Parents of all pre-school-age children are urged to bring the children to the office of the county health officer, Dr. Jack Sexton, Saturday for a free skin test for tuberculosis. The tests are available under the sponsorship of the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Associa-

The tests, which are free, will be given from 2 to 3 in the afternoon.

It has been pointed out that the tests are in no way painful to the child and children of all ages up to school age are urged to take the tests.

Adults of the community are given an opportunity each year to have a free chest X-ray sponsored by the TB Association but the skin test is the only effective means available for detecting tuberculosis in children, according to Mrs. Web Townsend, president of the Association.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF
TEXAS:

Section I. That Section 51s of Article III of the Constitution of the State
of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51s. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature bediened expedient for assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.


