Park Increases

Visitor travel to Big Bend National Park during May showed a 20 per cent increase over May of 1957, Supt. George W. Miller announced this week. A total of 9.296 visitors, traveling in 2,656 automobiles, entered the park as compared with 7.417 visitors traveling in 2,119 cars, during May of last year. This represents an increase of 1,879 people and 537

For the first five months of 1958, the visitation to the park has reached a total of 30.755 visitors, traveling in 8787 automobiles, as compared with 28,007 visitors in 8,225 automobiles last year. The visitors travel to date represents an increase of 10 per

cent over last year The Persimmon Gap entrance to the park was the most popular, with 2,014 cars entering at that point:

Supt. Miller, in announcing this big increase for the month of May, again stressed the importance of making reservations for those who plan to come to the

park and remain overnight. Miller also announced the completion of over 5 miles of new paved roads in the park, under the Mission 66 orogram.

These roads are part of the Rio Grande Village Development program and include circulatory and campground roads and parking spurs. Additional road work, parking areas, and landscaping of the roadsides is scheduled for

Traffic Toll During Holidays Noted As Grim Reminder

"The tragic memorial holiday traffic death toll in Texas is a grim reminder that courtesy, caution, and common sense were not heeded," said Capt. Ray B. Butler of the Midland Highway

Patrol Headquarters this week.

Capt. Butler released the rural traffic accident summary for May 1958 with a word of eaution. We are certainly not optimistic over the fact that only four persons died in traffic accidents in May within the 24-county Patrol District, we are thankful there were no more." There were 65 persons injured in 41 personal injury accidents, and 96 property damage accidents, for a total of 141 rural traffic accidents within the district.
