According to the story of the escapees, they tried to take a station wagon belonging to E. E. Farley and parked at his house, but were unable to get it started. They then went to the local vards and caught he next freight, a west-bound, at bout 5 a.m. They were picked up s soon as they got off of the rain in Alpine by officers there.

The boys were returned to Sanerson by Sheriff Lee Billings and Deputy Buster Babb.

Parked next to the station wagor at Farley's house was a pickup with the keys in it.

According to a statement of the escapees, and a signed statement by John Milton Jones, Sanderson youth. Jones passed a hacksaw blade into the jail cell through a window thus permitting the pris. oners to escape. Jones was picked up by local officers and is charged with aiding in the escape of prisoners

MPs from Fort Bliss arrived here Wednesday morning on the rain to return Hamrick to that rmy post in El Paso, but had to vait until he had been captured. They left with their prisoner on No. 1 train Wednesday evening.

Grain subsidies were increased from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per cwt and El Paso Sunday after spending the the aid period extended 60 days to December 31

An additional \$5,000,000 was allocated to the hay and roughage program. This had been stalled for early a month after the original \$1,000,000 grant ran out. Certificates good for a \$7.50 per ton subsidy are again available to eligible livestock owners through the Farmers Home Administration.

To increase effectiveness of this project, officials said western railroads agreed to make a 50 percent reduction in freight rates on carload lots of hay sent to drouth areas. Reductions were to take eflect this past week-end.
