

Ranchmen Report Grass Burned By Continued Drouth

Ranchmen are reporting that the grass and weeds on their ranges are burning up as a result of continued heat and lack of

Late May and early June rainfalls indicated the possibility of the drouth having been broken in this section of West Texas.

The moisture that fell brought a quick growth of weeds and brush that made a definite change in the appearance of the ranges of this area. The ranchmen began thinking and talking in terms of the end of the drouth since the elements looked so good.

Ranchmen report that the grass that is left has become powdery dry and lacks strength to sustain the animals in the manner of green and moistureladen grass and weeds.

Cloudy skies this week have brought some cooler weather to this area, and better prospects of rain, but no moisture has been reported near Sanderson in several weeks.

The latest rains reported were in the area east of Marathon and did not reach into Terrell Coun-

Some lambs have been sold from area ranches with prices ranging from 17c to 21c per pound, according to reports, with medium weight to light weight lambs coming from the flocks.

The sheep population of the county is lowest probably in the history of the county, according to information received.

\$252,690.49 Paid **County Ranchers In** Incentive Payments

Terrell County ranchmen are jingling nearly a quarter of a million dollars in government incentive pay on their 1956 wool receipts up to the government guaranteed support price of 62

cents per pound. Checks were mailed out last week from the local ASC office to approximately 115 producers of wool and lambs in the total sum of \$252,690.49, representing 40 percent of the sale price for the 1956 clip in this county, plus 71 cents per 100 pounds of unshorn lambs sold in the same

The payment at 40 percent was fixed on the basis of the national average price of the 1959 wool clip, which was found to be that much below the 62 cents

per pound support price. On their shorn wool sold last year. Terrell County ranchmen received \$228,664.06 and on unshorn lambs sold, \$24,026.43, For the promotion of wool and lambs in an advertising campaign by the National Wool Council, a total of \$12,987.87 was deducted from payments to the ranchers, who agreed in a nationwide referendum to allow such deduction.

On the basis of the incentive pay figures. Terrell ranchmen sold a total of 1,130,752 pounds of shorn wool last year for the total price of \$572,066.26.

It is thought that Terreli est in the nation in the amount of wool incentive pay rev owing to the proportionate figure of livestock population.






