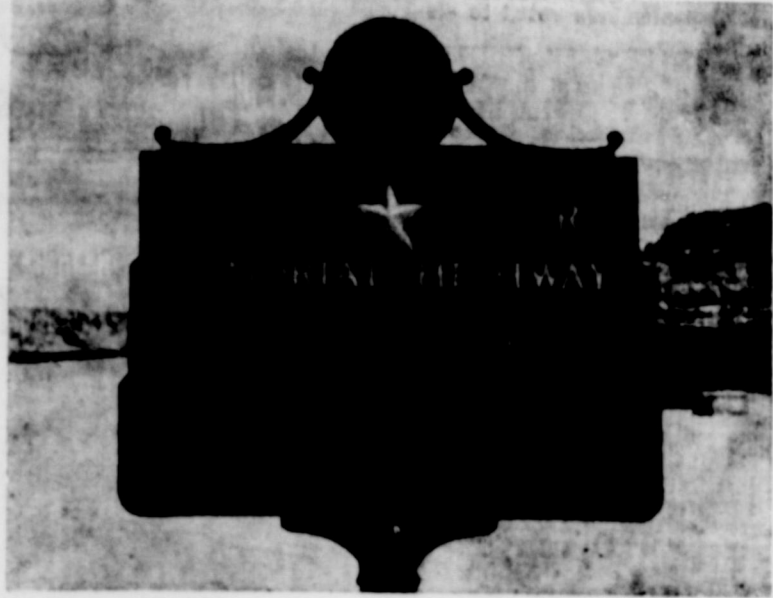

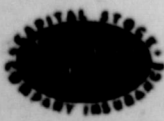

We also have heard of the promise of another geological crew coming to Sanderson within the near future. If there is anyone who has any ideas as to ways or means of providing accommodations for another group there are those in town, including us, who would like to know about it.

It seems tragic that a town suffers with growing pains when no more than five families come in.

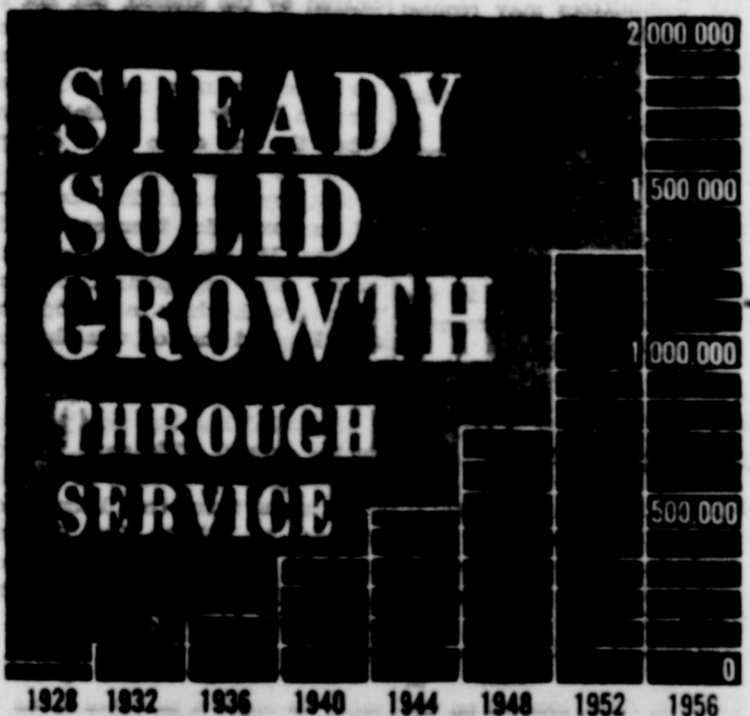

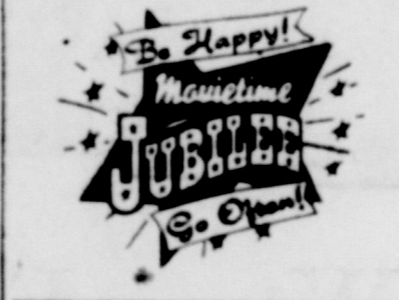
