Eisenhower Unable To Attend Dedication Of Big Bend Park

Congressman J. T. Rutherford of the 16th District has received a letter from President Eisenhower in which the Chief Executive says he cannot attend dedication ceremonies at the Big Bend National Park.

Rutherford, at the request of Park officials and of city authorities in West Texas towns near the Big Bend National Park, had written to Eisenhower and extended an invitation to him for "some time between October 1 and December 15, at your convenience."

About 10 days ago, Congressman Rutherford received word from the White House in Washington that the President had called for all correspondence relative to the park dedication to be forwarded to him at his Denver office.

For her going-away costume, Mrs. Hornbaker chose a blue silk

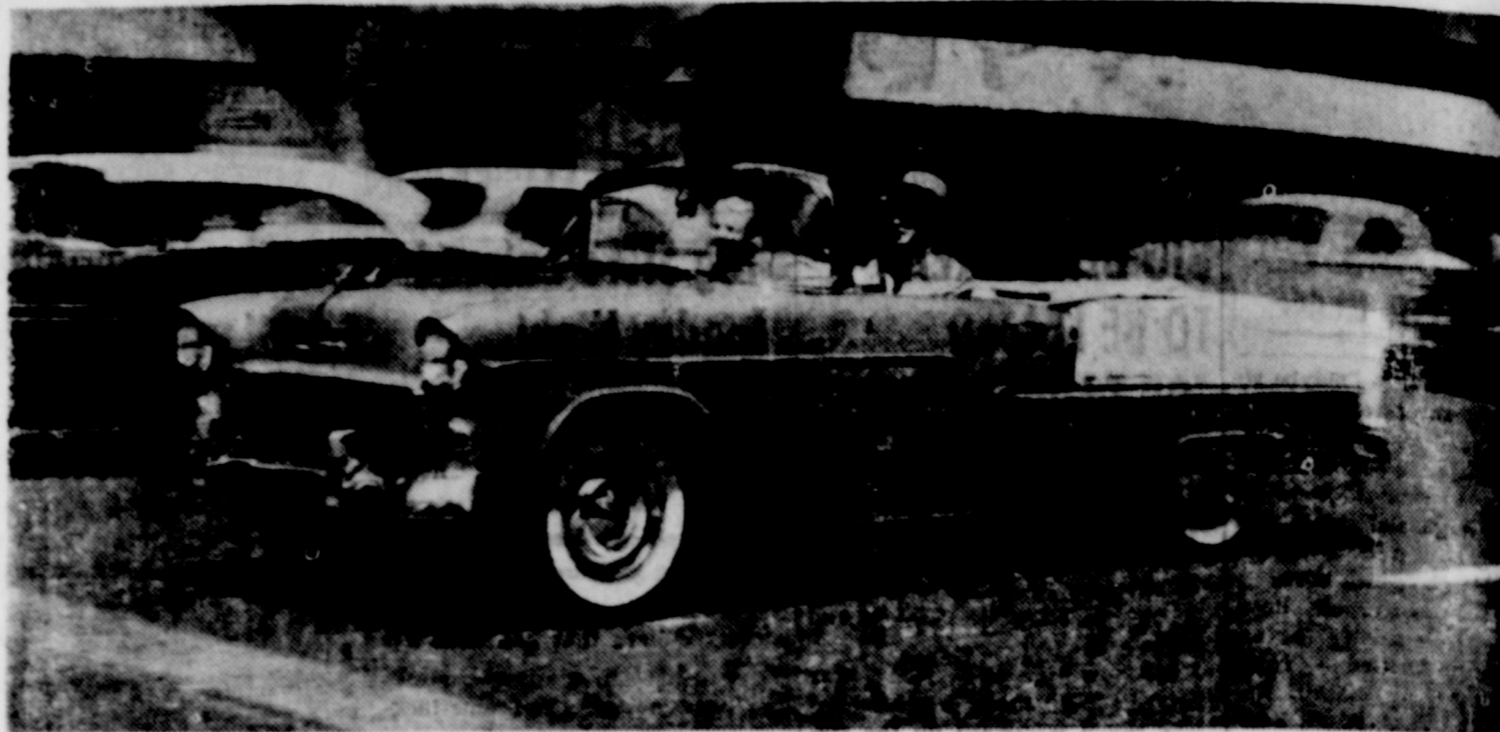
