## Goode Well Producer Looms With Repeated Gas Strikes

Indications for a third strong gas producer in the Brown-Bassett field were indicated with recent tests by the Richardson and Bass No. 1 Goode Estate. Location is on section 6, Block R, TCRR Survey.

Most recent tests released were indications of multi-level production in the Ellenburger, similar to pay found in the Brown-Bassett No. 1 and 2 drilled by Magnolia Petroleum Co. and Western Natural Gas Co.

On latest test operator left tool open one hour and 17 minutes. Gas surfaced in 13 minutes, flowing at 2,846,000 cubic feet per day rate. Water blanket began surfacing in 24 minutes. Recovery was 125 feet of water blanket. Flowing pressure was 1,415-1,780 pounds and 45-minute shut-in pressure was 6,905 pounds.

Earlier production from the Ellenburger in this hole was 4,915,000 cubic feet daily on a test between 14,387-603 feet.

The project is 1.7-8 mile northwest of Silurian gas discovery well and 3.5-8 miles northwest of the Brown-Bassett No. 2.

Confirmation was released on the Magnolia Petroleum Co. No. 1 Bassett Mineral Trust 5.8 mile southwest of the Richardson and Bass No. 1 Goode Estate. The contract depth is 14,800 feet. Project well is 2,186 feet from the west line of T28-Y-TCRR and 1,980 feet from north line of same section. It is also 1.3-8 miles northwest of Brown-Bassett No. 1.

## School Board Action Told

Below is a resume of the action of the Terrell County Independent School District Board since its organization, as reported by Supt. Matt Bader.

Elected Herbert Brown, president; James Caroline, vice-president; A. J. Hahn, secretary.

Established the regular meeting of the Board on the 1st Tuesday of every month at 7:30 p.m.

Employed Hunter Cherry, CPA, to audit the school financial records for the 1957-58 school term. The audit is required by law.

Decided to advertise for bids for gasoline, fuel oil, and butane gas to be used during the 1958-59 school term.

The Board approved an FFA bank loan for a maximum of \$3,000.00 which is to be used in financing the feed for projects for members of the FFA.

The Board approved the payment of \$500.00 down and a three-year option on a proposed site for building of a new elementary school. The total purchase price of the property from the Joe Kerr Estate will be \$5,000.00 when final purchase is completed.

The school budget for the 1957-58 school term was amended by adding to various expenditures headings. This was taken from unappropriated funds of the budget.

The school budget for the 1958-59 term was discussed at length, and after some changes, the board recommended that it be presented at a public hearing as prescribed by law.

The board decided to use the county tax assessor-collector for collecting the taxes for the Terrell County Independent School District for the 1958-59 school term. Therefore, the property valuations will be the same again as the valuations for State and County purposes.

The school district has designated the Sanderson State Bank as its depository for the next two years.

The tax rate of the Terrell County Independent School District was officially set at \$1.50 for maintenance, 18c for interest and sinking fund No. 1, and 15c for interest and sinking fund No. 3 per \$100 valuation. This is an over-all tax rate of \$1.83 per \$100 valuation.

The Board voted that all children that are to be transported in the school bus must live two miles or more from school.

W. V. Munson was employed by the school district as truant officer in order to improve the average daily attendance.

The following policy regarding Vocational Agriculture was adopted by the board: Agriculture students will be allowed to attend a maximum of one major livestock show per year on school time, whether he is supervised on the trip by the agriculture teacher or by his parent. If a student attends more than one major show per year on school time, his absence from school will be unexcused. The vocational agriculture teacher will be allowed to attend one major show per year on school time, the show he is to attend will be designated by the superintendent. His expenses will not be paid for attending any additional shows, whether on school time or on his own time.

## Primary Choice In Terrell County Seeks Run-off Votes

The leading candidate for Place 1 Supreme Court in the first primary has issued a statement urging all voters to take a personal interest in the run-off election to be Saturday.

Robert W. Hamilton, who led the ticket by more than 160,000 votes in the first primary said: "Each voter should decide for himself which candidate is best qualified, then be sure to take time to vote Saturday, remembering that the Supreme Court has a greater potential effect upon our rights as individuals than any other office in our state or nation."

Texas is one of the states which allows its citizens the privilege of voting upon members of its Supreme Court and each Texas voter should express his preference in this election even though in some cases this will be the only race on the ballot.

Hamilton carried Terrell County in the first primary. He is a native of El Paso.

Hamilton is a veteran jurist now serving as Chief Justice 8th Court of Civil Appeals, just one step in rank below the Supreme Court post for which he is candidate. He has 31 years' experience in general practice, as county and district attorney, district judge and including five years as Chief Appeals Justice.

Justice Hamilton was selected as the preferred candidate of Texas lawyers in a secret vote conducted by the State Bar and he led the field of three candidates with a total of 476,799 votes in the first primary, less than seven percent short of a majority which would have given him a victory without a run-off.

## Brown-Bassett No. 2 Proves 68,500,000 Cu. Ft. Dry Gas

According to an Associated Press news release from Tulsa, Okla., on August 16, the Oil and Gas Journal said that a new giant gas field is in the making in West Texas.

The Journal stated that the geologists who have studied Terrell County's Brown-Bassett area considered the one-well infant a forerunner of what may become West Texas' biggest and most prolific gas field, excluding the Panhandle gas producing area.

The story stated that drilling, has proved at least 10 sections of thick Ellenburger gas pay plus a prolific Fusselman gas zone.

Geological experts were reportedly predicting drilling eventually might cover some 70 sections or about 45,000 acres.

The second big gas producing well for Terrell County was finished last week and tested to produce 68,500,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

It was the Magnolia Petroleum Co.-Western Natural Gas Co. No. 2 Brown-Bassett, located on section 216 of Block Y, TCRR Survey.

The producer was said to be of dry gas.

Tests at the well revealed several producing strata within the Ellenburger formation and an aggregated production totaled the designated calculated open flow potential of the well.

Brown-Bassett No. 1, the field opener, was calculated to have an absolute open flow of 75,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily through Silurian perforations and a larger flow of gas from the Ellenburger. The No. 1 well was not completed as a dual producer, only from the Silurian.

Another project two miles northwest of the field opener has indicated production in the Ellenburger. It is the Richardson & Bass No. 1 Goode Estate on section 6 in Block R, TCRR Survey. This project flowed gas at the rate of 4,915,000 cubic feet daily on a drillstem test between 14,387-603 feet. It was last reported bottomed at 14,803 taking a test.

Also 1.5-8 miles southeast of the Ellenburger discovery, Magnolia and Western Natural Gas No. 2 Banner Estate in section 30, Block 161 GC&SF RR Survey, was drilling at 9,348 feet in lime and shale. It flowed gas at the rate of 4,290,000 cubic feet daily from the Wolfcamp at 5,127 feet.

According to the operator, this is the same section as the shut-in Hoge producers, which were identified as Pennsylvania producers when completed in 1931.

Continental No. 1 Brown-Bassett has begun operation and is reported to be below 500 feet.

Guif Oil Corp. has filed application to drill a 15,200 feet rotary wildcat to be known as the No. 1 R. E. Prosser. Location will be on a 25,560.77-acre lease, 660 feet from the south and west lines of section 45, Block 1, TCRR Survey. This location is approximately 11 miles west of the field opener Brown-Bassett No. 1.

It has been pointed out that currently there is no outlet for the gas potential in the completed well. It is said that Magnolia Petroleum Co. and Western Natural Gas Co. have signed a preliminary contract with El Paso Natural Gas Co. to take the gas providing sufficient reserves are developed to make laying a pipeline feasible. The line would be probably tied into the El Paso's system in Puckett gas area in Pecos County, it is said.

## ASC Committee To Be Elected

Ballots for the Terrell County ASC Committee election will be mailed Friday to all known eligible voters. Ballots may be marked and returned by mail or may be brought to the ASC office, but they must be received by 5 p.m. September 5, to be counted.

Anyone who does not receive a ballot and is eligible to vote may call at the local ASC office for a ballot.

Nominees whose names appear on the ballot are: Don Allen, J. W. Carruthers, Jr., Roy Deaton, W. G. Downie, Jack Hardgrave, E. E. Harkins, Jr., Jack Harrell, Vic Littleton, Austin Nance, and Jack Riggs. Write-in votes are acceptable, provided the voter votes for no more than five people, according to F. M. Wood, Jr., local office manager.

The person receiving the most votes will be chairman, second highest vote receiver will be vice-chairman, person receiving the third highest number of votes will be a regular member, and so on through the second alternate, Wood concluded.

do many other needed things also.

There could be other things, too.

Think of a local police department in Sanderson and a part-time, if not full time, fire department and more and finer fire equipment.

We're not talking about improvement for now — but possible additions in the future which may be forthcoming.

The Kerr well may be sitting right in the middle of a future development program on the outskirts of town, yes, possibly just beyond the city limits.

Where does this leave you and me?

We shudder thinking of it. Are we, as citizens and business men, going to be able to do what is best for the town of Sanderson, remembering as time goes on, that we are to keep abreast of things? We hope that will be our policy.

Keeping abreast — not ahead or behind — will take a lot of forethought, a lot of understanding, a lot of united efforts, and a lot of doing.

Let's continue our spirit of unity in our future planning and work for Sanderson and Terrell County, and not for ourselves alone.

We cannot control the development of gas, oil or the progressive development of any existing or new community in the county, including Sanderson.

But we can keep abreast or lag behind.

The swimming pool idea apparently caught like dead grass in a windstorm. Several people have told us of their approval of the proposal. We have talked with several people our age and older (beyond the age of capering about in shorts) and they, too, expressed favor of such an idea even though they, like us would not be caught other than dead in a swimming pool now.

We understand the Lions Club backed the idea 100 per cent. Others may have, too, but we did not hear about them.

Most people are talking in long range terms of a park adjacent to a pool. We would think that there was no other thing to plan for on a long-range basis.

Like we said several weeks ago, it's going to be interesting to watch things develop around here. If we have a choice, we won't miss it for anything.

## Dove Season Opens September 1

Dove season opens in this area September 1 and a big harvest of the swift-winged birds is expected to be reaped by sportsmen of the area.

Hunting is in the afternoon until sunset with a bag limit of 10 and a possession limit of 10.

A hunting license is required for dove hunters in Terrell County, but the big game license, good for all game in Texas during the coming seasons, may be purchased to cover all types of hunting of game animals and birds.

The date for the deer season west of the Pecos River has been set officially as December 1-8, according to information received from the executive secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission. It will be an eight-day season and will include one week-end.

The bag limit is unchanged — two buck deer, a whitetail and mule or blacktail, or two white tails.

Members of the commission stated that the early December season would probably be retained in years to come so there will not be any further uncertainty.

It was a general consensus of ranchmen and game officials and sportsmen that the later date would be preferable and provide a better hunting period.
