Little Change in County Tax Picture Seen Over Last Year's Rendition Report

There was a slight decrease in the valuation of property in Terrell County from last year's renditions, according to information from the office of the county tax assessor and collector.

The total rendition this year is \$4,886,876 as compared with last year's figure of \$4,903,440. This year's rendition includes: \$3,567,620 for personal property, livestock, land and autos; bank, \$28,000; railroad \$1,155,220; utilities \$127,060; and unrendered property totals \$8,970, bringing the total to \$4,886,876.

The livestock population last year was rendered at 117,788 head, and according to this year's renditions, totals only 99,465, showing a decrease of approximately 18,000 head.

Auto tax renditions increased this year approximately \$40,000. This increase, according to the deputy tax collector, was because of geophysical crews working in the county.

Brian Montague of Del Rio was sworn in as United States Commissioner by Mrs. Jack Jarvis, federal district deputy clerk in the Del Rio Federal Building Friday.

Montague succeeds James E. Riggs, who resigned September 2 to become a customs enforcement officer at Brownsville.

Montague served as district attorney in the 33rd Judicial District for several years, moving to Del Rio in 1925 to practice law. He was elected judge of the 63rd Judicial District in 1933 and served for 14 years, resigning from the bench in 1947.

His appointment was made by Federal Judge R. E. Thomason of El Paso.

Fernando Vasquez Dies After Practice With Team Monday

Head injuries received Monday afternoon in football practice attributed to the cause of the death of Fernando Vasquez, popular 17-year-old senior in the Sanderson High School, according to the attending physician.

During the routine blocking practice Monday afternoon Vasquez complained of a headache and went over to sit down for a while. Later questioning by Coach Smith revealed that Vasquez felt dizzy and Smith asked Principal Thurman White to take him to a doctor. When they got to the gate at the football field Vasquez passed out and the doctor was summoned to the boy's side. After preliminary examination and observation, he was taken to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Santiago Rodriguez and was attended by the physician until his death shortly after six o'clock.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Vasquez, of Dryden, survivors include eight brothers and sisters.

Requiem mass was held at St. James Catholic Church Tuesday morning and funeral services Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock with Rev. Nicolas Femenia officiating. Burial was made in Santa Rita Cemetery with the Jones & Magill Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.

Pallbearers were Irvin Robbins, Raymond Elrod, Brucks Bader, David Graham, Willie Pena, Felix Valles, Julian Rodriguez and Raul Hernandez. The other squad men, coaches and managers of the Eagle football team were honorary pall bearers.

Fernando had been an outstanding student, according to school officials. He was the ace hurler for the high school baseball team, earning a 11-2 record for the past two years. He was an end on the grid team.

He also had been voted class favorite for the past two years. A memorial service was observed in the high school assembly Tuesday morning for Fernando and the flag on the school ground was lowered to half-mast in his memory.

Classes were dismissed all day Wednesday in the schools of Sanderson.

Clouds Threaten First of Week And Produce Finally

Sanderson and the area especially to the north and northwest have had heavy threatening clouds this week, but little or no rain.

A light sprinkle fell over parts of the county on Monday, leaving only a trace of moisture.

Tuesday dawned with a heavy overcast which lasted all day, leaving another trace of moisture locally and in some areas to the north, but nothing more than a sprinkle has been reported.

Late Tuesday afternoon a heavy cloudbank was visible to the north from Sanderson and later in the evening heavy lightning and thunder was seen and heard by Sanderson residents and area ranchmen. Only a trace of rain was reported on ranches north of Sanderson from the cloud Tuesday night.

Wednesday was clear and sunny and higher temperatures than previously this week. Blankets and quilts have been put into use at night for a week.

Clouds came up Wednesday afternoon from the north and west and left nearly 50-inch of rain in local gauges. Some little hail accompanied the rain.

The rain was widespread, according to early reports. The rain was reported from the Roy Deaton ranch west of town to beyond Dryden along the highway and north as far as the Circle Dot Ranch to the north and all the way south to the river, south of Five-Mile Hill, east of town. Heaviest rains were indicated on the Frank Harrell, John Carruthers, Fred Turner country in a north-south line east of town.

Another heavy cloud bank lay in the west Thursday morning and was moving eastward, indicating probabilities of more rain for Sanderson and vicinity.

BenJack Cage has more invitations than a pretty girl with a rich papa.

Cage's "dates" are with some half-dozen groups who want to know what caused ICT Insurance Co. to go under with multi-million-dollar losses.

After a grand jury session and lie detector test in Dallas, Cage moved to Austin. At the head of the line of questioners here is the Travis County grand jury.

Gov. Price Daniel has asked legislators for a frank "expression of their attitudes toward the proposed special session".

In an individual letter to each member, the governor outlined the session goals: (1) a lobby registration bill, (2) a bill requiring registration of those who represent others before state agencies, (3) a bill setting up a study on how to prevent spread of crime, and (4) legislation to develop a state master water plan.

No new taxes will be needed to finance any of these projects, or the session itself, the governor's letter contended.

Best guesses are that, barring stringent opposition from the lawmakers themselves, the session will be called for Oct. 15.

Three business experts from over the state will join with lawmakers in making a thorough study of the state and local tax structure.

Named to the Texas Tax Study Commission are Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research; John McKee of Dallas, executive of the Ford Motor Co.'s Dallas plant; Hugh Loewenstern, Sr., of Amarillo, real estate dealer.

Three senators and three representatives also will serve on the Commission.

New Map Available A new map, loaded with historical and geographical information about Texas, has just been published by the General Land Office.

Copies are available without charge. Schools are expected to find it particularly useful.

Markings include the lakes, mountains, rivers, dams, reservoirs, off-shore tidelands, state-owned lands, old cattle trails and stagecoach routes.

Retail Sales Up Retail sales in Texas during July increased two per cent over June, nine per cent over July of last year.

Latest figures from the Uni-

versity of Texas Bureau of Business Research show Austin merchants out in front compared with other cities. Their increases were seven per cent over June 12 per cent over a year ago.

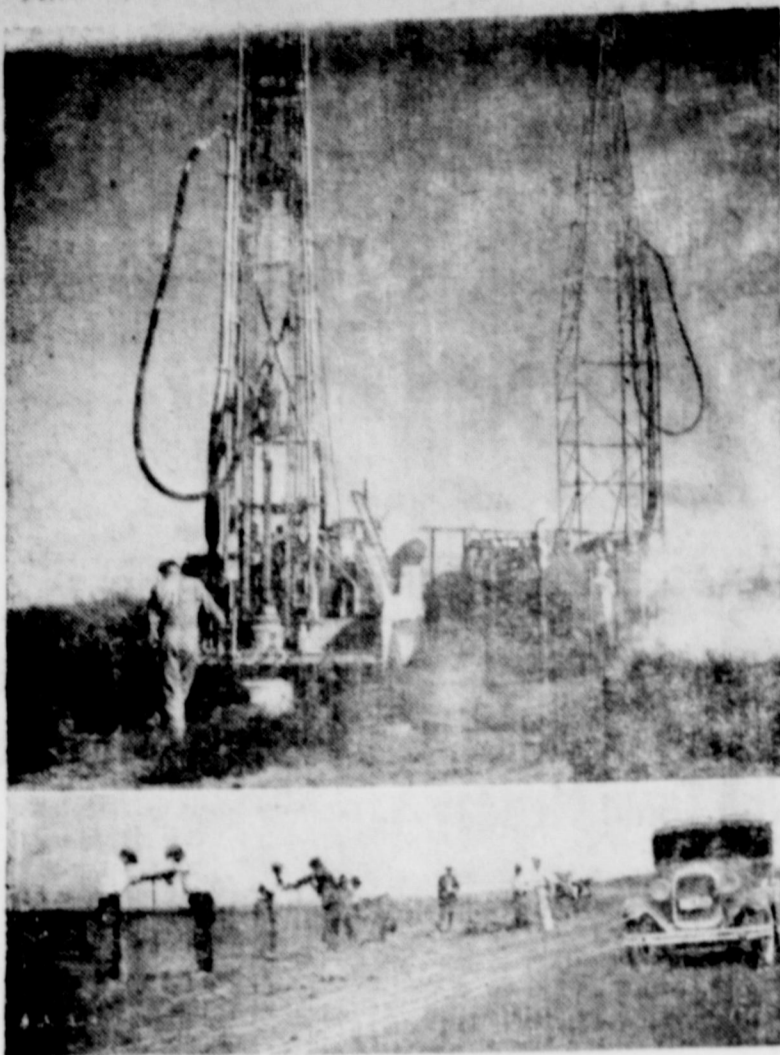
In the most recent group of road building projects authorized by the State Highway Commission, it was expressly stated that money for land buying would not be available until after March of 1958.

No Leniency for DWIs Motorists who lose their drivers licenses for drunken driving needn't expect to get them back before the suspension period is over.

State Board of Pardons and Paroles said it is no longer even making recommendations for early return of licenses. Gov. Daniel, who must approve the recommendations, has made it clear, said the board, that he doesn't favor leniency for DWI cases.

Quick Cooking—Cool Eating

FLUFFY-LIGHT COULD VERY WELL BE the middle name given to this "Pineapple Tapioca." You'll want to serve it often throughout these warm months when desserts—deliciously different—are in demand.

PINEAPPLE TAPIOCA

- 1 egg white
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 cups milk
- 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup (9-ounce can) crushed pineapple and juice
- 1/4 cup chopped nuts (optional)

*Or use 1 cup (8 3/4-ounce can) pineapple tidbits and juice.

Beat egg white until foamy. Add 2 tablespoons sugar and continue beating with egg beater until meringue stands in soft peaks. Set aside.

Mix egg yolk, milk, quick-cooking tapioca, salt and 4 tablespoons sugar in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil (5 to 8 minutes). Gradually pour a small amount of hot mixture into meringue, blending well. Quickly stir in remaining tapioca mixture. Add vanilla. Let stand 15 to 20 minutes. Then fold in the pineapple and nuts, if desired, top with whipped cream and garnish with maraschino cherry.

Aid To Come For Disabled People

Complete and permanent invalids or persons in the community so mentally deranged that they require continuous oversight to keep from harming themselves or others may soon be able to receive small monthly checks from their State Department of Public Welfare through the new state-federal program of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled. The Constitutional Amendment, which was adopted by the voters in November, 1956, limiting the amount of money that can be to 1.5 million dollars per year, makes aid possible only to those who are helpless and have no relatives able to support them.

Mrs. Estelle T. Lawson, Welfare Supervisor for this area, pointed out this is the only welfare program which requires consideration of the ability of relatives to support. This law defines "responsible relatives" as children, parents, step-children, step-parents, brothers and sisters. Mrs. Lawson said that for the first time in nearly 20 years the department's field workers will be required by law to determine the resources of relatives of persons who apply for aid. The "permanency" and "totality" of the disability will be determined by a State reviewing physician after study of a complete physical or mental examination by the person's own physician. Complete helplessness from a medical standpoint, rather than inability to work, is the criteria. The state will pay

the private physician for the examination.

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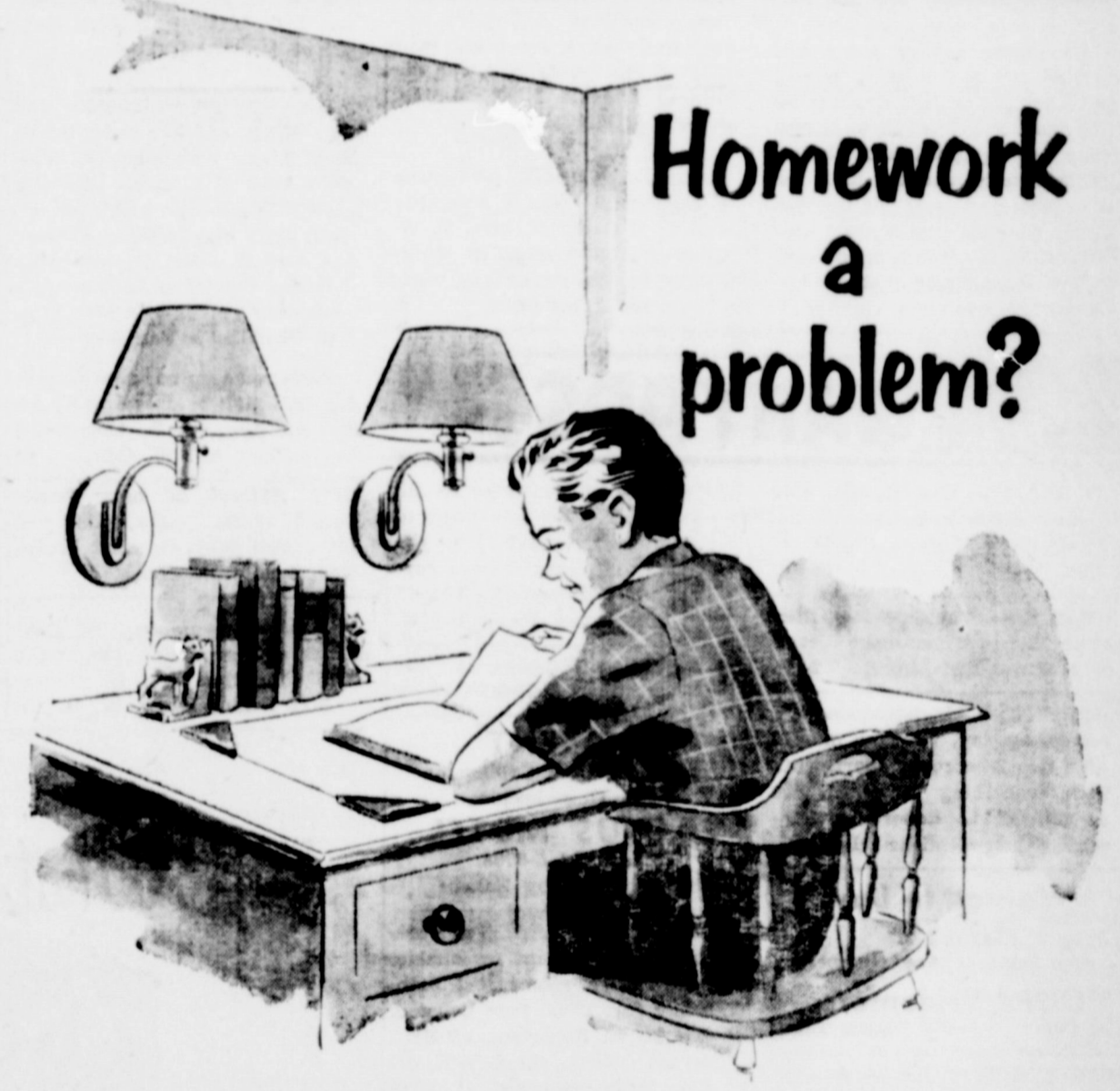

New Laws Set For School Bus Passing

Three state agencies joined today in urging the continuation of a state-wide program to acquaint the public with the Texas law requiring all vehicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading or unloading children.

The Texas Education Agency, the Texas Highway Department, and the Texas Department of Public Safety are making a joint request that school superintendents, newspapers, radio stations and television stations participate in efforts to acquaint drivers with the school bus law.

"Superintendents and news editors performed an outstanding public service in this safety campaign last year," said J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education. "Yet seven lives were lost during the school year in collisions involving school buses. There is a continuing need for a safety education."

There were two more fatalities during 1956-57 than were reported to the Department of Public Safety in 1955-56. The total number of accidents reported declined, however, from 379 to 333. (During the past year the Highway Department erected signs on all major roads warning motorists of the safety measure.)

The law says in effect, that upon meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging children, the driver of any vehicle shall stop immediately before passing. After coming to a stop the driver of the vehicle can proceed with due caution at a speed which is prudent and does not exceed ten miles per hour. The law does not apply within city limits.

Vehicles are not required to stop on highways with separate roadways when the bus is on a different roadway from that of a passing vehicle. Vehicles are not required to stop if the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to a controlled-access highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

All public school buses are painted yellow and have "School Bus" painted in large letters on the front and rear of each bus. They are equipped with flasher lights usually mounted high on the front and rear of the bus. These flashing lights are used only when the bus is in the process of stopping or is stopped to receive or discharge children.

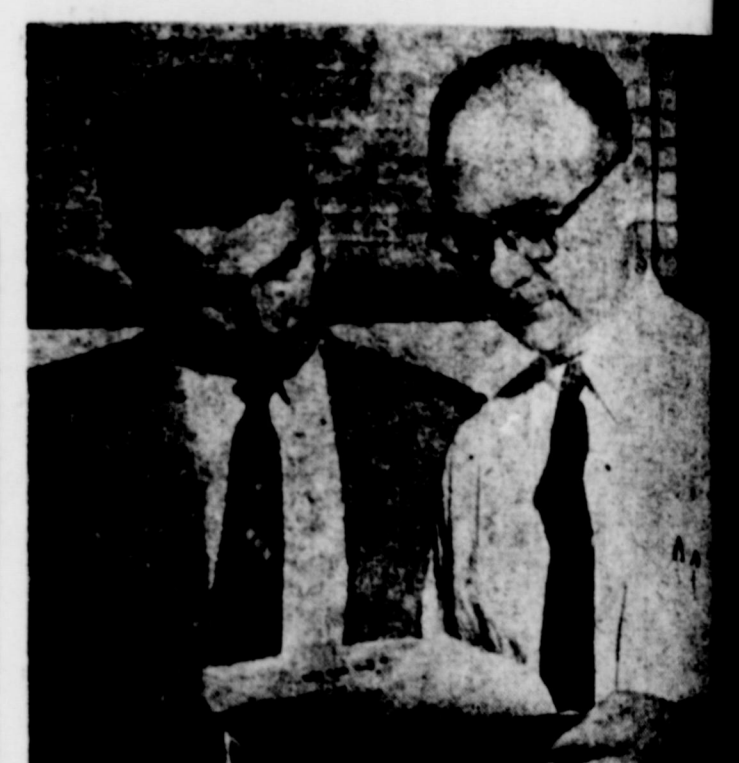

Champion Better Government Bills

Rep. John Lee of Kermit and Sen. Preston Smith of Lubbock, to right above, were among the first of many Texas legislators to introduce one of the "Better Government" Bills sponsored by the Texas Press Association. TPA has prepared 15 Bills for legislative action. Each bill is designed to correct evils that exist in Texas laws. "Had the TPA bills been in effect there would have been no veterans land or Duval County scandals," said Sen. Smith. "Loopholes in present laws have made possible the notorious events of the past few years, wherein public monies have been misappropriated," stated Representative Lee. The two legislators are urging the public to back them in their determination to passage of the TPA Legislation. Lee's bill is HB-38. Smith's bill is SB-55. Both bills are known as The Mandatory Publication Act. They do not create any new publication requirements. But they call for removal from office of any public official who refuses to publish financial reports called for under existing laws.
