Democrats Sweep County Gilbreath Named J.P. Precinct 1

Democrats swept the election in Terrell County Tuesday, naming all nominees of that party by a wide margin.

Unofficial returns show 312 votes cast in precinct 1; 48 votes in precinct 2; 12 votes in precinct 3; and 6 votes in precinct 4.

J. A. Gilbreath got 174 votes for Justice of the Peace of Precinct 1 and C. G. Riggins got 137 votes. W. G. Downie got 1 write-in vote. Gilbreath and Riggins were candidates for the office on a write-in campaign.

Net Wire Diversions To Be Used On Two Area Ranches

Locations for net wire diversions have been staked on the Brown ranch at Longfellow and on the Downie ranch north of Sanderson.

The diversion on the Downie ranch will take water from an overflow range site and allow it to spread on an adjacent deep soil range site.

The diversion on the Brown ranch will be installed as part of the water spreading system that can be seen from U.S. Highway 90. The diversion will divert more low water out of Sanderson Canyon into the system.

The Brown and Downie ranches have soil and water conservation agreements with the Rio Grande-Pecos River SCD. The Soil Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture assists ranchers in carrying out plans that are approved by the district.

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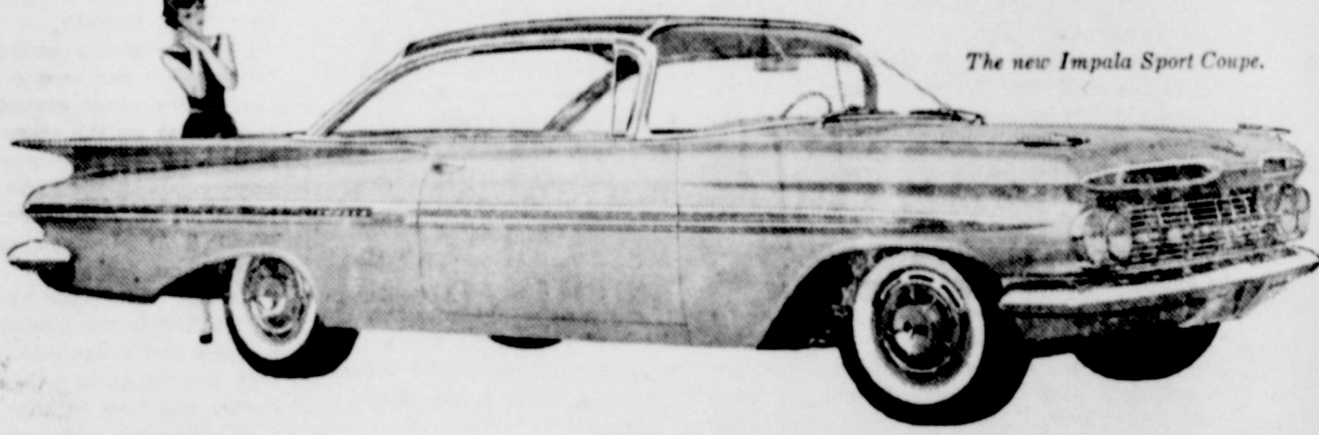
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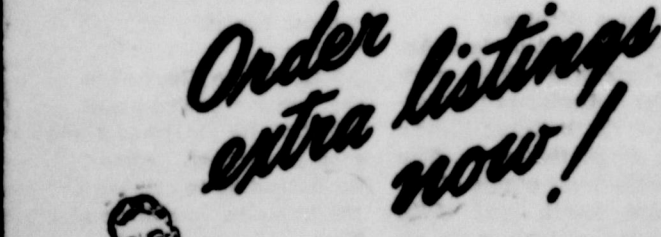
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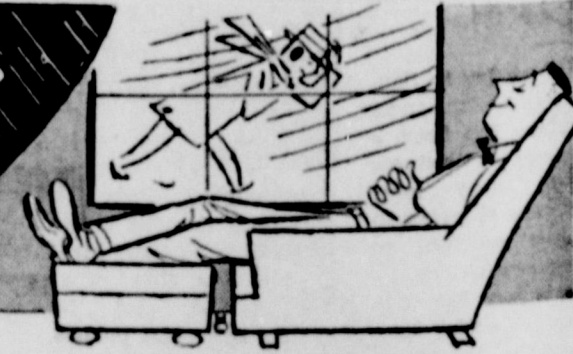

J. T. Rutherford Reports On Meeting At Merfa Last Week

Delegates from Terrell County attended a flood control, water and soil conservation meeting in Merfa Tuesday of last week to discuss West Texas problems.

The meeting, called by Congressman J. T. Rutherford, drew 238 people from some eight West Texas counties.

Rutherford said he felt the conference "had shown the people what they can and cannot do, and has given us a definite course to follow".

The Congressman and other federal officials explained most of the flooding in the Presidio area recently was due to the Rio Conchos in Mexico. The U.S. has urged Mexico to construct a dam on that river, they said, but has no real jurisdiction there.

He intends to ask Congress for funds to establish a survey of the area to look toward possible small dam construction. Rutherford said even if that goal is obtained it would be "more than a period of months" before any work could actually get underway.




