Banner Well Completed; Conoco B-B 1 Hits Gas

The Brown-Bassett multipay gas field of eastern Terrell County gained its fourth Ellenburger producer and a southeast extension to that pay with completion of the Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s No. 2 Banner Estate for a calculated absolute open flowing potential of 29,000,000 cubic feet of gas per day. Production was from Ellenburger open hole between 14,140-340 feet. The well will not be completed from the Silurian, the other Brown-Bassett field pay. Location of the well is 2,352 feet from the north, 2,000 feet from the west lines of section 30, Block 161 in the GC&SF Survey.

The third Ellenburger producer and an extension to that pay in the Brown-Bassett (Silurian and Ellenburger) gas field of Terrell County has been indicated with the flowing of gas on a grillstem test at the Brown-Bassett No. 1 of Conoco Oil Co. The well is in section 227 of Block Y. The tool was open for one hour and 32 minutes on the test between 14,122-310 feet. Gas surfaced in eight minutes, no fluid. Gas flowed at the rate of 1,410,000 cubic feet per day. Operator was drilling below 14,402 feet in lime and dolomite on a 16,000 foot project. The project earlier indicated Fusselman gas production, flowing at the estimated rate of 9,515,000 cubic feet daily on a test between 12,490-654 feet.

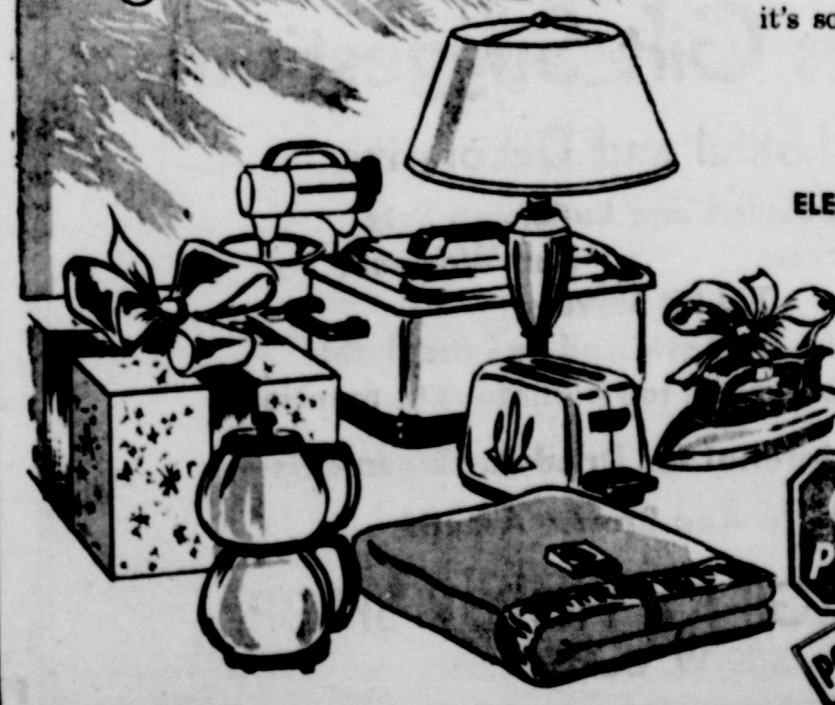
