Work Progressing On Local Projects

Work is progressing on the several projects under construction and beginning locally.

The motel and two-story house being constructed east of town by Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Weigand is bearing final stages with the exterior work completed on the motel units and a large portion of the house exterior completed.

The motel units have a canopy running the full length of the eight units on each side of a V shape, with the house on the back of the property at the apex of the V. Each of the units will have a bath and shower combination in a tile bathroom, individual refrigerated air coolers and central heating, which also will furnish heat for the house. The buildings are all of cinder block.

The second story of the house, smaller than the first story, will be of frame construction.

A swimming pool is also planned for the motel.

The service station on the corner of Oak and Persimmon which is under construction is yet in the preliminary stages.

The lot has been excavated to the desired depth, the tanks for gasoline storage have been installed and plumbing is being completed on the tanks. Work is also in progress for forms for concrete installations.

Machinery for concrete work at the station has been moved in to the location and the work will progress with suitable weather.

The tanks are on location at the proposed site of Slim's Truck Stop east of town and work is expected to begin soon on clearing the lot and the tank installation.

The houses of Sanderson under construction are progressing rapidly and according to schedule.

Interior work is being completed on the new home for Mr. and Mrs. Troy Druse on East Kerr St. The house is stuccoed cinder block with slate-colored siding on the lower portion and a planter in front.

The foundation has been poured in the new home for Mr. and Mrs. Ben Ed Martin on the corner of Persimmon and Hackberry. The rough-in work for plumbing has been completed and work on the exterior will begin soon.

Remodelling of the Jack Riggs' home is progressing with the walls and roof of the new addition up and walls of the old part of the house ready for stuccoing.

The work on the Ray Caldwell home is virtually completed and includes the addition of a utility room and porch on the west side, alterations to the interior and exterior and complete interior redecorating.

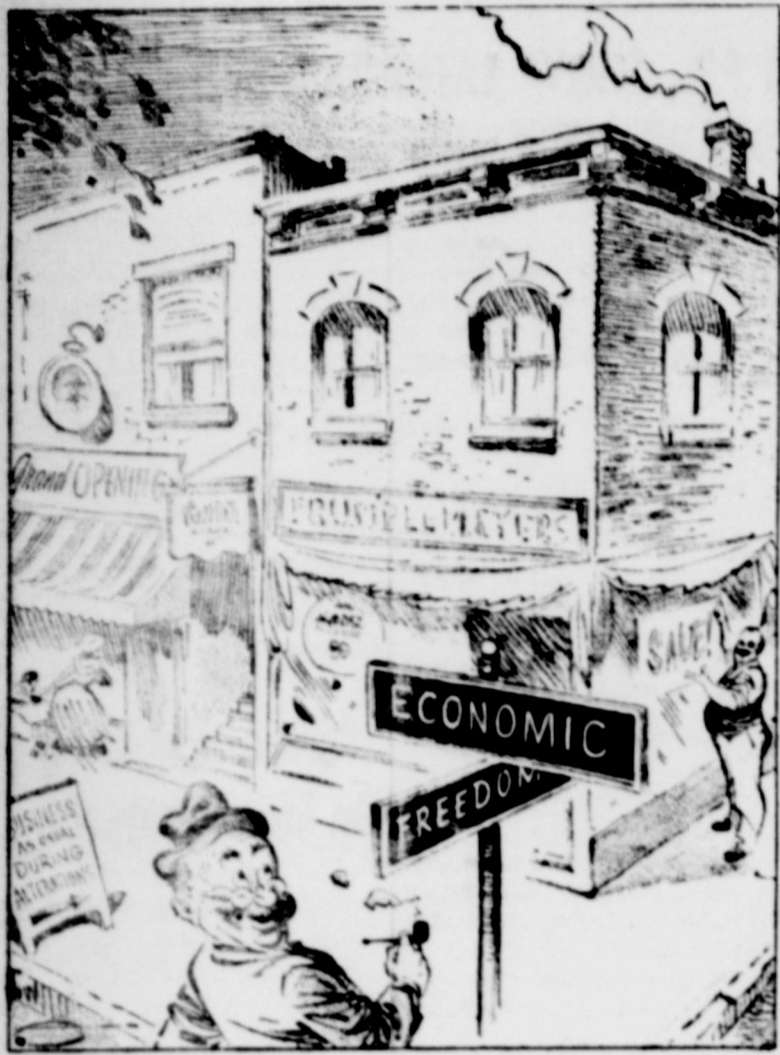

6 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
1 egg yolk, unbeaten

Cream butter, then add sugar gradually, blending well. Add melted chocolate and egg yolk; mix thoroughly. Spread on top of chilled cream or chiffon pie. Chill until ready to serve. Make enough topping for 8- or 9-inch pie.

Coconut Cream Filling. Empty contents of one package coconut cream pudding and pie filling mix into saucepan. Add 2 cups milk gradually, blending well. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened (about 5 minutes). Cool slightly (about 5 minutes), stirring once or twice. Turn into baked 8-inch pie shell. Chill and frost with Chocolate Topping. (ANS)

Officer Commissions Offered in WAC

Women between the ages of 20 and 32 are now being offered a direct commission as a 2nd Lt. or 1st Lt. in the Women's Army Corps. A commission as 2nd Lt. will be offered to women between the ages of 20 and 27 with four years of college and to women with at least two years of college with some business experience.

Those women selected will attend a five-month course of instruction at Fort McClellan, Ala., during which time they will receive orientation on the duties and responsibilities of an officer. Following this five-month school they may be assigned anywhere in the world.
