P.-T.A. Carnival To Be Halloween

The annual P.-T.A. Halloween carnival will be next Wednesday night between the Sanderson High School and the Band Hall according to an announcement made this week by P.-T.A. officials.

A full evening's entertainment is planned for the citizens of the community, regardless of age.

Festivities will get under way at 5:00 p.m. with a parade beginning at Alamo Lumber Co. and going down Oak Street to Cooke's Market, then north to the school. The parade will consist of costumed students led by the high school band.

Prizes will be given for costumes of students in the parade. There will be prizes for boys and girls in pretty costume, gruesome costume and unusual costume divisions.

All students to be in the parade are asked to be on School St. by Alamo Lumber Co. at 4:45 so that the judges may make their selections.

At the carnival midway there will be a Mexican supper at 5:30, cold drinks, hot dogs, sandwiches, fortune telling, games of skill, boxing and a variety show. The variety show, in the auditorium, will begin at 8 o'clock and promises to be full of entertainment for all members of the family.

The carnival this year is being financed by treasury funds of the P.-T.A. and no one was asked to contribute articles for the carnival. The sponsors are asking for the whole-hearted support of the school patrons so that the affair will be a success.

Proceeds of the show will go toward one of the P.-T.A. projects planned for the year.

Clyde Lester Boozer Dies on October 16 In Tucson, Arizona

Funeral services were held in Tucson, Arizona, last Thursday for Clyde Lester Boozer, 62, who died in Tucson, Arizona, on Oct. 16. Mr. Boozer had returned home a few days previously from a fishing trip to Mexico with a group of Sanderson friends and was stricken with a heart attack while having a routine physical check-up.

Mr. Boozer was born in Sanderson May 25, 1894. He was married to Meadie Rutledge on May 20, 1924. They moved to Amador in 1929 and he was made postmaster there in 1935, filling the office in connection with his store. Besides his widow, he is survived by a daughter, Carol; two sisters, Mrs. Stella MacDonald of Tucson, Ariz., and Mrs. Opal Halliburton of Los Angeles, Calif.; one brother, Roy Boozer, of Portland, Oregon.

Burial was made in the Veterans Plot of Southlawn Cemetery with the V.F.W. Post 549 in charge of the services.

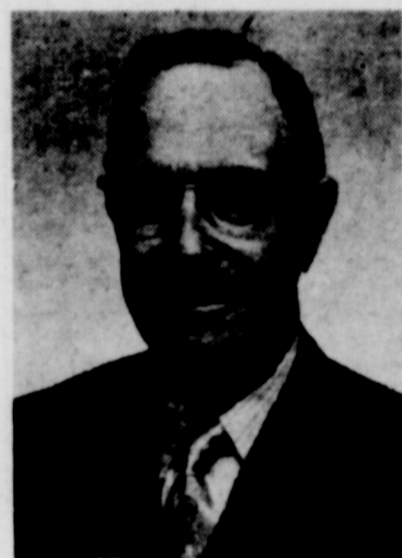
Mr. and Mrs. John Whistler Honored On Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary Celebration

Mr. and Mrs. John Whistler celebrated their golden wedding anniversary here Saturday when their grandson, John Lewis Whistler, and Mrs. Whistler entertained with a reception and open house in their home from 4 to 7 p.m.

The Whistler home was decorated in a profusion of flowers in yellow and gold shades. A bouquet of



yellow roses was on the table where the guests were registered. A large assortment of gifts was on display in the bedrooms.

The refreshment table was covered in a lace cloth and centered with an arrangement of dried materials sprayed with gold. On each side of the centerpiece in gold holders were white candles inscribed with 1906 and 1956. The white napkins were inscribed "Bertha and John, 1906-1956". Golden punch, mints and salted nuts were served with the beautifully decorated cake.

Mr. and Mrs. Whistler were born and reared in Brackettville and were married there October 16, 1906. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Hutchinson and his parents were Mr. and Mrs. Ross Whistler, pioneer ranchers of Kinney County who settled there before Fort Clark was established.

Following their marriage, they ranched in Kinney County for six years. Mr. Whistler went to San Antonio during that time to go to a barber school and he moved to Sanderson in 1912 and he opened a barber shop. The shop was located in the building now occupied by Jack Hayre for his law office. Mrs. Whistler for ten years or more operated the first tailor shop here. It was first in a building next door to the barber shop and was later moved to a building near where the Club Cafe is now located. Their first home here was on Oak St. on the site of the present Community Public Service Co. office. They made their home here until 1922 when Mrs. Whistler went to San Antonio to attend a chiropractic college, locating in Del Rio to set up her first practice. They returned to Sanderson in 1927 to reside. Mrs. Whistler continuing her chiropractic practice until 1952 while Mr. Whistler continued his barber business.

Since 1948, the Whistlers have been residing on their ranch northeast of Dryden. Mr. Whistler is still active in the ranching business.

The Whistlers are the parents of two sons, Clyde Whistler of Port Aransas, and Johnny Whistler of Del Rio. A daughter, Mrs. Jimmie Loden, resides in Guatemala. They have 16 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren.

Gibson Here Monday In Quest of Votes For Congress Post

Charley Gibson of El Paso, candidate for Congress from the 16th District, was in Sanderson Monday afternoon for several hours.

Gibson is seeking the Congressional post on the Republican ticket and will oppose J. T. Rutinieri, Democrat, who is present incumbent.

Candidate Gibson met with local voters on the streets and in the shops and stores and said he was delighted to be able to see some people he had met previously and to make many new acquaintances while here.

"I've looked forward to coming to Sanderson," he said, "and have already enjoyed meeting many fine people. There are many problems in this area and I believe that as a member of Ike's team, I can give the people a strong voice in Washington. I also feel that my election will be the real start of a two-party system in West Texas," he continued.

Mr. Gibson was accompanied by Gale Grose of El Paso and Milton E. Smith of Alpine. He made an appearance in Marfa earlier in the day, then had a two-hour stop in Alpine where his supporters had arranged for a radio spot in which he outlined some of the principles he advocates in his campaign. He spoke of the benefits to the ranchers by putting in effect the El-lender plan.

Gibson stated that he hoped to meet as many people as possible before the election and he pledged his best efforts to serve the citizens of the 16th District if he were chosen as their representative in Washington.

Pair Escapes Local Jail But Freedom Is Short

Local Youth Admits Aiding Break

Ray Odell Marshall and Bennie Hamrick were successful in their jail break Tuesday night from the cell on the bottom floor at the courthouse, but their freedom was short-lived. According to local officers, the jail break occurred at 12:20 a.m., and they were captured in Alpine at 9:05 a.m. The boys told the officers of their escape following their capture.

Marshall was being held on charges of burglary following the breaking in at James & Magill about a month ago. Hamrick was being held for MPs from Fort Bliss on AWOL charges. Hamrick was picked up Saturday about noon in Dryden.

Two bars had been sawed loose in the northwest corner of the cell in the section of bars nearest the floor and they were then pried out

to permit the escape. According to the story of the escapees, they tried to take a station wagon belonging to E. E. Farley and parked at his house, but were unable to get it started. They then went to the local yards and caught the next freight, a west-bound, at about 5 a.m. They were picked up as soon as they got off the train in Alpine by officers there.

The boys were returned to Sanderson by Sheriff Lee Billings and Deputy Buster Habb.

Parked next to the station wagon at Farley's house was a pickup with the keys in it.

According to a statement of the escapees, and a signed statement by John Milton Jones, Sanderson youth, Jones passed a hacksaw blade into the jail cell through a window thus permitting the prisoners to escape. Jones was picked up by local officers and is charged with aiding in the escape of prisoners.

MPs from Fort Bliss arrived here Wednesday morning on the train to return Hamrick to that army post in El Paso, but had to wait until he had been captured. They left with their prisoner on No. 1 train Wednesday evening.

Jones is being held in the local jail, as is Marshall.

Marshall's alleged partner in the charged offense of burglary was in an upstairs jail cell at the time of the escape of the other two.

It is reported that the two youths had attempted to rig a hole in the jail floor in possible escape attempts. The pair were separated following this action.

Marshall and John Beach Marble were in the cell in which a fire was extinguished last week. The fire was in a mattress in a cell on the top floor of the courthouse and one of the prisoners was almost overcome by the smoke before he could be taken from the cell.

Austin — Texas' drought relief program is in high gear again. President Eisenhower announced a double-barreled shot in the arm for cattlemen's feed buying projects.

Grain subsidies were increased from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per cwt and the aid period extended 60 days to December 31.

An additional \$5,000,000 was allocated to the hay and roughage program. This had been stalled for nearly a month after the original \$1,000,000 grant ran out. Certificates good for a \$7.50 per ton subsidy are again available to eligible livestock owners through the Farmers Home Administration.

To increase effectiveness of this project, officials said western railroads agreed to make a 50 percent reduction in freight rates on carload lots of hay sent to drought areas. Reductions were to take effect this past week-end.

Both parties lost no time in making political hay with the new farm assistance. GOP National Committeeman Jack Porter said, "This will help greatly to win Texas for the Republicans."

State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, a staunch Democrat, expressed gratitude, "regardless of the political aspects." But he pointed out that help that was needed months ago did not come until just before the election.

Both Parties Woo Texas
 Both sides are rolling out heavy artillery in one of the most feverish campaigns for Texas' electoral votes in presidential campaign history.

Doleful Senators Due Shock When Ike Wins, Fears Doc

One of the strongest Eisenhower men in our town is Doc Brown. Doc says he just can't put up with Stevenson's socialized medicine program; there are a lot of other things he doesn't like about Adlai, but that one is enough for him, he says. Doc is a pretty outspoken cuss, but he's a good doctor. At least, he's the best one in town, being the only one, and our people always call him when they get sick whether they like his politics or not.

The other day several of us were standing around in front of the post office, talking politics—some Eisenhower men and some for Stevenson—when Doc walked up looking glum. One of the Stevenson men said: "Hey, Doc, what's the trouble, did Ike just call you in some bad news?"

Doc Brown said no, he hadn't heard from Ike this week, but he was worried.

"Not about Ike, you understand," he told the Stevenson fellow. "Ike has got it made. Even the Stevenson people are beginning to admit that. Poor old Adlai isn't going to get any farther in this race than he could throw Kefauver's coonskin cap with the tail cut off."

"The ones I am worried about are these out-of-state senators who are coming down here to Texas to tell us how to vote. I sure feel sorry for those boys. It must be tough to face life with their attitude."

"To hear them tell it, this country is in a terrible shape. All the farmers are starving, all the businessmen are going broke, and all the working people are just barely making enough to keep body and soul together. The only reason some little country doesn't step in and whip us tomorrow is that they know they can just wait a few days and the United States will fold up of its own accord. That's what I understand from listening to the visiting senators."

"Of course, they know how to correct the situation overnight. Elect Adlai, and let him abolish the draft and do away with the H-bomb, and let Estes establish the Atlantic Union which he has made speeches about all over the country, and everything will be all right."

"These things are too important, of course, for these senators to waste time telling us Texans why they voted against the Texas tidelands bill."

"As a medical man, I am worried about the great shock these senators are going to get, after the election is over and Ike is re-elected and this country keeps on being peaceful, prosperous and progressive. It's liable to put them all in bed."

And Doc Brown walked off, shaking his head. Of course, the Stevenson man caught on that Doc was hurrahing him, and he didn't like it much, but he'll still have to call him the next time one of the kids gets the croup, because like I said he's the only doctor in town.
