# Breakdown of **Unofficial Results** Of Referendum Vote IN 32-0 SCORE

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson recently announced that preliminary results of the producer referendum on a promotion for wool and lamb indicate a vote approval of 72.2 per cent. Producers owning 9.127,059 sheep voted in favor of the program and owners of 3,517,680 sheep voted against

it (27.8 per cent). "If the final results of the referndum also show more than two hirds approval the program will be placed in effect," Secretary Benson stated, Final results will be known in early September when determination of the eligibility of challenged ballots will be completbe known.

referendum will be based on the number of sheep owned by those between the number of producers voting favorably and the vote according to sheep numbers. The preliminary tabulation shows 47,-095 producers (71.2 per cent) voting in favor of the program and 19,036 (28.8 per cent) voting

outdoor sports event on record. Albert Moore, prison rodeo manger since 1932, is putting only the best performers - inmate and anmal - into the area this year,


