TV RECEPTION PLANS PROGRESS

Hopes have been high for local television reception during the past few weeks and recent developments point toward the fulfillment of those hopes.

The non-commercial venture by James Word, John Huey, Rev. Gene Medaris, and others, has progressed to the stage where the group is now considering ways and means of securing a translator to bring the television waves into Sanderson and be available to local citizens.

John Burchett, and others, have completed the erection of a tower on one of the mountains north of town and have been testing reception with a receiver at that point.

Both of the groups have reported good reception from a San Antonio station and both have stated that the possibility of reception from other transmitters is highly possible.

The John Burchett venture will go to pick up the television waves on the mountain tower and bring the reception into town by the use of a cable and boosters. This system of reception will be similar to electricity or telephone in that each subscriber will have a line to his house or business and will pay a tie-in fee and a monthly rental on the line. Lack of a feed line to each receiver would prohibit reception from that source.

The other plan is to erect a translator on the mountain at the site of the antenna. The translator is a combined receiver and transmitter, and any person with a receiving set in the range of the translator (10 miles) would be able to pick up reception.

Popular Electronics, a magazine on radio and TV data, stated the translator permits reception in land-locked regions as good as reception is at the site of the unit.

The article continues "The translator receives any v.f. channel (within its range) on channels 2 to 13, or may pick up v.h.f. channels (within range) and in turn beam them out on channels 70 through 83.

"The equipment may be owned or used as a community utility, financed by a fund that could be..."

Most Tax Payers Should Be Able To Fill Out Returns

"Self-help" in the preparation of Federal Income Tax returns for 1956 was urged this week by Sam Haslam of the Internal Revenue Service office in Del Rio.

"The vast majority of taxpayers in this area should be able to prepare their own returns with an hour or two, by assembling their financial records of last year.

With the 1956 tax form, simplified instruction booklet, cancelled checks and receipts on hand, the job of computing tax due Uncle Sam should be comparatively easy for most of us," Mr. Haslam says.

The IRS representative advised taxpayers to first group their checks and receipts for interest payments, taxes, medical expenses, etc., in the same order in which they appear in the tax form instruction booklet, then calculate for possible refund or additional tax due.

Taxpayers with only minor deductible expenses incurred during 1956 will of course find it best to take the flat 10 per cent allowable deduction. Few problems arise in the preparation of these returns.

"Most taxpayers," he said, "even figuring all deductions and exemptions will find preparation of the proper form a reasonably simple task." Taxpayers whose incomes were less than \$5,000 in 1956 may use the punch-card simplified Form 1040-A.

Any taxpayer figuring his own taxes must, however, use one of the various types of Form 1040. These are available at the Del Rio IRS office and at most banks and post offices. Employers must furnish withholding statements, Form W-2's.

School Census Is Under Way

Mrs. W. J. Ferguson is again taking a school census during the month of January. The law requires that all children living in the district during the month of January be registered if they will be six and under 18 years of age on September 1, 1957.

Any children who are missed by the census-taker should be reported to the superintendent's office before February 1.

All children of census age must be registered even if they are not attending school.

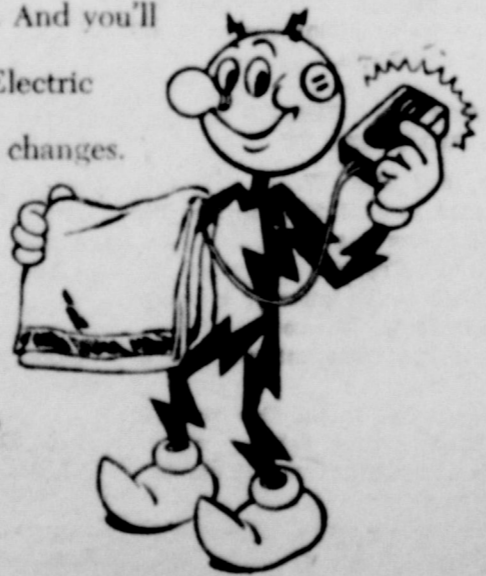

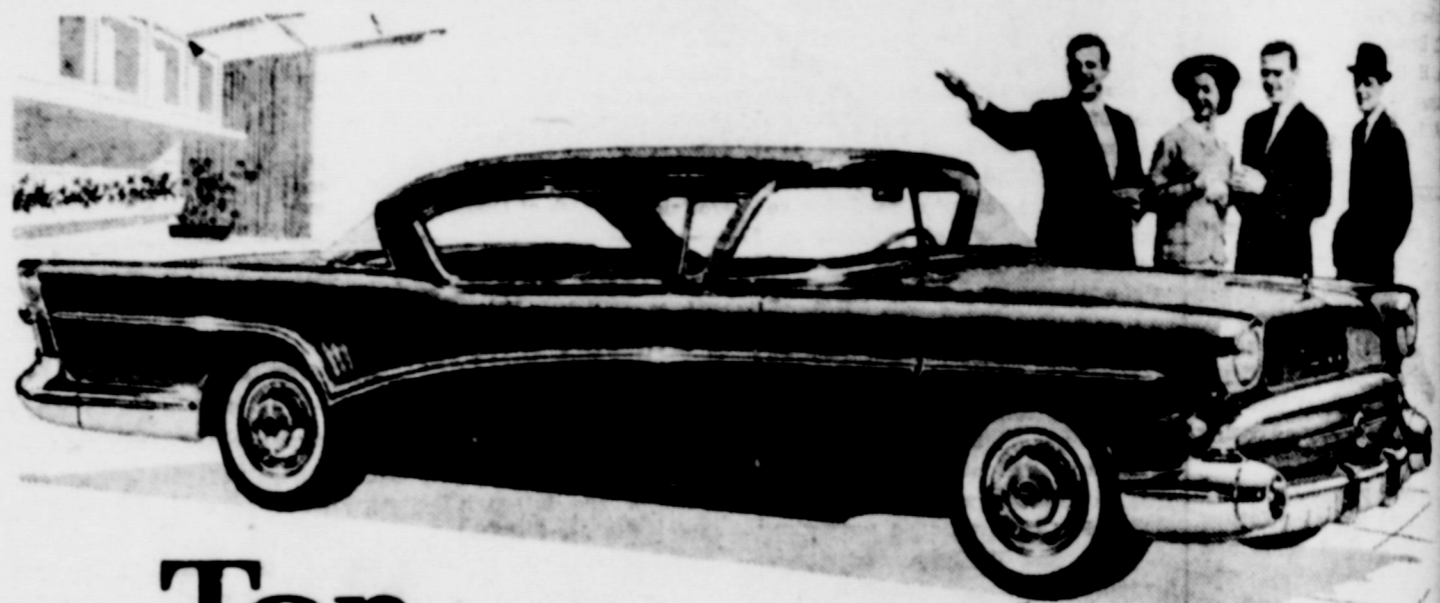

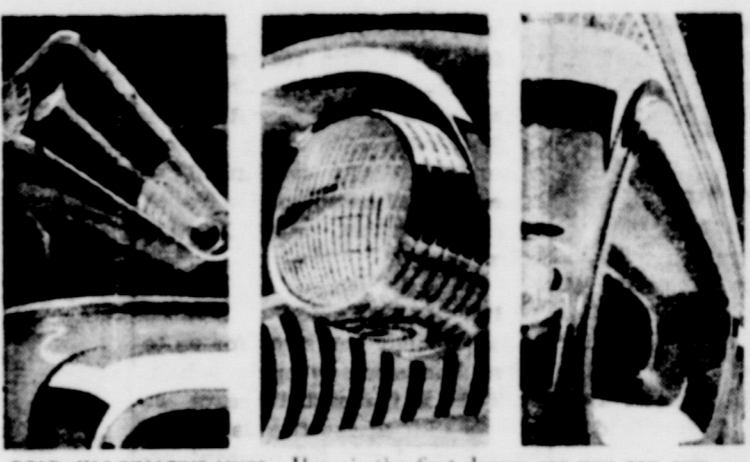

Fabulous Estate Is Setting For Film 'The Swan'

The estate of the late George W. Vanderbilt in Asheville, N. C., one of the most fabulous homes in America, opened its doors to Hollywood actors, technicians and cameras for the first time when studios were permitted to film the 400-room chateau, known as Biltmore House, and its surroundings of more than 12,000 acres for "The Swan".

The romantic comedy concerns the attempts of a girl to land a prince in matrimony when he visits her castle. The show stars Grace Kelly, Alec Guinness and Louis Jourdan.

Movie producers searched far and wide for a house magnificent enough to serve as the princess' castle, and Biltmore House proved the ideal choice. More than 100 persons were on location for the filming scenes.

Inspired by the great Renaissance chateaux of France, the house, completed in 1895 after five years of construction, cost more than \$7,000,000. It contains 50 guest rooms, each with a private bath, an indoor and an outdoor swimming pool, a bowling alley and a game room large enough for six billiard tables.

The banquet hall is 72 feet long and has a ceiling reaching a height of 75 feet. A 90 foot long Tapestry Gallery contains 15th Century Flemish tapestries and paintings. The large library, containing more than 20,000 volumes, is dominated by a ceiling painted by Tiepolo, last outstanding artist of the Venetian school. The canvas which covers almost the entire ceiling, was obtained from an Italian palace.

The estate originally consisted of 100,000 acres. After Mr. Vanderbilt's death in 1914, his widow granted a large part of the forest area to the United States government to be used as the nucleus of Pisgah National Forest.

Biltmore House was designed by Richard M. Hunt, one of the most famous architects of his day, with the landscaping planned by Frederick Law Olmstead, the man responsible for New York's Central Park.

New Law May Save Ranchers' Tax Dollars

Many area ranchmen can save tax dollars this year by taking advantage of all allowable deductions, according to information received recently.

A new law of particular interest this year is the one concerning the sale of breeding, dairy or draft animals because of drought. Under certain conditions the profit from such sales will not be taxed.

New fast depreciation methods can reduce current taxes. And when you fail to take depreciation that deduction is gone forever; it cannot be made up in future years. Reporting the sale of all qualifying livestock as the sale of capital assets instead of reporting the sale as ordinary income, will sharply lower tax liability.

These subjects and many others are treated in the new "1956 Farmer's Tax Guide," now available at the office of county agents. Arranged for easy finding, it explains how to handle most tax problems that ranchmen face.

Some ranchmen have lost money this past year and will not owe any taxes. When there is no tax liability some farmers in the past have tended to neglect taking all allowable deductions. This is usually a mistake. It was pointed out that the losses can now be carried backward for two years and carried forward for as many as five years. Sooner or later these current losses should permit the taxpayer to either get a refund or give him a deduction on future tax bills.

set up by individuals or by local governments.

"Anyone holding a commercial radio operator's license of any grade may be put in charge of the translator, supervising it by remote control. The translator is used strictly to repeat programs of existing TV stations and may not originate its own program material. The only signal it may originate is its own station identification, which is transmitted at regular intervals by an automatic device.

The article concludes: "The translator does not interfere with existing TV signals on authorized channels. The transmitted signals are free of snow, 'hot' or 'blind' spots, and image blemishes.

The information available on the use of cable and boosters is that the boosters maintain the strength and quality of the sound and picture from the antenna to the receiving set, thus reproducing an image and sound equal to that which would be received at the site of the antenna.

The installation of either of the proposed systems for use by local viewers would entail the expenditure of a considerable sum of money which would either be repaid by a monthly charge to the users or by a contribution for the installation and maintenance by those with receiving sets.

Further details of the two plans will be released as the plans progress.

Some individuals have been seeing television from a portable set on top of Big Hill, 10 miles north of Sanderson by the use of a portable generator for the set, or by using an inverter from regular storage batteries. Reception at all of the testing points around Sanderson has been reported "very good" in picture and sound quality.
