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TV RECEPTION PLANS PROGRESS

Plans for bringing television reception to citizens of Sanderson are progressing, according to those who have been experimenting in recent weeks.

There is absolutely nothing definite yet for any future plans, according to one of the spokesmen, but hopes are high for good reception locally and further tests will be made to ascertain as nearly as possible, the potentialities of good reception.

Some inquiries have been made into the various types of equipment available to bring the reception from the tops of surrounding mountains to the sets within the homes of local viewers and further inquiries will be made along these lines, it was stated.

Extensive tests were made on the mountain south of Sanderson and reception was very good from one of the area stations for three days at various points along the mountain. Other tests have been made on the mountains to the north of town with better results from a San Antonio station.

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DEER HARVEST GOOD THIS YEAR

The deer harvest in all of the Trans-Pecos area was plentiful, according to the number of animals which were brought back by local hunters and those brought through by hunters who had come from east of here.

Some of the deer, surprisingly, were in excellent condition, and a few of the animals were in very poor condition.

As always is the case, there were some freaks in size, color, antlers, etc., and every vehicle that stopped here with deer drew at least a few local and traveling people to admire the kill.

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Steel Work Finished On Bridge Crossing

Steel work has been completed on the Pecos River bridge.

The last steel section, joining the structure that has been extended from both sides simultaneously, was riveted into place during the past week at the bridge site 42 miles northwest of Del Rio on US Highway 90.

The new bridge is 275 feet above the Pecos River and 1,270 feet long, the tallest bridge in Texas and the ninth highest in the nation.

The roadbed is 28 feet wide and will be covered with new lightweight concrete.

The bridge is expected to be completed early in March at a cost of approximately \$1,400,000.

SHS Band Rates High At Odessa Festival

1957 Car Tags Get New Look

The new look of multiple colors for automobiles will bring a change of color, too, to Texas automobile license plates in 1957.

The Highway Department abandoned the traditional orange-on-black and black-on-orange yearly alternation, and announced next year's plates will be black on a white background. The Texas Prison system now is manufacturing 4,500,000 pairs of plates and 392,000 single plates for cars, trucks, trailers, and motorcycles. New licenses are required as of next April 1.

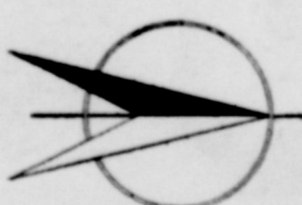


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
