"It's time to start those Christmas mailings-" Postmaster Clyde Griffith warned today, launching his 1955 "Mail Early for Christ-

mas" campaign. 'On the calendar it's a month away, but here in the postoffice it s Christmas today - and every lay until December 25th," he said.

The post office has already aispatched a tremendous quantity of gift packages headed for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Christmas cards for service personnel can still be delivered in ime if they are sent by air mail

before December 1. "Actually, success in having all Christmas gifts and greeting cards delivered on time is largely a matter of advance planning and preparation which should be done this week," Postmaster Griffith point-

He recommends the following steps at once: Get out your Christmas card list and carefully check through it. Make sure that each address includes the full name, street and number, city, zone and state. Then pay a visit to the post office, stock up on stamps use three cent stamps on your Christmas cards for first-class mail service(and ask for copies of two new publications for patrons, "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing" and "Domestic Postage Rates and Fees"


