SOME OIL, GAS HIT AT BROWN-BASSETT

Information was received last week-end that the Brown-Basnett No. 1 wildcat in the eastern part of the county had hit some oil and gas on a 2-hour drillstem test in a section from 3,637-3,667 feet. Recovery was reported to be 60 feet of slightly gascut mud with 10 per cent oil and no water. The formation was reported to be in the Wolfcamp. The well is drilling below 3,700 feet and is located in section 218 of Block Y.

Lions Push Effort For Patrolman Here

The Sanderson Lions Club last week initiated efforts to secure a Texas Highway Patrolman for this immediate vicinity.

It was brought out that with the continued increase in traffic through this area there was the likelihood of the necessity of patrolmen on the highways merging here both because of emergencies which might arise concerning the traveling public, and the possible prevention of traffic accidents or the arrest of violators.

It was pointed out that the closest patrolmen stationed near Sanderson were at Fort Stockton, 64 miles, and Alpine, 85 miles, and that serious highway accidents, often requiring the presence of a patrolman, might be several hours in obtaining the services of a patrolman, due to availability, etc.

The club officers contacted Capt. Wilson E. Speir in Pecos in their plea, and also wrote to the Chief of Highway Patrolmen in Austin.

The Lions will also solicit the aid of other clubs in their efforts.

Teenage Driving Rules Released

The State Department of Public Safety last week released application forms for teenage driver licenses that will assure strict compliance with new regulations applying to 14 and 15-year olds.

The law passed by the last Legislature permits issuance of licenses to youngsters who have completed an approved driver training course in school but restricts all others to emergencies or hardship cases.

A certificate from the youth's school superintendent stating that the applicant has passed an approved driver training course as part of his regular school curriculum will entitle him to a license on passage of the regular driving examination.

All other applicants will be required to fill in the new department form for an emergency license, which must be notarized and mailed to the drivers license division of the Department of Public Safety in Austin.

The application for a minor must be made by a parent, guardian or person having custody of a minor. An employer or county judge is authorized to apply in behalf of the minor in the absence of the former persons.

Questions listed on the application form include: Are you fully aware that this application is required for the protection of minors and others due to the fact that too many persons under the age of 16 years who do not need to drive are being injured or a skilled in traffic accidents? What is the nature and duration of the emergency for which the license is required? In what manner will the issuance of a license relieve unusual economic hardship? What members of the family are in ill health health, the nature of the illness, name of physician in charge and approximate date of expected recovery? In what manner is the welfare of the applicant or his family now suffering because he cannot drive?

In addition, the applicant is required to list the names and ages of all other drivers in the household, reasons why other drivers cannot do the driving for the minor and a description of the driving that will be necessary.

Names and addresses of two related to the minor and who can verify the circumstances of the application are also required. The division's decision on applications will be returned to applicants. If approved they will entitle the youth to a license on passage of the driver's test.

HOT, DRY WEEK HITS SANDERSON

A hot dry week has been lingering in the Sanderson area, with few showers reported last week-end and on Tuesday night in areas around Sanderson and in the county.

Last Saturday afternoon rain fell west of town and 80 was reported at the S. L. Stumberg headquarters, with lesser amounts east and west from the house for about a four-mile stretch. The rain did not extend to the south side. W. R. Sutmberg reported only a light shower on his ranch.

Big Canyon ran that afternoon late and Saturday night indicating heavy showers falling on the West-Pyle Cattle Co. north of Longfellow.

The cloud which came from the west split with a part going to the north and a part going to the south of Sanderson. Some rain fell south of here, but most probably in Mexico.

A light shower, leaving only a trace of moisture, fell here Saturday afternoon late. Heavy lightning could be seen in the east and south of east and some rain fell in the area south and west of Dryden.

Dryden is reported to have gotten a light shower Tuesday night. Heavy lightning was visible in the east.

Temperatures have been ranging near 100 since Saturday and an uncommon amount of humidity has been noticed in the air, making air-conditioners less effective in trying to cope with the excessive heat.

A light to moderate east wind blowing up in the late afternoon has helped to cool off local residents.

Considerable drying up of grass and weeds has been reported in the Dryden area and westward since Saturday.

Flies are reported to be hitting area ranchmen and increasing number of screw-worm cases are reported.

Two Foxes Killed Here Recently

Two foxes have been killed in Sanderson within recent days and the consensus was they were "sure" to have been rabid.

Chester Darr, who resides on the edge of Sanderson on the Fort Stockton highway, was reported to have found a fox asleep on his front porch. He killed the animal immediately. It was thought to have been the same fox which earlier had gotten away after having invaded his yard previously. The fox was very skinny, according to the report, and followed the pattern of "crazy" actions.

Another fox came into the yard of the L. W. Welch home recently and was killed. This animal also failed to indicate any of the instinctive traits of fear or regard for his own safety from people or animals.

Several reports of the killing of copperheads locally have been coming in and local citizens are warned to watch for them in their yards and near areas where children play. Gardens, large shaded and damp areas are also considered possible danger spots for the snakes.

All of the snake reports have come from the north part of town.

Austin Nance has killed two copperheads in his yard, O. J. Cresswell has killed one, Herbert Brown killed a small rattler at his front door step.

Youth Caught After Theft at Cafe Here Tuesday Morning

Theft of about \$40 in cash and a billfold belonging to Mrs. Ruben Rodriguez was reported Tuesday morning to local officers.

Mrs. Rodriguez, operator of the Acapulco Cafe, told local officers that a man who had been hired as a dishwasher in the cafe took approximately \$40 in cash and the billfold and ran from the cafe. She followed him to near the roundhouse and, fearing to go further, returned to the cafe and later decided to inform local officers. Lee Billings, sheriff, dispatched Deputy Buster Babb on horseback up the Sanderson Canyon east, and with others patrolled the area north of the tracks on foot and in his car.

Babb worked out all the headers from the canyon south of Sanderson and neither reported any sign of the suspect.

The trailing search was abandoned after noon, and officers alerted neighboring towns to be on the lookout for the suspect.

The suspect, a Mexican national of 15 years of age, was apprehended at a switch west of Pumpville late Tuesday afternoon by local immigration officers.

On a routine check of freight trains as one left the local yards, a person was seen in a bunker. The officers ascertained the first stop of the freight and went to the switch to question the individual. He was found hiding under a house trailer loaded on a flat car. Questioning proved him to be a Mexican national and identification of the youth as the theft suspect was made by Mrs. Rodriguez.

The billfold and \$37 found on the youth were returned to the cafe owner. Immigration officers jailed him and he is being held for deportation.

becoming a concern for people here. Several reports of copperheads and rattlesnakes in yards have come in to us and more reports of animals "sure" to be rabid have also come in. This calls for some concern.

Weeds and tall grass on vacant lots could be serving a twofold purpose. They could be the hiding place for snakes, and also could conceal the approach of animals up to houses. They are also nuisances and eyesores. They should be eliminated if at all possible.

Parents are warned to watch constantly and warn children to do the same, for wild animals coming up to houses and in yards.

All cats and dogs, not familiar to children, should be avoided and especially strange-acting domestic pets.

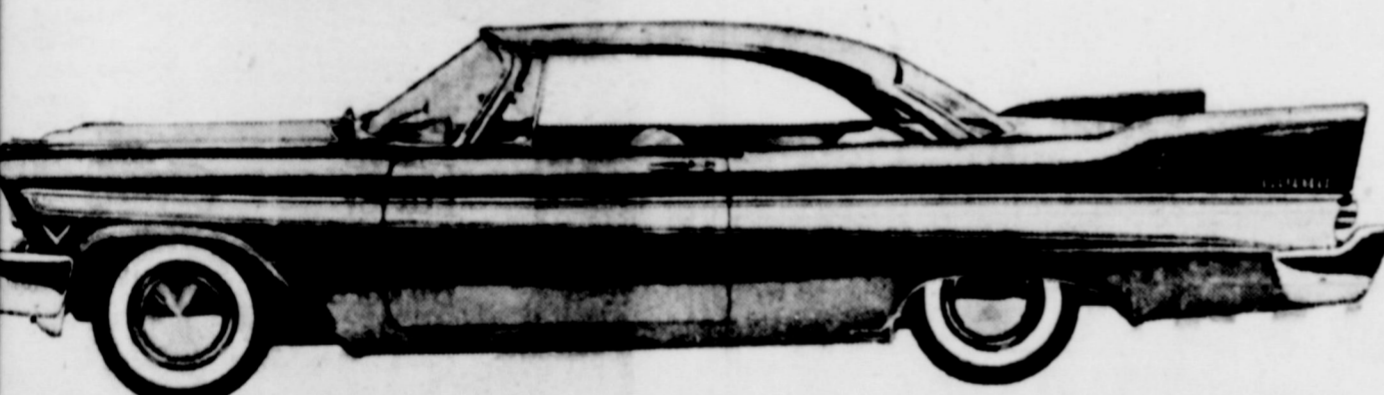
