Diesel Pump System Installed in Yard At T&NO Depot

Permanent underground diesel pumping system is being installed in the east end of the local railroad yards. The system, according to local railroad officials, will be used to service engines in the east end of the yards only, and is expected to greatly relieve the delay caused by the present re-fueling system.

Previously, trains were held up in Sanderson yards for as long as one hour, according to the officials, for refueling, and sometimes it was necessary to hold trains at Mofeta or Emerson until the yards could be cleared to accommodate additional trains for refueling.

The present system, a car of fuel and a car containing the devices for pumping, will be used in the west end of the local yards for refueling engines, thus relieving the necessity of sometimes having to bring the engines back to the roundhouse for servicing.

The present system also requires leaving one of the long tracks open for the movement of the re-fueling cars.

It is estimated that the permanent system will be completed in 30 days.

He stated that Mrs. Charlton was improving slowly and was able to be in her wheel chair some of the time. He extended an invitation to their friends to visit them when in Del Rio.

Austin - Activities of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People have ended temporarily in Texas.

A stop order was issued at the request of Attorney General John Ben Shepperd by Dist. Judge Otis T. Donagan of Tyler. Hearings will be held Friday.

Investigations of the NAACP, a New York corporation with 112 branch offices in Texas, have been going on quietly for several months. Climax came with the filing of charges alleging numerous violations of Texas laws.

Specifically charged were efforts to register Negro students in Texas schools, contrary to the laws of the State; inciting racial prejudice, picketing, riots, and other unlawful acts, contrary to public peace; engaging in political activities; operating without a permit; evasion of taxes; practicing law without a license; and coercing Negro students and their parents.

"Transaction of business in Texas, by a foreign corporation, is only a privilege which the state of Texas may confer, extend, or withhold," said Shepperd.

This is not "in any manner" a suit against the Negro citizens of Texas, Shepperd pointed out. "It is limited to the NAACP as a foreign corporation, and their affiliated organizations. For over 100 years the white and colored races have lived together peacefully and in harmony. Were it not for the activities of the NAACP they would now, and in the future, continue to do so."

Dr. H. Boyd Hall, state NAACP president, said the move indicated that Texas is entering "an era of persecution." NAACP officials

immediately called a 17-state meeting for St. Louis.

State Income Up

State income jumped nearly \$75,000,000 during the past year but increasing expenditures are expected to consume it all and more too.

Revenues totaled \$913,422,792 during the fiscal year, State Comp. R. S. Calvert reported.

A budget spokesman said the present spending pattern and new demands will likely require a new tax bill at the next session of the legislature.

Requiring more money are the growth in schools, junior and senior colleges, prisons and hospitals. Proposals for increases in teacher retirement benefits and aid to disabled persons are to be voted on in November.

Gap is estimated variously from \$5,000,000 to \$30,000,000.

Road Money Earmarked

For the first time, right-of-way on Texas' interstate highway sys-

tem will be purchased with all-state money instead of county money.

An initial fund of \$10,000,000 purchases has been authorized by the State Highway Commission. Texas put up 10 per cent of the federal government \$90 million.

Included in the current program are 637 miles of new work, an estimated \$256,000,000.
