We might become better in the years ahead. If we do not become better we know we are sure to perish. We recently heard a citizen here say that conditions had been as they are for the past thirty or forty years and they were good enough yet. That will not prove true today in this era of fluidity. We like to feel that this newspaper is lending its efforts to help to mold opinions on the things that are for the better interests of the people who live here. This column has had a great deal to say about communities where the powers that be try to advance their own community at the expense of their neighbors. It would be a poor Chamber of Commerce head, or city dad who would not try to promote the interests of his community. We have never criticized anyone for doing that. We have had some comment (roughly speaking) about the selfish attitude of some in trying to promote area-wide projects without the help of area town and not inviting participation other than to aid in the financing of the project. West Texas is too big for that sort of thing and no town nor group of people will prosper by using those methods. We are happy to say that the citizens of Sanderson and Terrell County are bing better than that. This community has always been among the first to lend support to every worthwhile project for the entire area, but our citizens are tired of being pushed around by a few "timelght seekers."



Austin — After three exiled years, Texas again has an official accredited national committeeman. Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey's acceptance by the national committee gave Texas full representation for the first time since September, '52. Wright Morrow was refused recognition because he supported Republican Dwight Eisenhower. Official groups of both conservatives and liberal Texas Democrats supported Ramsey. Only scattered protests were heard, one by the president of the liberal faction of the Texas Young Democratic Club, Shivers Okays Demi Rules. Gov. Allan Shivers says he is willing to play by the rules adopted for the 1956 Democratic national convention. He said at a news conference that he expects to be challenged, nevertheless, by a "bunch of wild-eyed pinks." Rules set for 1956 were viewed by Shivers as being the same as in 1952. Then they required heads of delegations to work for placing the party's nominee on the state ballot under the proper column. Shivers said he is not surprised to hear that some some old politi-

cal enemies, like Stephen Mitchell, Adlai Stevenson's aide, think he should not be allowed a 1956 seat. He held firm that he would not take any pledge to support the party nominee. "I will give no pledge to support a nominee until I know who he is," Shivers said. He said he considers himself a "bona fide democrat" and feels it is no crime for a Democrat to vote for a Republican friend. "I consider President Eisenhower a friend of mine," the governor said. His statement was widely interpreted as indicating he might support Eisenhower again if he is a candidate. Legislative Council Posts Filled. Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey announced committee assignments at the first meeting of the new Legislative Council. Serving on the executive committee with Ramsey and House Speaker Jim Lindsey will be Sen. Abraham Kazen of Laredo and Reps. Obie Bristol of Big Spring and W. G. Kirkland of Odessa. Studying finances will be Sens. Nevelle Colson of Navasota and Gus Straum of Hallettsville. Reps. E. F. Crim of Henderson, W. S. Heatly, Jr., of Paducah and Pearce Johnson of Austin. On the subject matter committee are Sens. Roger Kelley of Edinburg, George Moffett of Chiltoncothe, Reps. Tom King of Dallas, Gus Garret of Raymondville, James W. Yancy, Jr., of Houston, Ben A. Glasing of Kingsville, and Joe Burkett of Kerrville. Should Be Ample — But On Sept. 6 the fee for drivers' license renewal was increased to \$2. All summer, however, Texans kept jumping the gun and sending in the larger fee. Patiently, the Department of Public Safety sent back the over-payments. Now, however, the new law is in force — and guess what. The DPS is busy writing Texas drivers — asking for more money. TAXES — — —

Seems to be the main concern of those who are opposing, or those who are doubtful of whether or not they should oppose the incorporation of the City of Sanderson. DID YOU KNOW that the incorporation of Sanderson would be a saving of money to some of our citizens even though a tax rate per \$100 of value of \$1.50 (the highest rate allowed under the laws of the State of Texas) should be assessed against them using the same valuation that used by Terrell County for tax purposes. This would come about by distributing the cost of our fire department to all citizens of the town rather than having a few civic minded persons bear the entire cost by donations. If your home is valued at \$1,000.00 by Terrell County for tax purposes the most you could possibly be taxed by a city would be \$15.00 for the year. Certainly, any person owning a home of such value would not consider donating less than that amount for fire protection. DID YOU KNOW that besides distributing equally the cost of maintaining our fire department that if you wanted to borrow money for the construction of a new business house or a new home, the loan would be secured much easier if your town is incorporated. DID YOU KNOW that Precinct One's county aid now being received will not be affected — you will continue to pay the same county tax you have paid in the past, and certainly should be entitled to the same consideration. DID YOU KNOW that no city can add a tax load to you unless you vote for it. No bonds may be issued unless voted by property owners approved by vote of the people affected. No ordinance may be imposed without a public hearing before the people. DID YOU KNOW that practically every person who assisted with the fight against the removal of the railroad terminal asked, "Is Sanderson incorporated?" And invariably, when they found that it was not, they would add, "It would certainly help if it were." DID YOU KNOW the State Highway through town will still be maintained by the State just as it is at present. DID YOU KNOW that owners of dogs could be made to properly care for and vaccinate their dogs. That livestock could be kept out of your back door. DID YOU KNOW that some gossips have it that all users of bottles will be forced to dispose of the bottles and install tanks as long as the law is conformed with these bottles can be installed, in the city. DID YOU KNOW that if you reached the age of twenty-one in 1956, you must be a resident within the proposed city limits to be able to cast your vote in the special election for or against the incorporation of Sanderson. DID YOU KNOW that if you have reached your 60th birthday prior to or during 1955 you may vote without a poll tax or exemption certificate. DID YOU KNOW that any person who has resided within the limits of the proposed city or town for the six preceding months, and was a qualified voter under state law, is entitled to vote at the election. 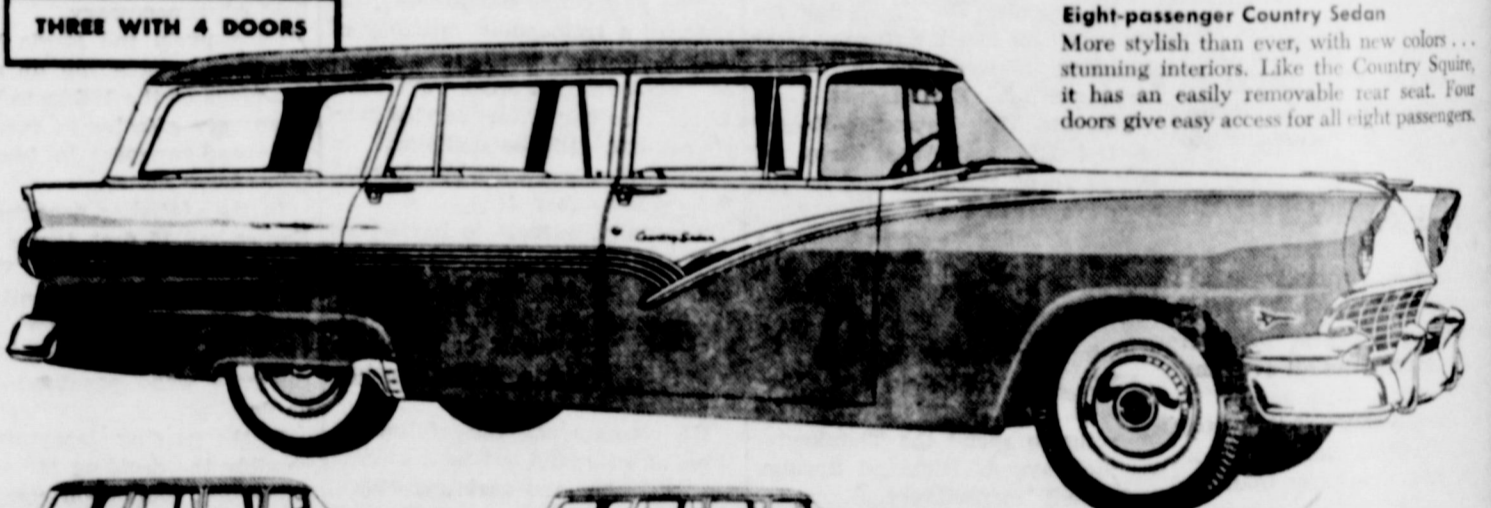

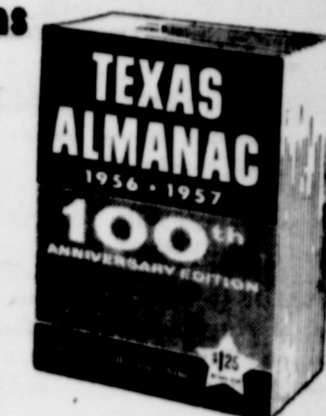
