Terrell County, along with this ntire area of West Texas, has rethe past week than in several ears. As reports have come in from ranchers, only one instance of a downpour over a short period came in and that was from the Banner ranch in the eastern part of the county.

The rains, extending over a period of several days or a week, have amounted to from three to five inches, in many instances. Practically every drop of rain in the vicinity of Sanderson was retarded and soaked into the ground Some heavy rains to the west caused Sanderson Canyon to run one day.

Ranchers are very optimistic over the pospects for winter feed on the range.

The gauge at The Kerr Mercantile Company registered 2.46 inches for the four-day period of precipitation in Sanderson. Clouds almost every night this week have caused a little moisture from condensation and have prevailed during most of the days to afford cool and comfortable weather. There has been much humidity, however, when the sun came through the overcast.

All ranchemen that were contacted, reported beneficial rainfall, indicating the generality of the precipitation.
