Petition Calling For Election Water Dist. Being Circulated

A petition to the County Judge and Commissioners' Court for an election to form a proposed water district, to be known as Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, is being circulated by members of the citizens' steering committee composed of Don Anderson, Marion Batson, Ray Hodgkins, L. H. Gilbreath and Lawrence James.

The proposed district contains an area of approximately 1,586 acres, more or less. The purpose of the organization of the district shall be for and include the control, storing, preservation, and distribution of its waters and flood waters to be accomplished by any and all practicable means.

This will include the purchase, construction, improvement, installation, maintenance and operation of the water facilities for the town of Sanderson.

It is estimated by the petitioners from information available at this time that the cost will be approximately \$250,000.00 more or less.

Boy 'Missing' Five Years Held In Burglary

The parents of a North Little Rock, Ark., youth being held in the Fort Bend County jail on burglary charges have learned of the whereabouts of their son after five years, according to a news clipping brought to The Times this week.

The youth told sheriff's officers that his real name was Rodger Lee Jones, not Roy Lee Jantzen, the name he gave when arrested, and that he was 18 not 21 years old.

A check with North Little Rock police revealed that the parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. S. Jones, lived there and the couple was notified that their son was being held.

The boy ran away from home at 13, according to the clipping. The youth is charged with the burglary of the Alamo Service Station at Stafford two months ago. He was arrested with John Milton Jones of Sanderson. The two are not related.

The Arkansas youth is AWOL from a San Pedro, Calif., Army post, according to information received, and said he lied about his age when he joined the army.

present facilities, and a backlog of ready cash to be used, if needed, for certain improvement or installations, if need be, prior to the availability of surplus funds from the sale of water to local consumers.

The petition must bear the signatures of 50 or more land owners within the metes and bounds of the proposed district, and if when properly signed and submitted to the Commissioners' Court and county judge, will order a hearing where any person whose land is included in or could be affected by the creation of the district, may appear and contest and show testimony why the district should or should not include his land. Notice of the hearing shall be posted by the sheriff for 15 days prior to the hearing and the sheriff shall cause the notice to be published in a newspaper in the county once a week for two consecutive weeks, the first to be at least 20 days prior to the date of hearing.

If and when the land owners of the proposed district vote for the formation of the district, there will be a board of directors named to serve in the administration of the district until a vote for the issuance and sale of bonds, at which time directors will be elected for the continuance of the project.

The response to the committee's efforts has been most encouraging, according to Don Anderson, chairman of the committee.

It is expected to have the petition completed and in the hands of Judge R. S. Wilkinson by the end of the week, Anderson said.

A committee composed of E. F. Pierson, Ray Hodgkins, and Rev. John W. Byrd, had been appointed to ascertain the cost of and urge the Commissioners' Court to install traffic lights or stop signs at several intersections in Sanderson off of Oak St. in hopes of eliminating traffic hazards present at those intersections. The committee reported to the directors that the Court had approved the purchase of "Stop" signs for seven intersections in Sanderson. The signs will be at the center of the street on the border of the intersections, and will consist of a flush-mounted base with a hard rubber sign standing up in the street approximately six inches. They will be installed, with the approval of the Court at the intersection entrances of the east-west streets at 5th and E. Pine; Persimmon and W. Pine; 1st and E. Hackberry; 2nd and E. Richard; 2nd and E. Pine; 3rd and E. Hackberry; and at 4th and E. Pine.

The signs would cause east-west traffic to halt at the above intersections, and permit north and south-bound traffic to move without having to stop at stop signs, only observing approaching traffic moving into the intersection after having stopped. The Commissioners pointed out that the use of safety devices would be useless unless people observed the signs and their command to stop. They also stated that proper law enforcement would be necessary to acquaint drivers with the necessity of observing the traffic laws off of the main street.

The Court considered the use of traffic lights and heard the recommendations of the C of C committee for their use, but felt that due to the difference in cost and upkeep, and with proper law enforcement, the rubber signs would be as effective as traffic signal lights.

The directors also passed a motion to express appreciation of the Chamber to Highway Patrolmen who come to Sanderson for their efforts, their impartial and unbiased law enforcement of traffic violators, and requested copies of the letter be sent Maj. Wilson E. Speir, of the Highway Patrol, and to Gov. Price Daniel and urge those officials to expedite, if possible the assignment of a Patrolman here.

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Austin — Next summer's campaigns are tuning up to play from a familiar score — the conservative vs. liberal melody Texas voters have been hearing for years.

But, like the rock and roll version of a Stephen Foster song, it may sound different. Campaign pitches will have to keep good time to the fast beat of 1958's new issues. Such as "curing the recession" and "catching up in education".

On the federal level, talk is of cutting taxes to give the people more money to spend. Here in Texas, it's raising taxes to give the state more money to spend.

In a situation like this, a voter can get confused.

For each issue, there'll be several choruses — more or less drowning each other out. Some will chant of scaring away recession with large-scale government spending. Others will say the only way is to give business a break.

For schools, some are calling for a nationwide program to require more work from students, provide better teachers at better pay, more lab equipment, scholarships for promising students, etc. But many Texans say "never" to any scheme that would eat away at local control over the schools.

On how to get money to bail out the state treasury, there are already a number of tunes being struck up — sales taxes, income taxes, corporation taxes, more economy in government — but no prospects of close harmony.

Cowboy Hat In Ring

One morning, in between pouring his coffee and finishing his bacon, William A. Blakely decided to run for the U. S. Senate.

Blakely served as junior U.S. senator for four months last year as the appointee of former Gov. Allan Shivers. He was not a candidate in the special election when Ralph Yarborough was named to succeed him.

Son of Oklahoma homesteaders who had to "work out" for other farmers, Blakely parlayed a little grit into a lot of money — in law, banking, real estate, ranching, oil, gas, insurance, and an air line.

Incumbent Yarborough has made statements leaving the door open for either of two courses — running for another Senate term or a fourth try at the governorship.

Purse-Watcher Needed

Texas' governor should have some power to keep a hand on state purse strings after the Legislature leaves.

So says Vernon McGee, director of the Legislative Budget Board. McGee heads the board with responsibility for studying the fiscal needs of all state departments and making recommendations to the Legislature.

Under present system, McGee pointed out, after the Legislature makes its appropriations, only the individual department heads are responsible for how the money, that could be saved for later needs, just because they have it.

McGee's recommendation: give the governor authority to ask for periodic reports from department heads and to cut from their budgets items no longer necessary.

Most other states have this system, said McGee.

Still Too Much Oil

Despite severe cuts in production, Texas is still producing more oil than anyone wants to buy. It could mean even deeper cuts and more idle drilling rigs next month.

Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson noted an increase of 1,208,000 barrels in stocks of

crude oil. It shows, he said, that April's lowest-in-history, 8-day production pattern was needed.

He suggested that new wells coming in may make an even lower pattern necessary for May. **Set To Go**

Texas Highway Department is poised for a \$36,000,000 speed-up in road building if a new stepped-up federal aid bill becomes law.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said the bill, sent to the President by Congress, would enable Texas to avoid a summer lull in highway construction. Texas has already planned the projects in anticipation of the money, said Greer.

Designed as an anti-recession measure, the bill specifies the extra money must be spent within 12 months.

It won't put all the unemployed people to work, said Greer, but it will stimulate the economy. And, he added, it's not a leaf raking job."

Scientists Must Eat

With all the emphasis on scientific education, importance of the training of farmers and ranchers should not be neglected, said Gov. Price Daniel.

Speaking to a Future Farmers Group, the governor said food is as necessary to the nation's defense as development of better weapons.

Texas' farm population, he noted, has declined by more than one-half since 1933.

Pinch on Small Schools

Small schools are going to have to have help to meet higher state standards in math and science, says Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro.

Beginning with the 1959-60 term high schools are to be required to teach four years of science and four years of math. Sen. Martin said he doubted smaller districts had or could get, without assistance, the necessary staff and equipment to meet the new standard.

"Most have gymnasiums," he observed, "but a lot lack laboratories."

Short Snorts

Deaths from industrial accidents dropped from 167 for the first three months of last year to 152 for the same period this year, reports the Industrial Accident Board.

Unemployment claims inched up slightly — from 89,326 to 89,786 — in latest report, but Texas Employment Commission officials expressed confidence that the month as a whole would show a drop in number of jobless.

Texas' traffic fatality score for 1958 looks better than this time last year — 444 compared to 506 in 1957. But Texas is still apparently a pretty dangerous place for driving, second only to California in road fatalities, says the governor's traffic safety director, Brad Smith.

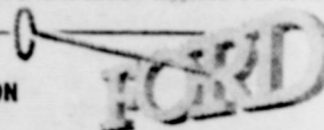

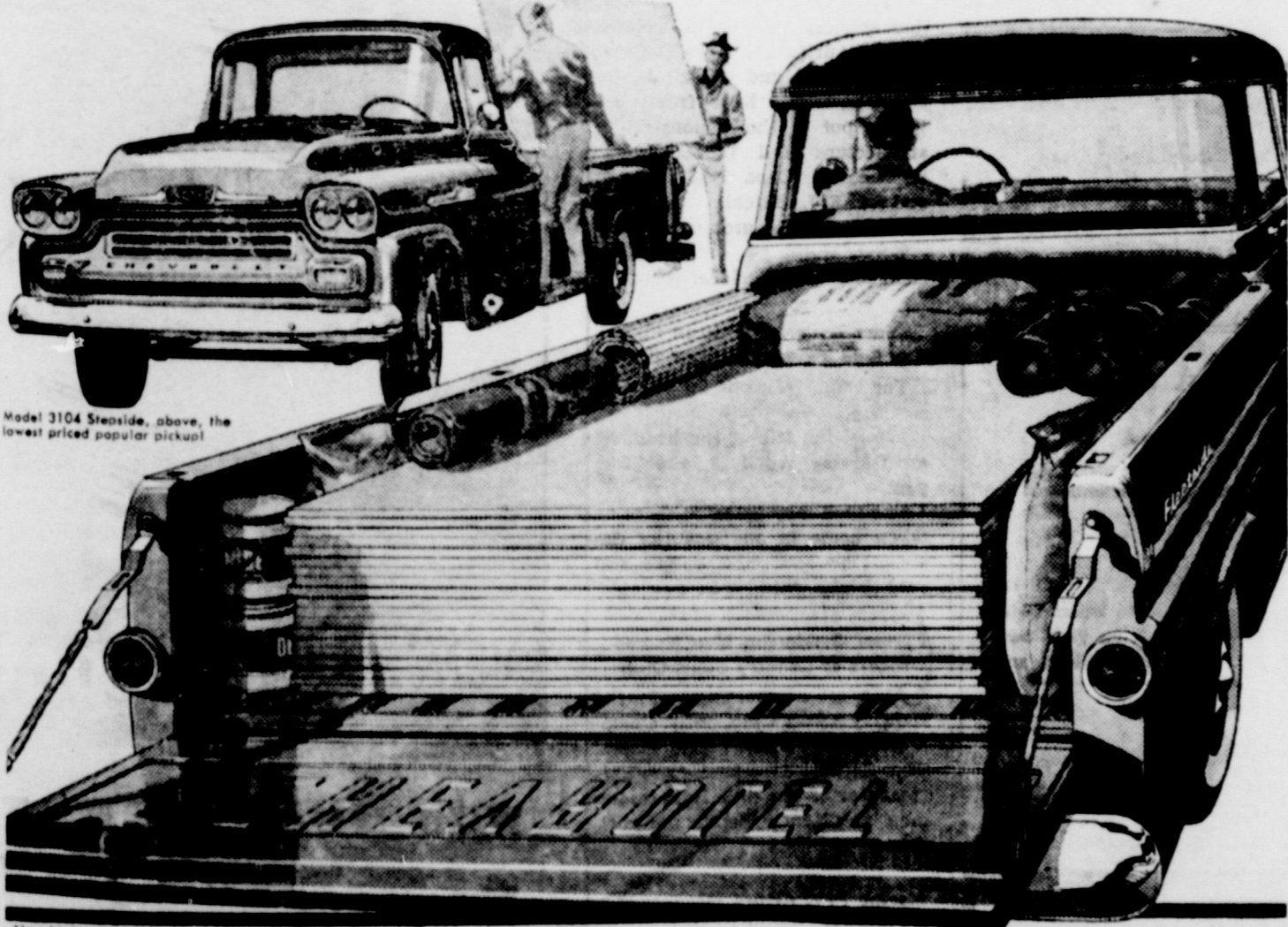

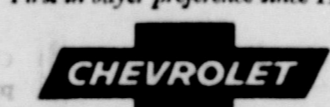

able in national expenditures. We throw them all in file 13. We wish all newspapers in the country would do the same thing.

If they want to send out partisan stuff, let them do it at their own expense like we do.

The Commissioners' Court is going to buy some stop signs for installation at seven local intersections off of Oak St. They were rather reluctant to go along with the recommendations of the committee from the Chamber of Commerce because of the initial cost of traffic lights and the cost of upkeep due to broken lenses and lights. They quoted the fact that upkeep on the street lights for Sanderson is quite expensive, due to globes burning out and being broken by undetermined causes which also at times leave small dents and even holes in the reflectors. The commissioners felt that the traffic lights would only be further inducement to target hunters, and that the type signs they are ordering would be as effective as traffic lights with proper enforcement of the law.
