committee provided they received enough write-in votes.

The five men receiving the most votes will constitute the commit tee. The one receiving the most votes will be chairman, second most votes, vice-chairman, etc., on down through the first and second

Ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters whose names appear on the county office mailing list. and must be returned to the county office not later than 5 p.m. August 19. The ballot may be either mailed or returned in person. Any eligible voter who does not receive a ballot may obtain one at the ASC office in the courthouse at to each married rancher because of the Community Property Law in Texas, and both husband and wife

are allowed to vote. Ballots on the Wool Referendum vote must also be on file in the local ASC office by August 19.

Your favorite fruit may contain malic-acid, oxalic-acid, or citric acid. One or more of these may give you trouble, causing ungentlemanly or unlady-like belching.

Or the degree of ripeness of a fruit or vegetable may cause fermentation in the stomach, bringing on unpleasant results.

Condiments or strongly flavored foods are other causes of indigestion. They often cause the stomach to secrete too much hydrochloric acid. In normal people the stomach neutralizes what it over-secretes. but people with ulcers suffer a

painful "indigestion." Greasy foods are particularly troublesome to people with malfunctioning gall bladders or liver diseases.

Tannic acid can be found in three of the most commonly used straw; Even water, if you drink lots of it, may start your stomach churning and pouring out its digestive juices.

In any case of indigestion, frequently taking baking soda to relieve it is a mistake, health men agree. The temporary relief ma cause some sufferers to "play down" symptoms of a serious ail ment, thereby causing him to prolong medical attenion.

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

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


