## Former El Paso Mayor Fred Hervey To Talk To Local Organizations Oct. 17

"America's Role in World Affairs" will be the title of the talk to be given by Fred Hervey, former mayor of El Paso and world traveler, to the luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club next Wednesday, October 17. Later in the day he will talk again to the high school student body and members of the P.T.A.

The program at the high school will be at 2 p.m. and the public is urged to avail themselves of the opportunity of hearing this interesting and informative talk.

As a student of world affairs with a background of study in economic and trade conditions, Mr. Hervey believes the American people can fulfill the obligation of being the leader in the free world.

His talks in Sanderson will present his thoughts for building a better world in which all nations can live with a better understanding through education and trade, without destroying or jeopardizing our own economy.

Nationally recognized by Fortune Magazine as one of six men of outstanding ability he was also chosen as one of 16 mayors in the United States to visit the Middle East, Greece, Turkey, and Israel to study foreign aid and the Israeli-Arab situation. In all of Mr. Hervey's travels he had the facilities of the American Embassy at his command and was briefed by various ambassadors and trade missions with the same authority as an United States Senator.

He also was contact man for the Foreign Affairs Institute, and is currently serving as a member of the national Foreign Affairs committee of the American Legion. Born and reared in the Southwest he was appointed to the Governor's Water Conservation Board for the State of Texas.

In addition to the briefings Mr. Hervey received from important governmental dignitaries in each country, he made a point of getting opinions of business and working men not ordinarily interviewed. His most inclusive trip included visits to Japan, Korea, Formosa, Philippines, Hong Kong, Viet Nam, Cambodia, Thailand, Burma, India, Pakistan, Iraq, Egypt, Italy, Switzerland, Spain, France, Yugoslavia, Austria, Germany, England and Ireland.

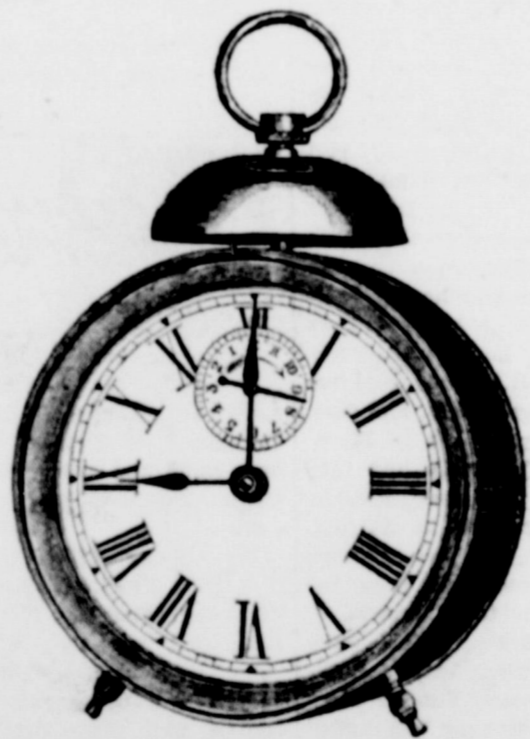

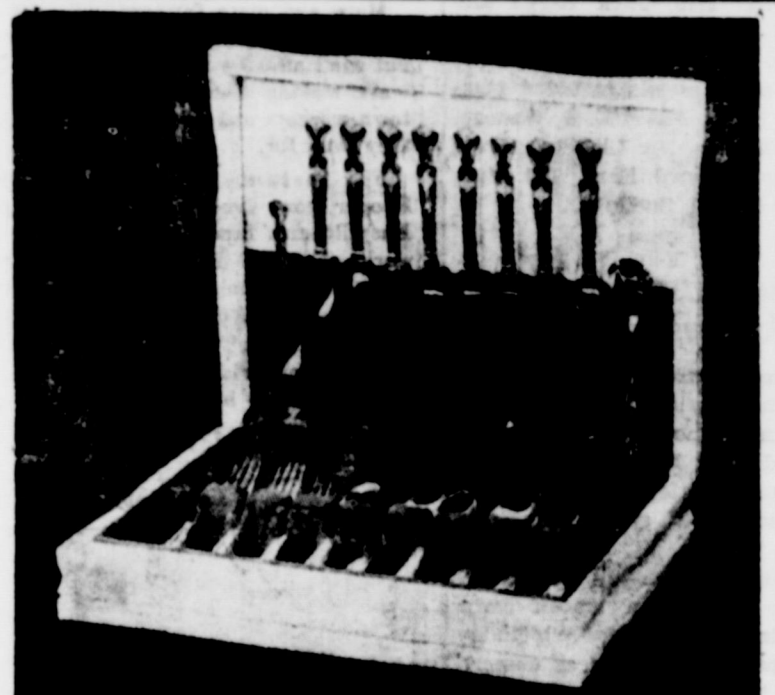
