## TB SKIN TESTS TO BE MADE SATURDAY

Parents of all children starting to school this term are again reminded of the free tuberculosis skin tests to be made in the office of Dr. J. M. Sexton. The tests will begin after 2 o'clock Saturday. The free tests will also be available to all children of pre-school age.

The tests are neither harmful nor painful in any way to the children. They are being used as a means of determining the possibility of the presence of tuberculosis in a child too young to have X-rays. The Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association is sponsoring the project.

## Democratic Run-Off Election Saturday

A total of 27 absentee ballots was cast up to Tuesday's deadline for the Democratic run-off election Saturday.

The polls Saturday will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. at the courthouse in Sanderson, the Dryden school, the Charlie Turk ranch and the Sid Harkins ranch.

The governor's race and the attorney general's race are the only two contested races on the ballot, but Ben Ramsey's name appears on the ballot without opposition due to the withdrawal of A. M. Aikin, Jr., from the run-off because of reasons of health.

## Scoreboard Fund Short Only \$240.56

The electric scoreboard fund is \$240.56 short of the intended goal of \$749.60.

The local committee ramrodding the drive for the completion of sufficient funds is attempting to raise the balance within the next five days so that there will be a possibility of having the scoreboard erected in time for the first home game. It was pointed out, however, that the cost of the scoreboard would have to be in the hands of the committee before it could be ordered.

## Haynes Acquitted in Assault Charge Here in District Court

A verdict of not guilty was returned by the jury here Wednesday morning in a case styled the State of Texas vs. W. A. Haynes. The charge by the grand jury was assault with attempt to murder.

The case grew out of an altercation in which Rudolph G. Wallace received gunshot wounds in the face causing the loss of his right eye.

Testimony brought out at the trial revealed that Haynes went to the home of Wallace at about 7 p.m. on April 29, 1955, to pick up his daughter who was visiting there. While Haynes was sitting in his car in front of the Wallace home and talking to Mrs. Wallace and his daughter, Sue Vaun Haynes, Wallace and his brother-in-law, Walter Lee Cook, drove up in a pick-up and stopped. It was shortly after this the shooting occurred.

Haynes was shot once above the left ear and once in the left shoulder by a .22-calibre rifle, according to the testimony.

The altercation is said to have begun in a dispute over the children of the two families not being able to get along in play.

The jury deliberated only about one and one-half hours before giving their verdict shortly before noon Wednesday.

There were four women and eight men jurors on the district court case.

Hart Johnson of Fort Stockton was attorney for the defendant.

The state and defense rested their cases Tuesday afternoon at about 5:15 and the court was recessed until 9 a. m. Wednesday at which time the jury heard the charge by the court and the arguments for the prosecution and defense. The case was turned over to the jury at ten a.m. Wednesday.

## Perry Finger Makes Mexico Trip With 'All-Star' Ball Team

Perry Finger will return to his home in Hebronville Monday after a tour of Mexico with seven-teen Senior All-Star players of Big State Baseball Camp in Meridian.

He attended the camp for the second time this year and received the outstanding player award this year and the sportsmanship award last year.
