Post-Polio Patients To Be Polled For Rehabilitation Aid

A county wide survey to discover the current rehabilitation needs of all post-polio patients will be conducted next month by the Terrell County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, W. W. Sudduth, chapter chairman, announced this week.

The local survey is part of a nationwide project by the National Foundation to compile a roster of polio cases of all ages and degree of disability, regardless of date of onset. The canvass here should be completed soon after the first of the month.

"The March of Dimes organization, having scored a tremendous victory in its war on polio, does not now propose to walk off and leave the wounded behind so long as help for them is possible. We wish to find everyone who has had polio, whether paralytic or nonparalytic. We want to know what the special problems may be, so that they may may be helped to regain useful lives, if humanly possible, even though it will take a considerable period of time," Sudduth stated.

Mr. Sudduth asked that all persons who have ever had polio—whether disabled or not—to send their names and addresses directly to him.

His records indicate that there have been 18 cases of polio reported in Terrell County and three patients now are receiving therapeutic treatments.

Dove Plentiful For Shooters

Austin—It's time to draw the shotgun from the corner in the closet and wipe off the lint. The 1957 shooting season will begin Sunday noon Sept. 1, for mourning dove in the north zone, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game &Fish Commission. The season ends Oct. 17.

The dove bag limit is 10 per day, with 10 in possession. Shooting is allowed from noon until sunset.

Under federal and state regulations all shotguns must be plugged to three-shell capacity. Shooting from vehicles or across the highways is prohibited.

The director issueed warning to make arrangements with land owners for their hunts.

Mourning doves are plentiful now in every area. Unless there is a drastic change in weather conditions before Sept. 1, they are expected to remain in the local areas. Cooler weather or rain could change this condition. Water hole shooting also can be affected greatly, especially if heavy rains fill new water holes, providing to much water in various areas where food is available.

"Every safety precaution should be used," the director said. "Hunting season usually brings on several accidental deaths, due entirely to carelessness."

He also warned that all persons between the 17 and 65 need licenses when hunting outside their home counties. These licenses now are available from wardens and other authorized license dealers throughout the state.

Observations of local ranchmen and interested prospective dove shooters indicate a plentiful quantity of birds available for harvesting beginning September 1.

The birds found agreeable conditions here during the winter and spring and have raised a large quantity of young birds and, according to some ranchmen, are still nesting.

The scattered rains have furnished a good supply of feed for the birds and hopes are high for excellent hunting conditions by local nimrods.

Car Inspections Begin September 1

Inspection time has rolled around again for more than four million automobile and truck owners in Texts.

The inspection period has been lengthened this year under provision of a state law setting Sept. 1, 1957 until April 15, 1958 as the time in which all behicles must be checked for mechanical defects.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, in announcing the inspection period recommended that every owner have his cars and trucks inspected at the beginning of the period. This, he said, will enable vehicle owners to obtain inspection stickers beforethe holidays and before the last minute "log jam" at inspection stations.

Garrison said that more than 4,200 licensed inspection stations in the state would have stickers on hand by the starting date and would be equipped to check vehicles without delay.
