BIG GAS FIND REPORTED ON GOODE ESTATE RANCH IN ELLENBURGER

Ellenburger gas has been reported found in Richardson and Bass No. 1 Goode Estate, section 6, Block R, in eastern Terrell County. Location is two sections north and one section west of Brown-Bassett No. 1, confirmation well in the designated Brown-Bassett Field. Operator ran a drillstem test from 13,596-687 feet with tool open 3 hours and 10 minutes. Gas surfaced in 2 hours and 17 minutes at the rate of 19,300 cubic feet per day. Recovery was one 500-foot gas-cut water blanket and 100 feet of gas-cut mud. Drilling continued below 13,780 feet in lime.

SEAL COAT ON U.S. 90 IN TOWN

The Texas Highway Department maintenance crew here has been busy since the first of the week applying a seal coat to U.S. 90 through Sanderson. The streets were cleaned thoroughly Monday and Tuesday and the seal coating began early Wednesday morning. Some reconstruction of N.S. 90 through Pecos County is scheduled to begin in the near future. The reconstruction will consist of widening the right-of-way, and relocation, in places, of the roadbed, with construction of some small structures.

Voters To Poll 3 Times In Week

JULY PRIMARY TO BE SATURDAY

The July Democratic Primary will be on Saturday, July 26 in the four precincts of the county, according to W. W. Sudduth, county Democratic chairman. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. and persons 21 to 60 must have a poll tax receipt or exemption to vote. Polling places will be in the regular sites within the precinct for the primary.

WATER DISTRICT VOTE AUGUST 1 FOR APPROVAL

The board of directors for the proposed water district met on Monday night to discuss possibilities of the water district to be presented to the voters of the district on August 1. As has been pointed out many times, the voting August 1 will be only for the confirmation of the proposed water district with no other involvements of any kind. All qualified voters within the proposed district may vote on the proposition Friday, August 1. The bounds of the proposed district include all residents of Sanderson, and take in no houses other than those considered to be within the town. The actual geographic boundaries of the proposed district follow certain lines that are not necessarily section lines and may be described more generally to include all of the townsite.

SCHOOL TAX VOTE SET FOR JULY 29

Qualified tax paying resident voters will be eligible to vote on Tuesday, July 29, for approval or disapproval of the maintenance tax rate for the Terrell County Independent School District. The board of the school district is asking voters to approve a \$1.50 per \$100.00 assessed valuation as the tax rate to apply for maintenance of the independent school district. The \$1.50 tax will be plus a bond retirement tax now in effect of 33c per \$100 assessed valuation or a total of \$1.83 per \$100 valuation. The board is asking the approval of the tax rate by the voters in order to have a small additional amount of money for operation of the local district in the coming year. Voters will vote in their own precincts from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

 400 in extra pipe, well supplies fittings, a vehicle, and other items of normal operation, which will be sold at actual inventory prices.
 CPS officials also have agreed to permit Jimmy Caroline, local manager, to manage the utility under the district government pending action of the directors.
 CPS has agreed, according to the directors, to sell electricity for pumping at a flat rate to all pumps combined, rather than metering each pump, as is now done.

CPS has presented a financial statement to the directors showing net profit of the past 5 years along with cost of operation. The report shows that approximately \$17,000 was the lowest net income during the 5-year period and that approximately \$23,000 was the highest net income. The figures included all cost, administrative, operational, maintenance, depreciation, and taxes, in computing the net gain, the directors stated.

In the purchase of the utility, the directors have the following

figures as the most accurate available: the water utility, \$166,000; inventory, \$2,400; engineers' fees, \$2,500; attorney fees, \$2,500; miscellaneous expense, \$3,000; and includes a reserve fund of \$15,000 making a proposed bond issue necessary for \$190,000.00.

Since the water district would not be taxed for its income, CPS officials state that they will gain \$1,000 in net income there; they also state there will be a \$1,000 per annum saving on electricity bill under their proposed plan, making a \$2,000 per year gain in net income for the water district over that possible by CPS under their own operation.

With the lowest net income at \$17,000 per year, there could be applied \$9,500 to the bond re-

tirement (based on 5 per cent), and \$9,500 applied toward the principal. Thus with the change of ownership, and based on the lowest net income of the owners the water district could purchase the present utility at the owners' asking price and pay for it in 20 years with no change in method of operation of any kind. These figures are based on a continuation of all present conditions.

The present directors stated there were no plans or consideration for exploration within the near future, no higher or lower water rates under the present set up, and no additional water was definite at this time.

The directors asked that all qualified voters consider carefully all points of the proposal and direct any unanswered questions to them prior to voting time.

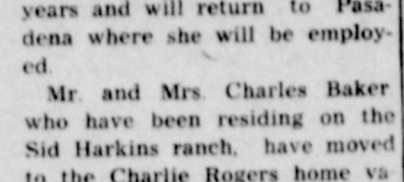
