Signs Ordered For Local Traffic

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson stated Monday that the signs for traffic control in Sanderson had been ordered and would be installed as soon as they came in.

A committee from the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce, composed of Rev. John W. Byrd, Ray Hodgkins, and E. F. Pierson, will make recommendations to the Commissioners' Court for the location of the signs.

There will be two signs placed at each of the designated intersections. The signs will read "Yield Right of Way" and will be reflector signs, visible plainly at night. They will be placed on opposite sides of the intersections designated.

Recommendations from State Highway Patrolmen were that this type sign be used so that there would be no question of blame in case of an accident, and because of their effectiveness in controlling moving traffic.

The patrolmen stated that a driver approaching in intersection where he was forced to yield the right of way, moved into the intersection at his own risk. Thus if there was no approaching traffic, he did not have to stop at the intersection, but would have to stop only for approaching traffic from right angles, or in the case of oncoming traffic, would proceed into the intersection after giving or awaiting proper hand signals for turns.

Experience has been satisfactory from all other users of the "yield-type" signs, according to recommendations, and it is hoped that local drivers will become adjusted to driving habits necessary after the erection of the signs.

The "yield" signs do not permit "race-track" driving on the streets where "yield" is not designated. The officers stated that common-sense driving habits was the best controlling factor for the through-street designation and effective law enforcement against speedsters.

E. L. Autery of Sheffield, a newly-assigned warden with the Texas Game and Fish Commission, has been assigned to Terrell County. He is a graduate of Sul Ross College.

Justice of Peace Named Monday

J. A. Gilbreath was named Justice of the Peace of Precinct 1 Monday at the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court. The appointment was to fill the office left vacant by the death of Chester Smith recently. Mr. Smith was appointed in 1955 to fill the unexpired term of Marshall Cooke who resigned.

The appointment will be until the time of the general election at which time a person will be named to fill the balance of the four-year term — or two years.

Gilbreath was sworn in Monday morning and stated that he would try to acquaint himself with the duties of the office so that he could perform those duties with dignity and honor. He also said that he would sit in the Justice of Peace court with every effort at fairness and impartiality toward everyone.

"I will appreciate the understanding and cooperation of the public," Gilbreath said, "and will try to conduct the duties of the office in a manner befitting the honor and confidence placed on me by the commissioners."

TB Assn. Meets Monday Night

The Terrell County TB and Health Association met Monday evening in the court house with Mrs. M. W. Duncan presiding. It was a quarterly meeting of the directors.

Mrs. Web Townsend was named chairman of the Seal Sale in December.

The directors voted to supply the necessary materials for a blood test for TB to be given free this year not only to the preschool children but also to the pupils of the 6th and 12th grades. The time and place of the tests will be announced later.

The fear of radiation from X-rays, which has been created among the public in recent months, will probably do away with the mass chest X-ray surveys sponsored by the Texas Tuberculosis and Health Dept. A satisfactory blood test is being substituted and Terrell County is one of the few Texas counties making application for the use of the blood test, according to reports.

The treasurer's report revealed the payment for several X-rays for chest abnormalities and medicine, \$100 donated to the TB research work, \$100 to the chapel that is being built at the Me-Knight Sanatorium.

Details Clarified On Water Vote

There was some misunderstanding on the part of some local citizens on the setting of the date for the water district confirmation election, according to information received by The Times.

The misunderstanding is that the election was to be held within 30 days from the date of the organization of the water board which was Monday, June 2.

The board has 30 days in which to call an election, or set the date of an election, which may be 30 days from the last day of the month.

A notice of election must be published two times with the first publication to be at least 20 days prior to the date of the election.

It is highly probable that the date for the election may be set within the next two weeks and the first publication of the election notice published in one of the next two issues of The Times.

The group comprising the water board is busy on some details and information which they desire to bring to the people prior to calling the election and it is thought that the information may be forthcoming soon.

The group feels that probabilities and possibilities are not sufficient nor advisable since the people of the proposed district wish to know facts concerning various phases of operation, etc.

Much study, effort and work is being done by the board members in an honest effort to bring to the people the best possible proposition at the time for voting.

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'Wars' Watched

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson says his office is keeping close check on the gasoline and milk price wars that have broken out in major cities.

In some areas gasoline prices dropped as much as 10 cents per gallon below normal and milk has been sold at a fraction of the usual charge.

"Texas anti-trust laws do not prevent price wars which are the free working of competition," Wilson commented, "but they do prohibit agreement or conspiracy to fix or cut prices and selling below cost to eliminate competition."

More Building

Effect on the drought's end is being seen in more building in smaller towns dependent on agriculture for prosperity.

UT's Bureau of Business Research reports a 10 per cent rise in the January-April building volume for towns with less than 10,000 population.

BBR's report reflected a fairly general brightening of the building picture. Construction authorizations for April were up 3 per cent from March and 22 per cent from a year ago.

Home builders were found to be cautiously optimistic. Most, BBR reported, hadn't actually experienced much of an increase in home sales. But they were busier than they'd been in months building up a supply for an expected pick-up in buying by fall and winter.

Easier credit, and in some cases, lower costs of materials are expected to make house-buying more alluring.

More Salvage

Sale of some municipal bonds owned by the bankrupt US Trust and Guaranty Co. has brought another \$144,000 for the company's creditors.

An earlier distribution of \$2,11,000 represented about 31 per cent of the amount owed some 9,000 persons.

Meanwhile, insurance department employees are working against a May 31 deadline to complete an operation designed to prevent such fiascos in the future. They check the annual statement of each company doing business in Texas. If any questionable transactions are uncovered, the company is required to straighten them out before being re-licensed.

During the past year, a period of tightened regulations, there has been no large-scale crack-up in the industry. Many younger companies have merged to strengthen their positions by combining assets.

Gun Selling Law

Whether Texas law regulating sale of pistols is constitutional is being considered by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Case in point involves a Houstonite who was sentenced for sale of a pistol to a minor Attorney for the defendant contends the law is too vague and confusing to be valid.

Texas penal code has two separate and sometimes conflicting sections on sale of firearms, forbidding their sale to minors, persons "under heat of passion" and persons convicted of felonies.

Short Snorts

Texas Employment Commission has announced the first substantial drop in unemployment claims this year. After weeks of tabulating steady increase in joblessness, TEC reports claims had slid from 90,913 to 86,528. Total benefits paid dropped \$143,070 for the week.

Accompanying the good news, TEC announced 1,127 new jobs created in the state by the opening of new businesses. Largest was a garment factory in Temple employing 200.

When a Texas Cavalryman saw a blue-eyed girl of fourteen living contentedly as the adopted daughter of a Comanche Indian family, he knew the long-lost Cynthia Ann Parker had been found. Five years previously on May 19, 1836, she had been captured in a Comanche raid on Fort Parker, and taken away with the raiders. Attempts to buy her from her captors failed.

When she was next seen by a trading party on the Canadian River two years later, she was happily married to a Comanche chief, Peis Nocona, and refused to leave her foster-people. Two sons were born, Peios and Quannah Parker, and later a daughter, Prairie Flower. At the battle of Pease River, in 1860, she and the little girl were captured and taken to Fort Cooper. There her identity was definitely established by an uncle, Isaac Parker, but Cynthia Ann wanted none of white civilization. She never became reconciled to separation from her Comanche people, and tried many times to escape and rejoin them. The story of her loyalty to the Indians with whom she lived so long has been told and retold in song, narrative and drama and will always be a colorful chapter of Texas history.

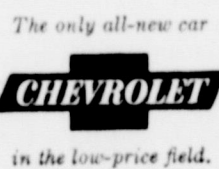

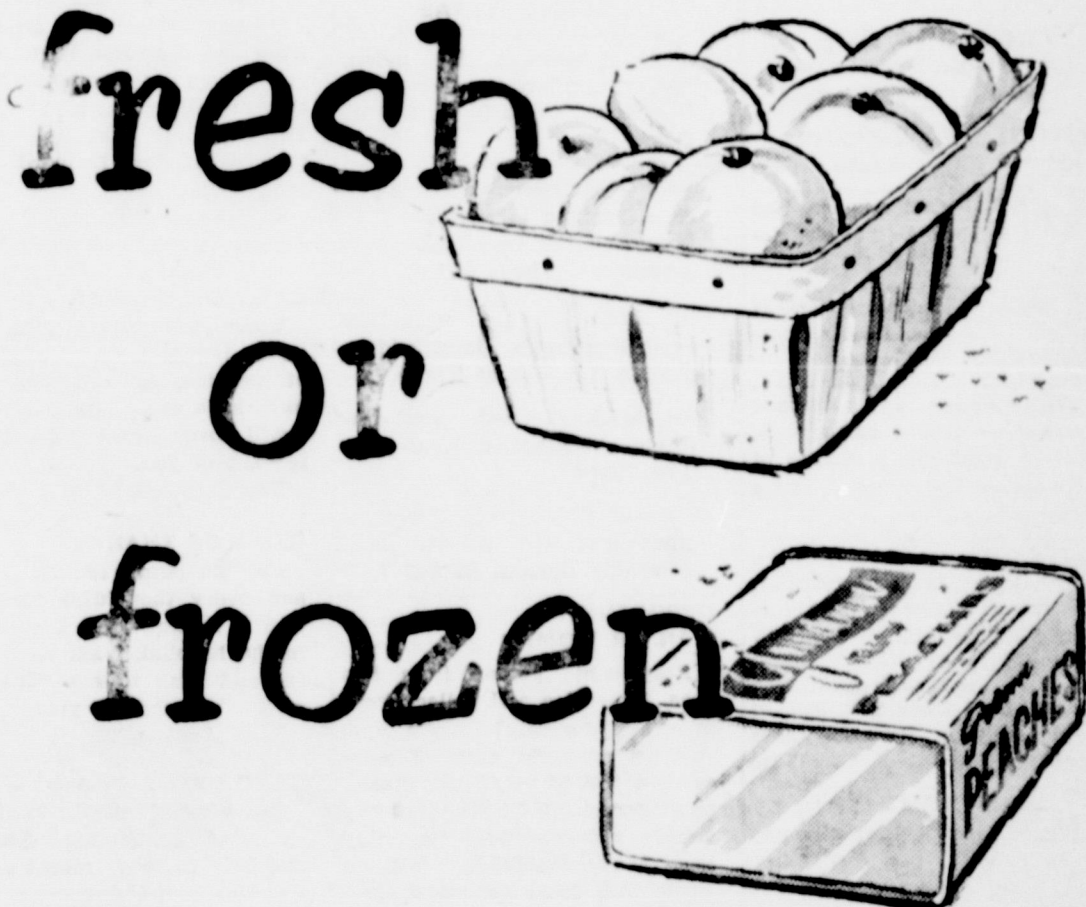

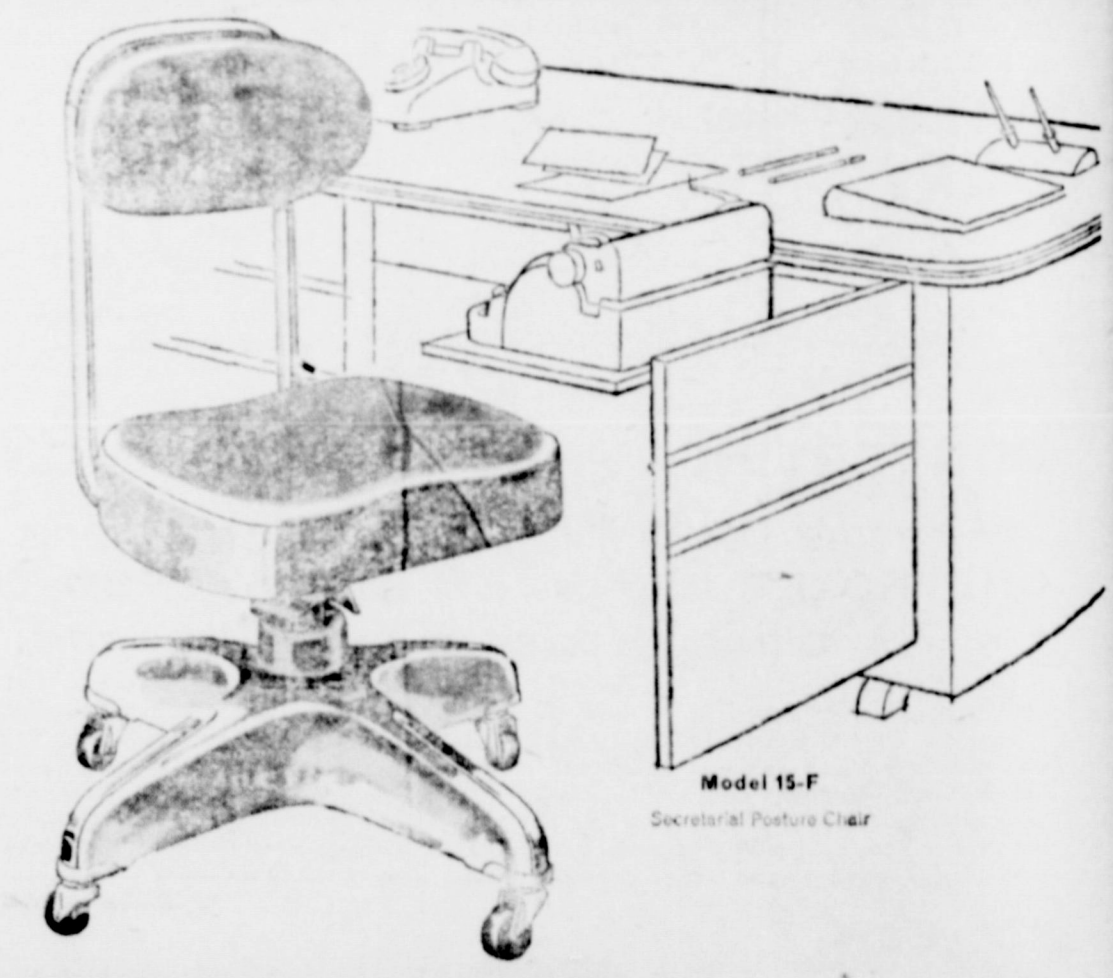
