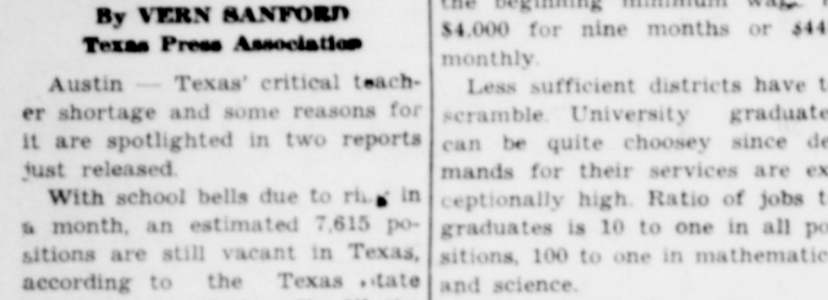

Games License Sale Begins This Month

The new hunting and fishing license for the state's fiscal year beginning September 1 will be mailed from Austin on August 21, according to the Chief License Clerk for the Game and Fish Commission.

Approximately 350,000 fishing and 350,000 hunting licenses in all will be shipped to the state's 2,500 licensed agents in 254 counties.

Old licenses will be void after midnight, August 31.

Resident hunting licenses will cost \$2.15 and include two tags for deer hunting. Resident fishing licenses cost \$1.65.

The consignments will include the special non-resident license for migratory bird hunting such as ducks, geese and doves. These cost \$5. A special five-day non-resident fishing license costs \$1.65.

C. W. SNOWDEN NAMED ACADEMY FOOTBALL COACH

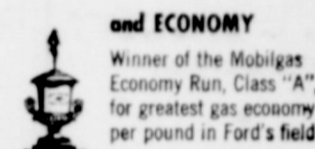

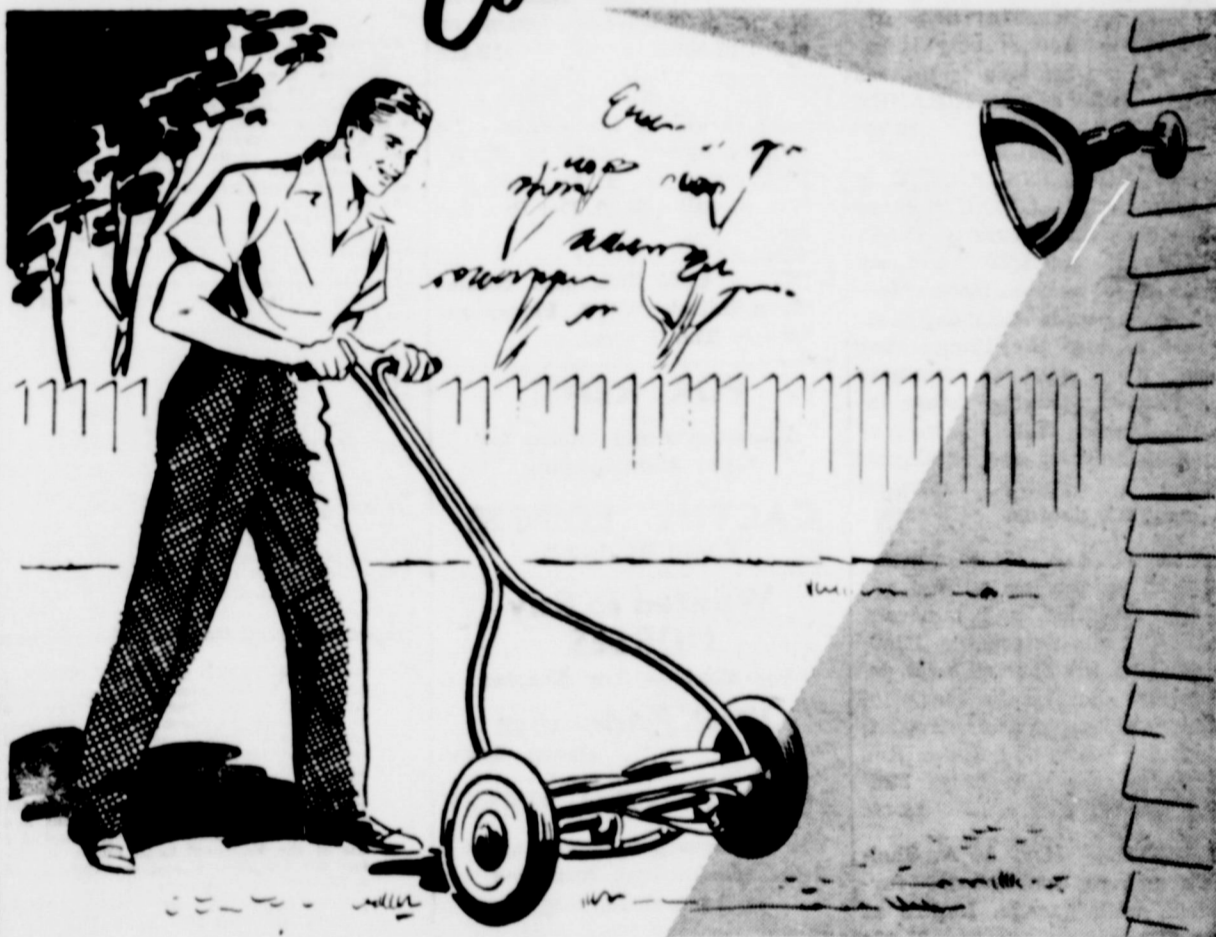
