Judge Wilkinson stated that the auditors had okayed the local records after completion of their audit Tuesday and noted that everything was in "tip-top" condition

Incentive Wool Receipts Filed

Ninety producers filed in Terrell County for the wool incentive payment. April 1 1957, to April 1st, 1958, was the 1957 marketing year for which incentive payments have been recently made.

Total pounds of wool on account sales filed in Terrell County was 815,660 pounds. Net proceeds from the sale of this woo! was \$463.649.64. Total incentive payment received by producers was \$63,558.66, according to F. M. Wood, Jr., local ASC office man-

There were 79 producers filed in Terrell County for the incentive payment on unshorn lambs with the marketing year being the same as for shorn wool.

Total pounds of unshorn lambs sold was 2,379,706. The USDA estimates that, on an average, there is five pounds of wool for every 100 pounds of unshorn lambs sold which resulted in a net incentive payment of \$6,646.13.

Because the average mohair price of 88.6 cents per pound received by the producers was above the support price of 70c per pound, no payments will be made on mohair sold during the 1957 marketing year, according to Wood. However, it is anticipated that there will be an incentive payment made for the 1958 marketing year and producers are urged to file their account sales with the loral ASC office as soon as sales are made. Terrell Ranchers Enter Suit To Stop Cloud 'Seeding'

Terrell County ranchers or a rancher has entered a suit filed Monday in Fort Davis against farmer groups of West Texas.

The suit is for \$500,000 damages and was filed by a Midland law firm against the company conducting cloud seeding in the area and against several officials of the company.

The suit represents some 30 ranchmen and a few farmers of Reeves, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Culberson, Winkler, Ward, Loving and Terrell Counties.

The ranchmen plan to combine this damage suit and one previously filed for a fight to finish with farmers conducting cloud seeding in the Fort Davis area.

The identity of the ranchmen in the suit was not revealed.

Defendants are the Southwest Weather Research, Inc.: E. K. Kooser, president of the company; John Hill Lewis, a pilot; Trans-Pecos Weather Control. Inc., of Fort Stockton; and Trans-Pecos Cotton Assn., of Pecos.

A spokesman for the ranchers stated that they were seeking temporary and permanent injunction against the cloud seed

The feud between the ranchers and farmers originated when the farmers in the Trans-Pecos area contracted with the Weather Research, Inc., to seed clouds in an attempt to decrease danger of hail and facilitate moisture.

The ranchmen contend the operation breaks up clouds and

Higher Postal Rates After August 1

Higher postal rates, decreed by the U.S. Congress during the present session, will go into effect August 1, Postmaster Clyde Griffith, has announced.

The new rates will affect all classes of mailings with the exception of parcel post, which experienced a rate raise a year or

First-class letters, long transported by the familiar purple three-center or the fancy memorial issues which you bought in sheets, will now require four cents and the three cent stamp will now be required on local mailings and post cards, heretofore costing only two cents.

Air mail stamps will be raised from 6c to 7c, the air mail not exceeding 8 ounces and air mail postal cards will sell at 5c each. On the second class mail, transient rate, the first two ounces will be at 2c and each additional ounce at 1 c. Third class mail will be raised to 3c for the first two ounces and 11/2c for each additional ounce. Books will be mailed at 9c for the first pound and 5c for each additional pound or fraction.

With all the rate increases in other classifications of mail as provided in the new postal law, it is surprising to find a tremendous liberalization of the air parcel post overseas mailing maximum weight and size package. Under the old rules, air parcel post packages were limited to 2 pounds and in size not over 30 inches combined length and

The new rules raise the maximum weight limit to 70 pounds and the maximum length and girth measurement to 100 inches.
