Two Thanksgivings To Choose From Nov. 29 Locally

Sanderson seems to be in the same dilemma as other towns and communities of the state with two Thanksgiving Days on their calendar. The schools are going to observe November 29 with classes to be dismissed on Tuesday and resumed on Monday, December 3.

Mrs. Jettie Peavy, secretary of the local Retail Merchants Association, stated this week that the local merchants wanted to go along with the schools in observing the last Thursday of the month.

General Election Has Big Ballot

The ballot for the general election this year will be about "the size of a saddle blanket" as in previous years. The size this year is because of the addition of the eight constitutional amendment proposals which are to be voted on at that time.

Normally, the ballot would have been smaller than usual, owing to the fact that only about half the district and county offices are to be voted on, but the amendments makes the difference.

Safety Inspection Urged Early In '57

Getting early automobile safety inspections may mean the difference between life and death, according to G. C. Morris, executive secretary of the Highway Safety Council.

During the first month of the current inspection period, which will run through April 15, only 4 per cent of the registered vehicles in Texas had been inspected.

"The importance of inspections has been proven by the Department of Public Safety statistics," Morris said. "In 1951, before the inspection law went into effect, mechanical defects were a causative factor in 19 per cent of the fatal accidents in Texas. Last year, that figure had been reduced to 5 per cent."

"These figures show beyond a doubt that a person whose car is in good mechanical condition is much less likely to be involved in a fatal accident," Morris said.

Amendment For Investment Of School Funds Talked

A triple-pronged proposal, including authorization of investment of the University Permanent Fund in corporate stocks and bonds, will be the number three amendment on the Nov. 6 ballot.

Funds for payment of construction and equipment costs at state institutions are outlined in the detailed changes proposed in the amendment.

Four colleges will be dropped

from the college building fund — financed by a five-cent ad valorem tax. Two others, Lamar Tech and Texas Southern, will be added to the building fund and future construction and equipment will be drawn by them from the fund.

The colleges dropped are Tarrant and Arlington State Colleges and Prairie View from the A&M system and Texas Western from the University of Texas system. They will all be placed under the University of Texas Permanent Fund. Their bonds will be retired, limited by a fund-ratio, from the Permanent Fund.

Bonds issued by the A&M system and the University system would be retired out of the Permanent Fund and no general revenue funds would be available to them or to the College Building Fund except in the case of "fire, flood, storm and earthquake."

Another revision in the amendment would change the purpose of a two-cent ad valorem tax to create a fund for continued payment of Confederate pensions and the creation and maintenance of a State Building Fund.

In a major departure from the present policy, the amendment would permit a controlled investment of the University Permanent Fund in corporate bonds and stocks.

Investments are now limited to bonds of the U.S., State of Texas, school bonds and city bonds.

Also included in the expanded investment policy are first lien real estate mortgages guaranteed by the federal government.

Controls on the corporate investments include:

Not more than 50 per cent of the fund could be invested at any given time;

Not more than 1 per cent could be invested in securities of any corporation;

Not more than 5 per cent of voting stock be owned in any one corporation;

To be eligible, firms would have to be incorporated in the United States and have paid dividends for 10 consecutive years, or longer, prior to purchase date;

Except for bank and insurance stocks, the corporations would

have to be listed on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

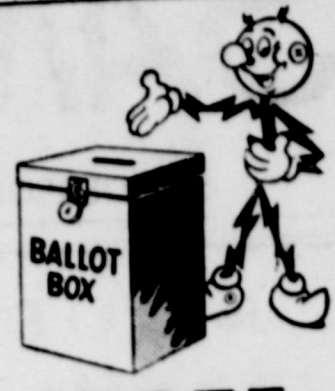

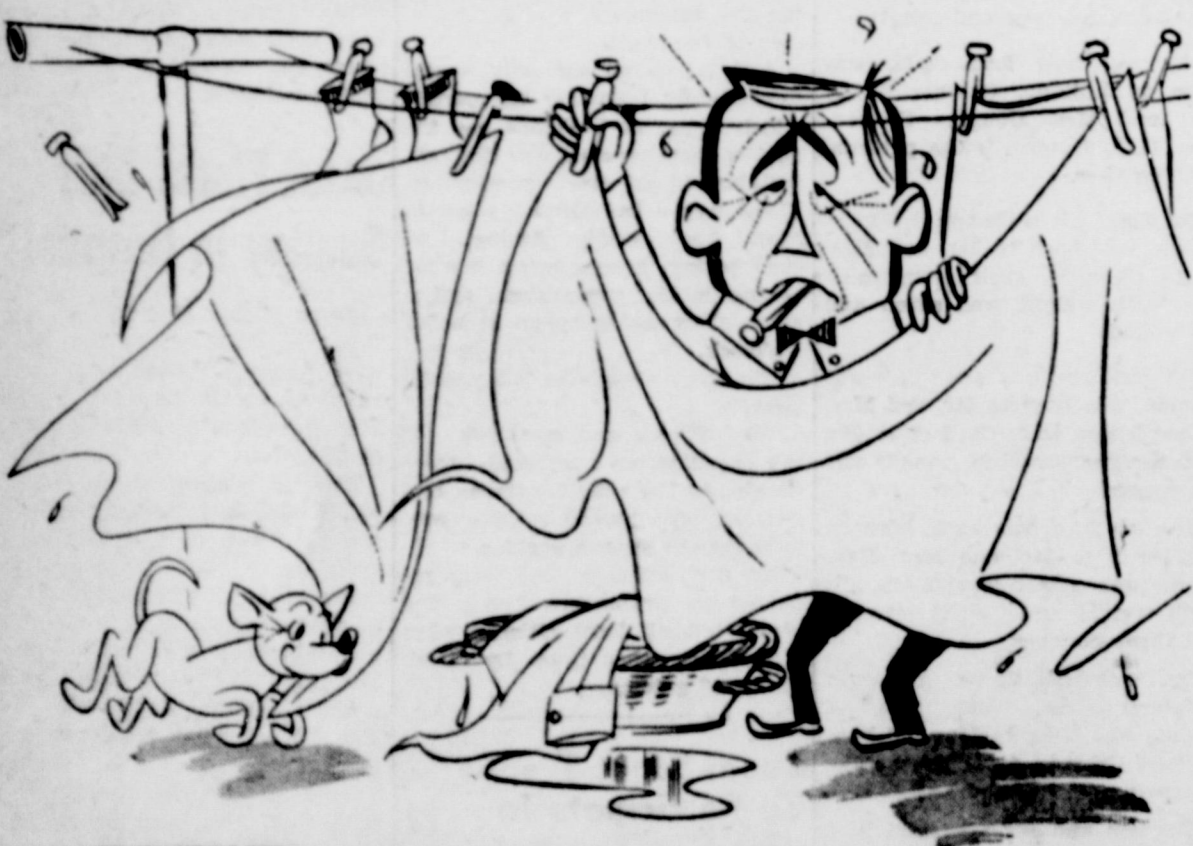

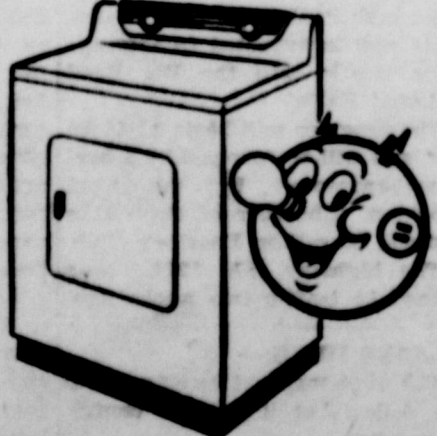

BALLOT SCRATCHING
While candidates and campaign camps are busy "scratching" for votes, voters are busy learning how to "scratch" ballots.
Ballot scratching is legal. You don't have to vote the straight ticket for any party.
All you have to do to scratch a ballot is to cross out or draw a line through the name of candidate you do not want to vote for.

2. Allows county commissioners courts to vary allocations of tax money without special elections. Pro: greater sensibility would make for greater efficiency in county financial management. Con: Commissioners courts would have too much authority.

3. Adds other colleges to the building program financed by the University of Texas Permanent Fund and authorizes investment of the fund in corporate stocks and bonds as well as government bonds. Pro: Would provide an increase in college building money without new taxes. Con: Risk involved in wider investments is not worth the possible return.

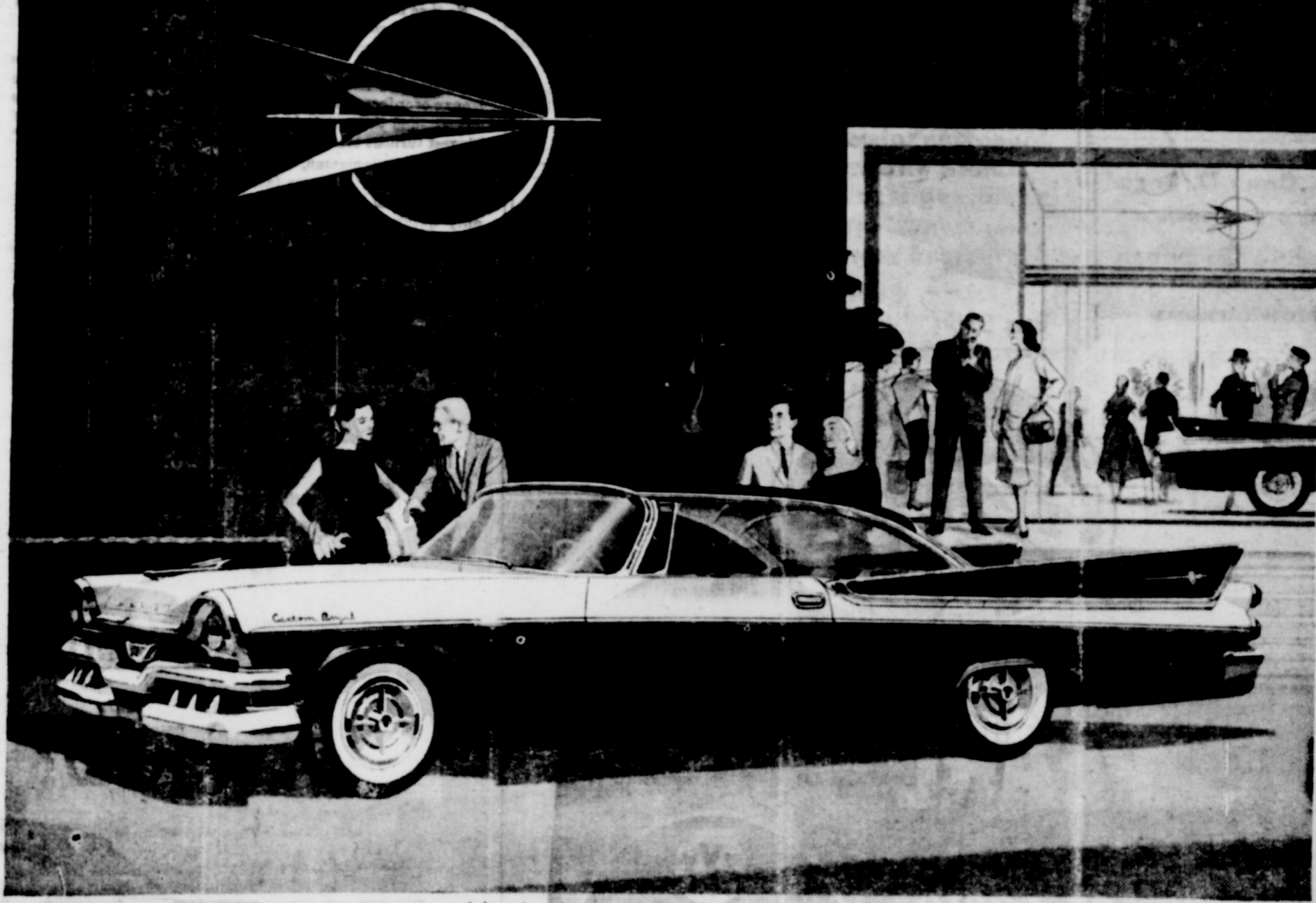

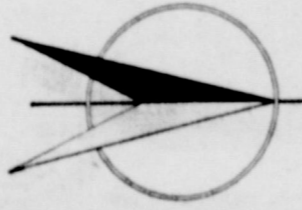
