MORE RAIN FALLS IN PART OF COUNTY

More rain fell in Terrell County last week-end to boost the precipitation received this year and help the feed conditions on ranges of the area.

Most of the rain reported fell in the mid-eastern part of the county on Herbert Brown, Reg Monroe and to the south from there. The rains were lighter to the north. The Banners, who ranch on the Pecos River, were water-bound for several days because of the rain that fell and damage to the roads which resulted. Over three inches was reported falling in some parts of that section. Rains were also reported southeast of Dryden on the Roy Earlsdale ranch.

The rainfall diminished toward Sanderson where only 1-inch fell Friday morning early. There were substantial rains reported in the north part of the county on Circle Dot ranch, G. K. Mitchell ranch and through that area.

A trace of rain fell Saturday morning early locally with light showers falling to the north.

Several days during the past week heavy fog enveloped the hills around Sanderson early in the morning, disappearing toward mid-morning and remaining clear and bright the rest of the day.

Thursday dawned with a heavy overcast with a slight east wind, warm weather, giving a promise of possibilities of rain.

Slim's Truck Stop To Open Next Week

Slim's Truck Stop will be open for business next week, according to an announcement made this week by the operator, L. E. "Slim" Muller.

Muller stated that more work was necessary for the completion of the station, but he would have facilities ready for servicing any and all vehicles that came in for fuel of any kind.

Painting of the station is underway this week and leveling the premises is expected to be completed this week.

The truck stop is said to be one of the largest on U.S. 90 between El Paso and San Antonio. It will have bunk houses with showers for truckers. There will be a short-order cafe in the station which will be open 24 hours.

Installation of the boiler at the Western Hills Motel is the final stage of work necessary prior to opening that business, according to F. A. Weigand, operator. That work is expected to be finished by the end of next week. Carpentry was laid in all of the rooms of the motel last week and furniture has been installed.

Work is progressing on the swimming pool at the motel. The pool will be 20 x 40 feet. There will be a section 16 x 20 feet with eight feet of water and the balance will be shallow water, gradually sloping to the other extreme. There will be an abrupt slope separating the eight-foot depth from the balance of the pool and a rope will separate the deep water from the shallow water.

The pool will be plaster finish with a filter system and will have a diving board in the deep end of the pool.

Mr. Weigand stated that the facilities of the swimming pool will be available only to those who rent cabins in his motel.

Interior finish work is still progressing on the new home of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Jones. The home is north of the highway west of town and sets on the lower slope of the hill.

TV ENGINEERS DUE HERE NEXT WEEK

Television engineers will be in Sanderson the first of next week to ascertain the possibility of bringing television reception into Sanderson, according to James Word. The engineers will check the installation of the translator unit at Alpine and will come to Sanderson immediately following their work in that city.

The local group of television prospectors have had their unit set up on Big Hill, 10 miles northwest of Sanderson, for several weeks and plan to use the installation there as the first basis for the possibility of transmitting the television beam into Sanderson.

Other possible locations will also be checked by the engineers.

The local group stated that the reception on Big Hill had maintained a near-perfect condition for the time they had been testing and reception had been near-perfect under all phases of testing at that location, including testing without an antenna. The rabbit-ears-type antenna will be tested this week.

Word stated that any citizen interested in seeing television at the testing point is welcomed to go out any time that it is convenient with one of the local group. Inquiries may be made from Word, John Huey, Clyde Carter, or Rev. Gene Medaris.

The type of reception possible in Sanderson, so the group says, is entirely dependent upon the type of reception available at the reception and transmitting point. Because of this fact, they continued, those who are interested may see for themselves the type of reception that is available at the present experimental site.

Results of the findings of the engineers will be released as soon as they are available.

R. T. Key's Father Dies In Ingram

Funeral services were held last Wednesday for James Floyd Key in Ingram with burial in that city. Mr. Key, 90, suffered a stroke on Sunday and died Monday at his home.

Born in Molten, Texas, he had ranched in Schleicher and Sutton Counties for many years, later moving to Kerrville where he continued his ranching activities until his retirement.

He was married to Miss Lidie Tarlton in Willow City in 1890. Also surviving are five sons, Rhuben Key of Sanderson and Alpine, Roy of Ingram, Fred of Mason, Glynn of Johnson City, and Sam of Pearsall; two daughters, Mrs. Eula Floyd of Kerrville, and Mrs. W. S. Brown of Flagstaff, Ariz.; also 21 grandchildren and 28 great-grandchildren.

Mr. Key was called to his father's bedside and remained for the funeral services, but Mrs. Key, who is recuperating from major surgery, was unable to go on the trip.

It was advised that each rancher study the new rules and regulations and get a new statement to the San Angelo, Pecos or El Paso office as soon as possible.

Representatives from the Texas Employment Commission will be in Sanderson at the Peavy Insurance Agency April 30 at 1 p.m. to assist ranchers with the new statements. It is necessary that they meet the rancher during the afternoon and give them this information.

"Sine die" is the magic phrase around the Capitol nowadays. It's the phrase traditionally applied to the final adjournment time agreed on by both houses of the Legislature.

Only three weeks remain of the 120 days recommended in the Constitution for sessions. After that (May 7) lawmakers' pay stops.

Sentiment appears strong for a sine die resolution set on or very near that deadline. It's been a rough session, say many members.

Investigations, bribery charges, counter-charges and threat of

more have frayed nerves, provoked hot words, deep rifts.

They've made it harder to plow through the usual hundreds of the measures requiring study, debate, and some sort of agreement. Many are still backed up in discouraging stacks.

Even so, say members, they hope to shove through the "musts" and go home on time. But likely differences of opinion on what constitutes "musts" promise even more tension and temper for the final weeks.

Teacher Raise

One of the biggest issues still gathering steam in the Legislature is the teacher pay raise. Despite strong backing, the drive has been beset with stumbling blocks.

Public school teachers want a \$399-a-year boost. Total cost for the biennium is variously estimated from \$45,000,000 to \$70,000,000.

Sponsors have become increasingly impatient of delays. Bill was stymied by House rule which prohibits consideration of any other spending bill until the general appropriations bill is approved. This is in conference committee.

Then the attorney general ruled the teachers' bill was not an appropriation bill. This seemingly opened the door to quicker action. But budget-watchers intervened. They said passage of the teacher bill would first leave the treasury \$20,000,000 short of enough to cover the general appropriations bill.

This focused attention on Rep. Tom Joseph's "just in case its

needed" tax bill. It would tax dedicate natural gas reserves, produce an estimated \$35,000,000 in two years. Gov. Price Daniel had recommended a levy of this sort should more revenue be needed.

But this one, by some slip, was introduced without an enacting clause. Joseph sought necessary two-thirds House vote to permit a correction. Vote was 68-66 against Ethics Bill Zips Out

After weeks of haggling in the House, the code of ethics bill whizzed through the Senate in one day

It goes to the governor's desk with a 29-0 approval.

Bill provides that no legislator, state official or employee shall engage in any outside activity "in substantial conflict with the public interest." Penalty is expulsion or dismissal.

Narcotics Bill Passed

A possible death penalty for dope peddlers seems almost certain to become law.

House and Senate have passed the bill which was recommended by Gov. Price Daniel. It would permit juries to assess the death penalty on second conviction for sale of any narcotic drug to a minor.

Auto Registration Tax

State car taxing system would be hauled under a measure which won preliminary House approval.

If passed, the constitutional amendment would abolish the property tax on motor vehicles. Legislature would be given the authority to increase registration fees by one-third. Revenue would be divided between school districts and city or county.

Meanwhile, Texas Research League released a study suggesting further revision of the registration laws. License fees based on weight result in inequities, said the League. It proposed a flat fee for all size cars.

Farm Bill Shelved

A bill to replace Commissioner of Agriculture John White's office with a 21-member board went to House sub-committee.

White declared the bill was dead. Hearing brought prolonged and (Continued to page four)

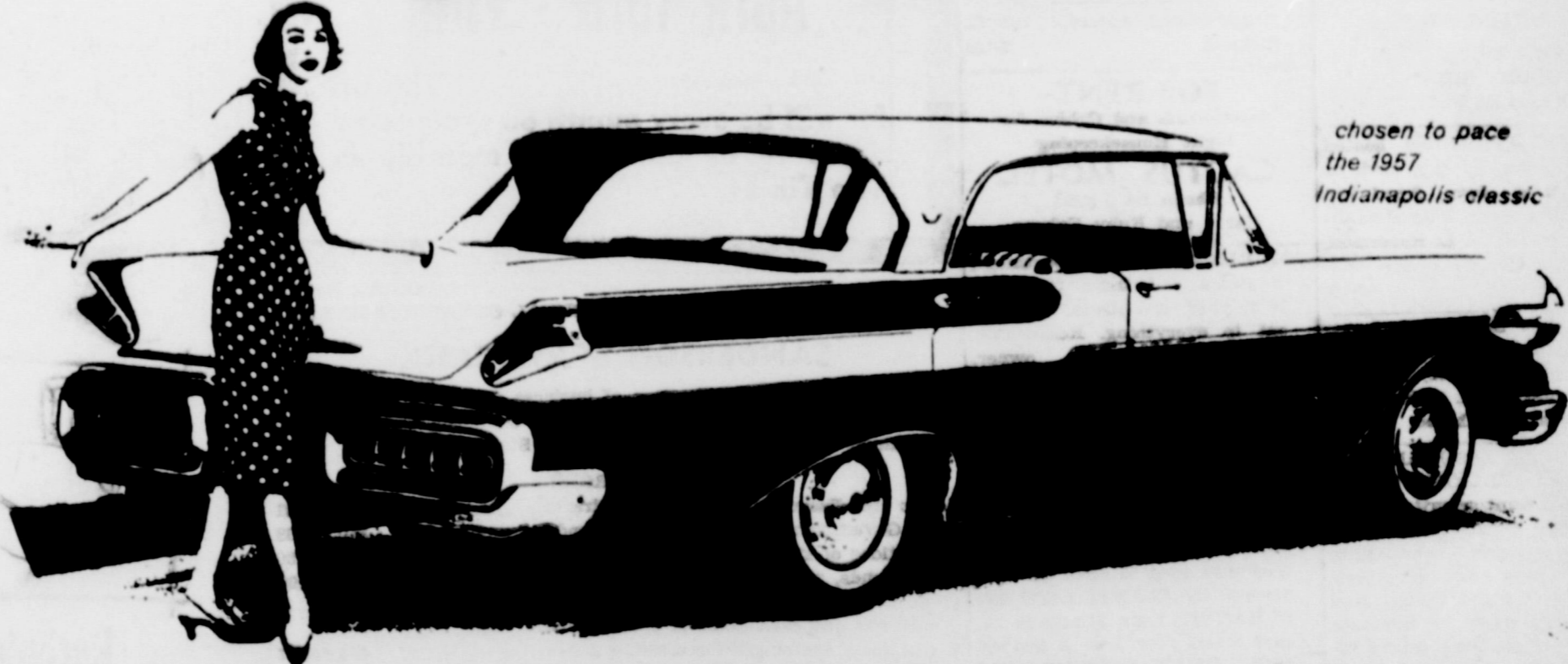
