SANTA CLAUS' VISIT TO SANDERSON WILL BE DECEMBER 12TH AND 13TH

Word has been received that Santa Claus will be in Sanderson on December 12 and 13. Final preparations have been made by the Sanderson Lions Club, local sponsors.

The plans are changed somewhat from previous years and it

is hoped that this year's visit will work out to the added pleasure and entertainment of the younger children of the county. The cooperation of the parents of smaller children is urged.

Santa Claus will arrive in Sanderson on Monday morning at 10 o'clock and will be down town until 12 noon. Then from 1:30 to 4:30 in the afternoon Santa Claus will be on the streets in the business section for interviewing and entertaining the children. These hours will be for both Monday and Tuesday.

In case of severely cold weather, Santa will be in various business houses all during the hours of his visit.

Each of the small children who are brought to see Santa Claus will be given all of the time necessary or desired to talk to him and he will pass out small bags of candy to each of the children with whom he talks.

Parents are urged to bring their children down as many times as the children wish during the two-day visit.

The visit of Santa this year is planned strictly for the entertainment of the small children of the county, since the crowds have increased so much during past years that none of the children had an opportunity to visit with the ideal of their Christmas ideas.

The Sanderson Lions, sponsors of the annual Christmas party, felt that the endeavor had grown out of their hands and had become too much of a burden with the continuation of their practices of years past. The expense of handling out close to 1,000 bags of candy fruit and nuts at a cost of approximately 35c per bag, was considered too much of a job to continue.

They feel that the practice initiated this year will bring Santa Claus closer to the children who have a very realistic feeling toward the mythical old man and that the grown-ups and older children of the county will get a lot more pleasure out of seeing the tiny ones have a chance to visit with Santa Claus.

It is also hoped that the containers which have been put out in business houses in town will defray the expenses of the Santa Claus visit this year.

L. A. McBees Gets Good Assay Report From Ore Samples

L. A. McBee, local boot and saddle maker, has recently received favorable reports on uranium ore samples taken from a 6,000 mineral lease in Brewster County.

With his step-father, V. G. Ross, of Alpine, and his uncle, C. R. Schnaubert of Langtry, McBee holds a 10-year hard mineral lease on the Anderson ranch which is approximately 21 miles south of Alpine. W. P. Wallace, Jr., of Del Rio is also a partner in the lease.

Samples from which the assay was made were taken from three different locations over a distance of about three-quarters of a mile, all taken from or near the surface. No mining has been done on the lease, according to McBee.

On the samples, the Dickinson Laboratories in El Paso gave the report of an analysis of .136 per cent uranium U 308 (chemical) and 15 per cent T02 Titanium oxide. For commercial production, the minimum percentage of U308 is .10 per cent.

Incorporation Defeated By 5-1 Vote Saturday

The question of the incorporation of Sanderson was defeated decisively here Saturday. The polls registered 67 for and 300 against the question.

A very heavy percentage of the voting potential was noted by the number of votes cast.

Those opposing the question of incorporation were mainly opposed to the possible tax burden to the

property owners of Sanderson at this time and the fear of controls possible under a city government. They were also opinionated by the possibility of increased rents by property owners as a result of increased taxes.

The proponents of the idea for incorporation, on the other hand, had never advocated any program necessitating levying of additional taxes nor any controls on citizens, rather basing their views of the need for incorporation on the idea that certain progress moves and advantages were possible only by incorporation.

Garden Club Will Sponsor Annual Lighting Contest

Plans for the annual Christmas lighting contest which is sponsored by the local Garden Club were announced this week by the chairman, Mrs. W. G. Downie.

The judging of the contest will be on Sunday evening, December 18, by a secret committee.

This year a prize is being offered for the best over-all Christmas decoration.

In three divisions, a first, second and third prize is being offered. For the best yard decoration, the best door decoration and the best window decoration. The amount of the cash awards to be made will be announced later.

The increase in the number of divisions in the lighting contest was made this year as a further stimulus to residents in planning their decorations. Alpine Newspaper Changes Hands

Last week announcement was made of the change in ownership of the Alpine Avalanche, a weekly newspaper.

Mr. and Mrs. James Glasscock, who have been operating the paper for the past 12 months under a lease, bought the entire plant and stock of office supplies from Mr. and Mrs. D. M. (Nig) Bennett. The Bennetts first owned a half interest in the establishment in 1927 and in 1935 they acquired full ownership which they have maintained until the recent transaction.

Highway Work Slated for Area

The Texas Highway Department has announced from Austin that the first step has been taken that will set up a new program of highway work for the calendar year of 1956. This new program is especially designed to protect the investment already made in the state system of roads.

R. L. Faltinson, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Pecos, has stated that the following state highways and roads in his area are scheduled for work under the program.

Seal coats are to be placed on sections of U.S. 90 and U.S. 285.

Mr. Faltinson stated that the Highway Commission has authorized the development of this program for the purpose of protecting the investment of the public in the State Highway System.

It was announced that work will begin on these projects just as soon as final planning is completed and contracts are let. Resident Engineer J. W. Whitson of Fort Stockton will be in charge of the work in this area.

Work is progressing rapidly on the construction work west of Sanderson, including the relocation of U.S. 90 for three miles west and the construction of the channelized intersection of U.S. 90 and U.S. 285 just west of Sanderson.

Structures on the relocation of U.S. 90 have been completed and grading is underway. Grading is also under way on the intersection job.

The final phase of construction of F.M.1217 between Dryden and Sheffield is under way with grading and location of roadbed, now being accomplished. Work is to begin soon on the construction of a bridge to span Independence Creek.

Early specifications called for a low-water crossing across Independence, but these plans were changed and will now include the construction of a 10-foot high bridge which will span the creek bed.

All of the above-mentioned projects are scheduled for completion next summer.

Ranchers To Hear F.H.A. Loan Plan

Ranchers of this area and others interested will be given an opportunity to hear the Soil and Water Conservation Loan plan explained, at a meeting at the courthouse here Friday afternoon at 1:30.

Scott Stiles of the F.H.A. office in Del Rio and Lloyd Booker, local Soil Conservation Service technician, will explain how the loan operates and discuss practices that may be carried out.

The loans are to be made available to Terrell County ranchers through the Farm Home Administration.

LISTEN TO LUKE

Now that the election is over the question of incorporation has been settled, it is time to formulate the differences of opinions on the subject and try to get together to make Sanderson a better town in which to live.

The town, the people, and the general make-up of things in Sanderson, make this the most desirable place on earth to live as it is. To add to the attractiveness for more people to like our town and want to come here.

One of the least advertised but most assets to our town, in our opinion, is the quietness and lack of general confusion and bustle which are so noticeable in many towns and cities. It is possible to enjoy the quietness of living here by the association of "folks".

The general cooperation predicated by citizens and endeavors of civic clubs, churches and schools noticeable and most commendable.

In the minds of some, incorporation would have been a step forward, while a majority felt that it would have been an expensive one which would not have offered enough in return. There are objects undertaken by the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce and other civic and fraternal factions which could develop a united front for the betterment of the community in many ways.

The commissioners of the county again undertaking the project of keeping alleys and bar-pits clean, and the proper appreciation the citizens should induce them to work between the bar-pits and alleys in cleaning up.

As we close the old year and face the new start, let it be with a spirit of cooperation on everyone's part in living in every way to make our town a cleaner, brighter, happier place for all of us and for those who will follow.

There has been a lot of talk and writing material lately on the idea of federal aid to education. This is for us to express an opinion. It doesn't matter which political party initiates such an idea or program, it is not feasible in our own opinion, nor is it workable.

The idea behind federal aid to anything is good, in a way, but it is a hard problem to get rid of a yoke once it is put on.

Any party who begins such an idea, may have the best of intentions at heart, and may even go far as to carry them out in a manner that is most commendable.

All federal aid gets to be, sooner or later, a political football. And federal aid gets to be, sooner or later, a federally-controlled project, it may not be, in our lifetime, but a political party would abuse the privilege of federal control to do so, but it could be they would, if not in our lifetime, then later.

People in Washington cannot see the individuals requirements and mechanics of each individual school. A blanket list of rules for operation would be set down and all schools would have to abide by it, regardless of disadvantages hardships.

It is very possible and probable that with federal aid to schools we would have larger and better schools, more richly equipped and with advantages that we could have otherwise. But along with it we would have complete control of the teaching instructions, courses to be taught, the hours, qualifications of teachers, their salaries, their limitations and restrictions, the subjects to be taught in the classrooms, and all other intricacies of running an education.

These controls could be abused by the finger of responsibility and be taken out of the hands of local school boards and school administrators, which would take control of education completely away from the people of a particular community or area.

We know the needs of our local

school system, we know also their capabilities. We know that local taxes, supplemented by state education money, and returns from school-owned land support our local institution. If we can make our school system better, it is through both luck and more taxes.

Our taxes, under federal control, could be used to help finance other schools which may or may not be more needy than ours, and at the same time, a certain portion of tax money under such a scheme is always lost in administration of the bureau or agency.

Let's think of our schools as we do our other personal obligations — let's better them when we can end where we can, but let's not let them get completely away from us and be risked in the mire and mud of politics to be treated as many other government-controlled projects have been.

SP Places Order For More Equipment

Houston — Southern Pacific Co. is placing a record order for 10,700 freight cars at an estimated cost of \$90 million, company officials said.

The announcement was made in New York by D. J. Russell, SP's president, and in Houston by E. S. Sines, executive vice president for the railroad's lines in Texas and Louisiana.

The order, largest ever placed by the SP, brings total number of freight cars acquired or on order by the railroad in 1955 to 1,275 at a cost of \$124 million.

A total of 250 flat cars designed for piggyback service is included in the order.

Most of the cars, Russell said, would be built in the SP shops in Houston and Sacramento. The new order also includes 6,600 box cars, of which 4,900 will be 50 feet long with double doors.

AUSTIN.— Pieces of the Texas political puzzle begin to fall into place. Who will run for what may be largely developed by the end of the year, months ahead of the usual schedule.

State Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton held a press conference Monday in Austin to announce formally his candidacy for governor.

Interested observers also are watching for an announcement from Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd. But chances are it won't be of a political nature. Reports have it that Shepperd may announce his retirement from politics at the end of his present term, to accept a position in West Texas.

For now, Shepperd said "no comment," when asked about his plans, but promised an announcement "later." At present he says he has plenty to do, filling his job as attorney general. "I've got some hot potatoes cooking, and I intend to finish cooking them," he commented.

Another possibility is that former University of Texas Chancellor James P. Hart would announce his gubernatorial plans in mid-December.

Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson is being talked more and more as a candidate for attorney general. State Sen. Searcy Bracewell of Houston is considered a prospect either for this post, or for lieutenant governor.

And a one-sentence card in the mail prophesies: "Obie Jones will be your next state treasurer." Jones is a state representative from Travis County.

Daniel Drive Grows
Movements to persuade U.S. Sen. Price Daniel to run for governor apparently are breaking out over the state.

In Navarro County, Democratic leaders who split over Shivers and Yarborough and Eisenhower and Stevenson united in signing a petition endorsing Daniel. A similar situation developed in Childress.

A poll of the heavily conservative Dallas County Democratic Executive Committee by the Dallas Morning News showed Daniel a strong favorite.

Mail Rate Hike Talked by Head Of Postal Department

"No businessman would seriously believe it possible for any business to absorb seven major increases in the expenses which account for over 90 per cent of a business's total cost without compensating increases in prices," Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerheld said in commenting on the proposed postal rate increase.

"This is the situation the Postoffice Department faces — and since rate increases have not kept pace with the costs, this huge businesslike enterprise within government is losing money at the rate of over a million dollars every working day.

Postage rates on first-class mail letters are the same today — three for the first ounce — as they were in 1932. Meanwhile, Congress has voted wage increases to postal employees on five different occasions since then.

"Two increases in the rates paid the railroad for carrying the mails have also been approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission, in 1951 and 1954.

These two major costs — wages and transportation — account for over 90 per cent of total Postoffice Department costs.

"Not only has the Postoffice Department faced these increases in costs without compensating increases in income, but it has been forced to serve an over-increasing and shifting population.

"The number of householders in the United States has increased almost two-thirds since letter rates

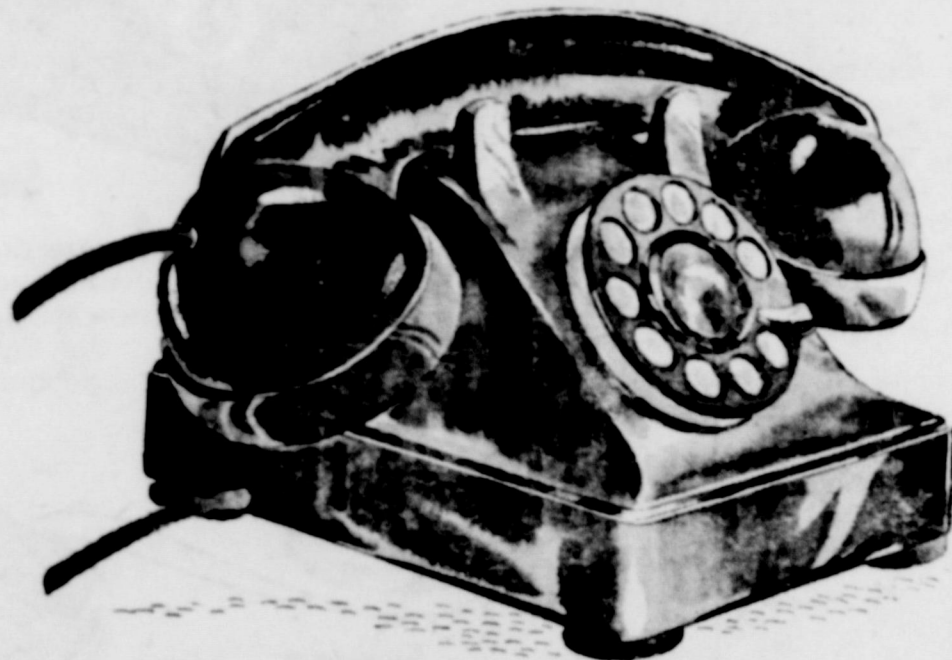

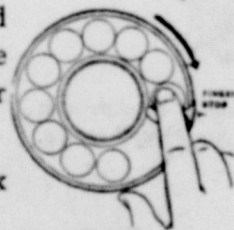
