Mr. Zuberbueler will take over the duties of the office on Jan. 1, 1959. The site for the office for the school tax assessor-collector has not been chosen.

Mr. Zuberbueler listed his qualifications as follows: BBA Degree from Baylor University with instructions in accounting, typing, business and constitutional law; served on tax equalization boards in Edwards County for school district for two years, experience in public business in mercantile store and lumber yard. Both boys and girls games will be played on the local hardwood Tuesday night. The visiting teams will be from Marathon.


The fray will be the first for the boys' team for the current season.

Deer, Quail Season Opens December 1

Two more shooting seasons on important species will open Dec. 1 according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. Of widest importance will be the opening of quail season, with a bountiful crop reported throughout the state. The deer season west of the Pecos also will open at that time. Shooting quail will be legal until Jan. 16, but trans-Pecos deer season will end December 8.

There is a bountiful crop of quail in this area of the state, according to area ranchmen, but rugged terrain and heavy brush coverage makes hunting the birds very difficult. Most all coveys of quail seen recently have been large in number.

Deer Hides Asked By Hospitals

Austin, Nov. 24 — Deer hides to be tanned into buckskin for state hospital patients' use began piling up at the Austin Taxidermist Studio in the first week of the hunting season. Cooperation of locker plant operators is credited wth accelerated collection.

Sponsored by the Volunteer Services Council for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools, the annual collection provides soft leather from which patients fashion such items as purses gloves, moccasins, and billfolds. Previously designated for tuberculosis patients, a sufficient supply is being sought this year for all the hospitals and special schools, according to Mrs. Malcolm Gregory of Austin, Volun-

"We're optimistic, too, that it can be done," Mrs. Gregory said, "because this year the Texas Independent Meat Dealers Association has endorsed this project and is asking its locker plant and meat industry members throughout the state to accept and ship the hides to Austin where they are cured and stored for tanning

Motor freight lines for several years have hauled the hides without charge when they are marked "charity" and consigned to the Austin Taxidermist Studio 2708 Fredericksburg Road, Austin. For the past two years, Air Force Reservists have utilized a West Coast training mission to transport the collection to the tannery

Employee benefits for patrolmen include annual vacations, sick leaves, a modern retirement program, low cost insurance, new uniforms, travel expenses, holidays, longevity pay and promotion opportunities.

Hole Rumored in North County

It has been unofficially revealed that Ohio Oil Co. is drilling a well in the north part of the county. The well will be on University land and drilling is expected to begin very soon.

The source revealed the well to be on section 14 of Block 37 on the Burch Woodard ranch.

The land is a part of the large block of minerals leased on University of Texas land by the oil company. Site of the well is more closely identified as north of Independence Creek and about 3½ miles north of the ranch house of Clarence Jessup.

Drilling News -

Conoco Nó. 1 Brown-Bassett is below 14,146 feet in the Ellenburger dolomite. On a one-hour drillstem test between 13,950-14,-122 feet, recovery was 120 feet of mud with no shows. Gas surfaced in 15 minutes but no gauges were used.

Location is on section 227 of Block Y.

Texas - Pacific No. 1-A Dunlap was last reported at 13,570 feet in Ellenburger dolomite. On a drill-stem test between 13,345-522 feet, recovery was the 6,000 foot water blanket and 30 feet of slightly gas-cut mud. Flowing pressure was 2,695 pounds; 30-minute shut-in pressure was 3,070 pounds. Location is on the George W. Hudson Survey in Block I.

Magnolia No. 2 Banner Estate is bottomed at 14,340 feet and running tubing for preparation to test Ellenburger open hole between 14,180-340 feet. Location is on section 30 Block 161

Pan American Petroleum Co. is drilling on its No. 1 Ethel Corder on section 30 of Block 2 in the northwest corner of Terrell County. Unofficial information is that operator is approximately 1,000 feet deep on new project.

Reports are unofficial this week on the No. 1A Beulah Mc-Cue, but it is rumored that operator is about 1,700 feet and has had considerable trouble making hole and keeping straight. Location is on section 9, Block R-2.

'Mail Early' Plea By Post Office

Postmaster Clyde Griffith said this week "Christmas seems quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early for Christmas' campaign immediately, because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all-time record for mailings".

The Postmaster said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is check your Christmas cards to be sure that addresses are correct.

Be sure to use only first class four cent, or seven cent air mail postage on Christmas cards out of town. All cards sent by first class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards mailed for three cents.

Through the fine cooperation of the public during recent years, Postmaster Griffith reports that great progress has been made in getting the Christmas mails out on time. He is making advance preparations to handle the 1958 Christmas mail rush.

Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points should be mailed first, preferably well before December 10, and those for nearby points should be mailed by December 15, or at least a week before Christmas.


