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Roger Thurmond, Jr., Announces For Legislative Post

Roger Thurmond, Jr., of Del Rio, has authorized The Times to announce his candidacy for State Representative of the 100th Legislative District, composed of Terrell, Brewster, Val Verde, Kinney, and Maverick Counties, subject to the Democratic Primary election on July 26, 1958.

Thurmond, son of District Judge and Mrs. Roger Thurmond of Del Rio, is a brother of George M. Thurmond, the present State Representative Reared in Del Rio, where he was born July 11, 1934, he graduated from high school there in 1951 and received his B. A. Degree with accounting major at Rice Institute in 1955. He will complete his studies for his law degree at the University of Texas Law School the current semester. He recently passed his examinations by the State Board of Law Examiners for admission to the legal profession and will be formally sworn in as an attorney in ceremonies to be held before the Supreme Court of Texas on May 5.

Mr. Thurmond's grandfather, father and brother commenced careers of public life by service in the Texas Legislature.

"I suppose it is only natural that I should have the hope and ambition to represent the people of this district in the House of Representatives," the candidate said. "The three generations of my family have started their public service there and each, I think, conscientiously served his State and District with industry, integrity, intelligence and humility. I seek the opportunity to similarly serve and, if elected, will do so to the best of my ability."

Thurmond is unmarried and is a member of the Episcopal Church.

B-B No. 2, 8,000 Ft., Goode at 10,000

Magnolia Petroleum Co. and Western Natural Gas Co. No. 2 Brown-Bassett venture in section 216, Block Y, east-central Terrell County, continues speedy hole-making and is reported to be drilling below 8,000 feet this week, making over 2,000 feet of hole since last week. Operator is drilling with gas, and, according to their recommendations, this process of drilling accounts for the speed in drilling.

Richardson & Bass No. 1 M. H. Goode, on section 6 in Block R, is reported to be below 10,000 feet this week and is also reported to be drilling with mud. Operator was using compressed air until just recently and is now using mud for drilling, according to reports.

Formations in the Richardson and Bass hole were said to be running high in early stages of drilling and supposition was they would continue high all the way down.

Unofficial reports are that another venture is slated by Magnolia Petroleum Co. in near vicinity of Brown-Bassett No. 2. Location has been established, but information is not complete or official.

Local Band Gets Division II Rating In Odessa Meet

More than 3,000 West Texas students were in Odessa Saturday for Region VIII band contests of the University Interscholastic League.

The Sanderson High School Band, under the direction of Philip Shafer, attended the meet and placed in division 2 in both concert and sight reading. None of the bands in Class A high schools placed in division 1 in either contest.

There were four instrumental solos by local students at the band meet.

Elizabeth Lopez played Von Weber's Concertino on the clarinet and got a division I rating; Diane Tronson played a clarinet solo, Meditation, by Wheeler and got a division I rating; Diana Duke played a trombone solo, Andante at Allegro by Ropartz and got a division I rating; and Hector Lopez played an alto saxophone solo Theme and Variations by Cailliet and got a division II rating.

Division I ratings were given for a perfect performance with a 95 or better grade, division II is for a very good performance with a grade of 87 to 95.

In rating the local band for their concert performance, one of the judges awarded a division I rating and the other two gave a division II, according to Shafer.

A posse comprised of about 20 men on horseback and about 70 men and young men on foot joined local officers, Immigration officers and a Texas Ranger in a search for Bobby Sid Wood, 17, the first of the week. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sid Wood of Sanderson.

Young Wood, disappeared early Sunday and was found about 10 a.m. Tuesday on the E. E. Harkins, Jr., ranch, at a windmill approximately 2 miles from Sanderson.

The search began Monday morning early and posse members were stationed that afternoon at various waterings around Sanderson where they stayed until early Monday night.

Tuesday morning more help was summoned and air fields at Del Rio and San Angelo were alerted for helicopter and airplane assistance but windy and unsettled weather Tuesday prevented their joining the searchers. Bloodhounds from Midland were obtained but young Wood was found before the dogs arrived.

Mr. Wood's sister, Mrs. Ernest Sweatt of Eldorado, arrived here Wednesday and left Thursday afternoon with Bobby Sid and his mother for a medical check-up.

Sheriff Lee Billings asked The Times to express his appreciation to all men who helped in the search, to school officials for permitting high school boys to participate, and to the boys themselves for their interest and help.

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Unemployment or no unemployment, most people this side of the Rio Grande aren't willing to bend their backs to pull onions at 50c per hour.

So say Texas farmers. Their crops are going to rot in the fields, they add, if the U.S. Labor Dept. doesn't relax restrictions on importing Mexican nationals.

Spokesmen for organized labor have demanded a ban on importing labor because of climbing unemployment. But farmers say the idle aircraft mechanics, no matter how numerous, are no help in getting the crops in. According to the farmers, abundant rainfall gives the promise of the best harvests in years — if they can get field hands.

Labor Dept. has put a limit of 26,500 braceros to be used in Texas during April and May. It's about one fifth the number used this time last year. Rio Grande Valley growers say they could use the whole bunch in their area.

Texas Employment Commission says there are already about 26,500 here; hence no more imports.

Under Labor Department regulations, workers cannot be imported until the TEC certifies the jobs cannot be filled with American citizens. Valley growers recently asked for braceros to harvest vegetables. TEC certified to a shortage of workers in the area, and, even after a statewide canvass, was unable to fill the demand.

But the federal suggested recruiting in other states before bringing in Mexicans.

Farm groups protested to every regulatory official in reach.

Texas crops and weather conditions are such, they say, that when they need laborers, they need them then and there. Neither, they point out, do they have time or money to run all over the country looking for workers.

Though federal officials catch the brunt of their criticism, farmers put part of the blame for their labor problems on the increasingly fastidious nature of Mrs. Housewife. She won't have dirty old carrot tops any more, topped carrots — packaged in plastic. It means more work.

All-Out for Safety Gov. Price Daniel has started "the greatest highway safety campaign in the history of the state."

County judges, mayors, police chiefs, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys and school superintendents are being asked to hold meetings and organize local campaigns. Awards will be given to local officials and news reporting agencies which do the best job of promoting traffic safety.

Governor's goal is to save "a life per county." This would total 254 lives or approximately 10 per cent of last year's traffic death toll.

Anti-Ad Ban Upheld A new law prohibiting price ad-

vertising of eye-glasses is constitutional, says the Texas Supreme Court.

Passed by the last legislature, the law says "ophthalmic dispensers" (which the court says means optometrists, too) may not mention "bait, discounts, premiums, prices, gifts" in their ads.

It landed in the courts when one group of optometrists (Texas State Optical) brought suit to prevent another group (Lee Optical) from advertising prices. Defendants said the law was invalid because its caption did not specifically mention the things the law covered.

But the high court declared the caption was clear enough.

The bill, as originally introduced, made no reference to price advertising. The portion pertaining thereto was inserted in committee without there being any change in the caption.

Opponents of bill charged "trickery." They argued that this was just another attempt to raise the price of glasses by prohibiting the publicizing of prices.

Up the Ladder One plan to up-grade higher education in Texas has official approval of the Commission on Higher Education. Others are under study.

Commission approved a request from the University of Texas to divert \$1,000,000 from its Available Fund, ordinarily used for buildings, to a research program. Noting that the University needs "bricks as well as bricks" President Logan Wilson said the money would be used to attract and hold outstanding research personnel and provide them with equipment and books.

Still under consideration by the Commission are:

(1) Texas Technological College's request for graduate engineering study. Tech's engineering department is a sort of strong back and weak mind program, said President E. N. Jones, with 2,700 students and no upper-level study to attract top-notch teachers.

(2) Texas A&M's touchy problem of whether to admit women.

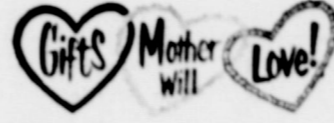
