FEED PROGRAM IS EXTENDED

Walter T. McKay, state director, Farmers Home Administration, this week advised G. Scott Stiles, Jr., county supervisor, of the extension of the emergency feed grain program in Terrell County. Under this extension, farmers and ranchers may now file applications through February 15, 1957, for a supply of feed grain necessary to carry their basic livestock through March 15, 1957.

Mr. McKay also advised that the emergency roughage program will be extended, however, there will be a delay in accepting applications for roughages until sometime in early January since financial aspects of the program are being worked out in Washington.

Graveside Services For Ereno Martinez

Graveside services were held in Santa Rita Cemetery Sunday for Ereno Martinez, 61, who died here Saturday after a long illness. Carroll Jackson, minister of the Sanderson Church of Christ, was the officiant for the funeral rites and music was provided by a choir from that church.

Martinez was never married and had made his home here for many years, being employed as a laborer. He had no known survivors.

Texas Gardeners Advised To Plant Rose Bushes Now

Anyone can grow roses, according to A. F. DeWert, head of the Department of floriculture at Texas A & M. They may be planted in the fall or spring. In Texas, fall planting is generally preferred. Aim for quality and you may also get quantity. Many gardeners try to grow too many varieties or too many plants. Given careful attention, DeWert says that 10 well chosen varieties will produce as many flowers and give far more pleasure than 50 poorly-tended plants.

Essentials for success with roses are: proper planting, a sunny location and well-drained soil. Start with No. 1 grade plants, and have the ground ready when the plants arrive. Make sure roots are never exposed to sunlight or drying winds.

Water plants thoroughly. Don't apply fertilizer to newly-planted bushes until the root system is well established, then feed at least twice a season. Never fertilize in late fall. Keep plants free of insects and disease with a regular spraying or dusting schedule.

TRAVEL ON US90 SETS PACE FOR RECENT TRAFFIC INCREASE OVER STATE

Recent traffic count on the major travel arteries of the state showed that U.S. 90 had the largest increase of any other route in the state, State Highway Commissioner Herb Petry told a meeting of U.S. 90 Association representatives and interested persons in Uvalde last week.

U.S. 90 travel increased 13 per cent while increase over the rest of the state was only 5 per cent, Mr. Petry said.

New Medicare Law Effective This Month

Dependents of servicemen and women of the armed forces became eligible December 7 for certain civilian medical care under Public Law 569, with the federal government paying the bills of private physicians and hospitals.

Brig. Gen. L. Holmes Ginn, 4th Army surgeon with headquarters at Fort Sam Houston has announced that Texas doctors fees for treating service dependents will be paid by the Finance Officer of Ft. Sam Houston. Bills from Texas hospitals will be processed for the government by the Mutual Benefit Health and Accident Association, Omaha, Neb.

General Ginn said that the necessary forms for administering the new law will be mailed to all Texas hospitals, and that physicians may obtain their forms from those sources. Physicians will send the bills for their services to Commanding General, Headquarters Fourth Army, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, Attention: Surgeon.

FFA Stock Show To Be January 19

Plans are being made to stage the Sanderson F.F.A. Stock Show January 19, according to information received from Gene Nelson, local F.F.A. advisor.

Tommy Tatum, county agent of Val Verde County, will judge the show.

There will be classes entered in Suffolk, Southdown, and Rambouillet rams and ewes, with a division under each for lambs, two-tooth, and aged.

There will be fine wool lambs, crossbred lambs, and mutton lambs classes in the fat lamb show of the senior F.F.A. division and the junior F.F.A. division of the show. No prize money will be awarded in the breeding stock show.

There will not be a grand champion lamb of the senior or junior show, but individual awards will be made to the top lamb in each class, according to rules set down for the show. Each of the F.F.A. shows will have lambs placed in prime, choice and good classes.

There are 37 boys enrolled in three classes of vocational agriculture in the Sanderson High School.

Seven boys are enrolled in the junior classes.

The boys are feeding 161 lambs, 150 chickens, and 6 pigs. Five of the boys are carrying breeding sheep projects to produce foundation stock for future operations.

Congressmen May Name 10 For AF Academy Exams

It was announced this week by Master Sergeant Murphy in charge of the Air Force Recruiting Office in El Paso that newly-elected members of Congress may name 10 candidates each to compete for appointments to the third class of the U.S. Air Force Academy.

These nominations will be in addition to those made by members of Congress already in office, including those leaving office next month.

Sgt. Murphy said that each Congressman has until January 31 to get their nominations into Air Force Headquarters. However, qualified young men desiring to compete should get in touch with their Senator or Representative as soon as possible, since nominating quotas are limited and time is required to process nominations.

In writing to their Congressmen, candidates should state their place of residence, outline their educational and other qualifications, and say briefly why they wish to attend the Academy.

Candidates must be at least 17 years of age and less than 22 by next July 1. They must be male citizens of the U.S., of good moral character, must never have been married, and must qualify physically for flying.

Sgt. Murphy pointed out that each candidate should take a preliminary medical examination to determine whether he has any disqualifying defect, so that, if he has a remedial defect, it may be corrected and if he has a defect that cannot be corrected, he may save time and expense of taking further examinations.

According to the Recruiting Sergeant, candidates may take such preliminary examinations at any Air Force medical installation, provided they first obtain letters authorizing examinations from the Congressmen sponsoring them or from the Director of Admissions, U.S. Air Force Academy, Denver 8, Colorado. Any travel expense must be paid by the applicant.

All nominees will be given the Air Force Medical Examination for flying training, physical and air-manship aptitude tests, and college entrance examination board tests. The 300 Cadets who will enter the Academy next July 8 will be selected finally by the Air Force.

Filing Time Due For Tax Payers

Plans for assisting taxpayers in filing 1956 Federal Income Tax returns were announced this week by Sam Haslam of the Internal Revenue Service in Del Rio.

The assistance to be rendered by the Internal Revenue Service during the filing period from January 1 to April 15 will follow the system used last year. Under this system the taxpayer fills out the form himself, or as much as he can. Assistance, if needed, is available on a group basis, and on an individual basis for those taxpayers who are incapable of preparing their own returns.

Mr. Haslam stated that the Internal Revenue Service believes most taxpayers can file their own returns after reading the comprehensive instruction book they receive in the mail.

Accountants and lawyers are advised that the necessary forms for filing the 1956 tax returns are available at local Internal Revenue Service offices.

Certain days have been designated as Taxpayer Assistance Days and are provided for those taxpayers who require help from IRS after completing their returns as far as possible.

The Taxpayer Assistance Days for Del Rio are each Monday from 3:15 a.m. to noon.

"If you have to have help," Mr. Haslam emphasized, "come on the day indicated when we will be better able to help you. Revenue Service needs to devote its time to its regular work when the offices are not open for assistance. We will have specially trained personnel available to help taxpayers on the special days."

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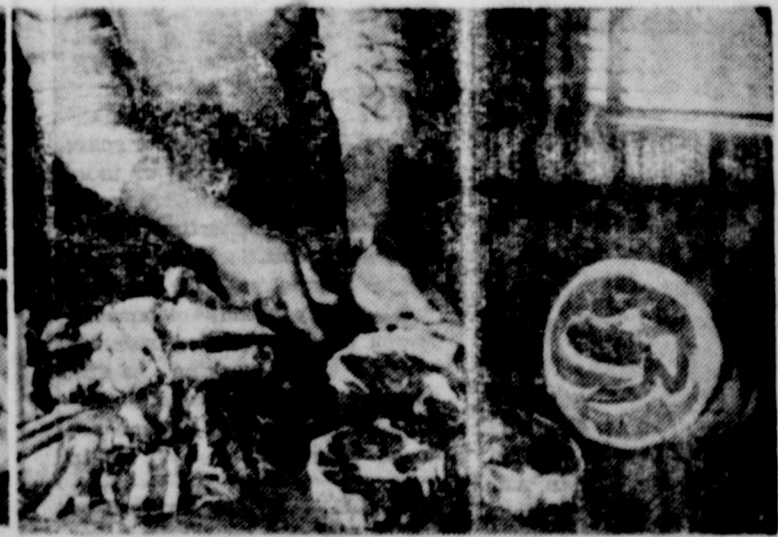
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DO-IT-YOURSELF: GET THREE MEALS FROM ONE ECONOMY BEEF POT ROAST



If your family likes beef — and who doesn't — they will love this new design for living. Simply buy a full 6th and 7th rib pot roast, divide it, before cooking, into the several cuts illustrated above and prepare each in your family's favorite way. (1) Have your butcher saw through the rib bones above the eye of fat. Hold firmly to both ends to sep-

arate the rib-eye from the outside section. Cut rib bones free and trim lean meat off. Remove thin blade cartilage and backbone. (2) Then roll outside section, fat side out, into a pot roast and skewer or tie. Cook over low temperature with moisture for best results. (3) Slice the rib-eye into 1 1/2 to 2-inch "country club" steaks which are tender

enough to broil or, if preferred, swiss. Use bones for beef stock and lean meat for stew. Wrap or cover the cuts loosely if they are to be used within a few days; freeze them if longer storage is desired. At-home fabricating saves time and money, says the Texas Beef Council and provides three or four distinctively different dinners.

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
