LISTEN TO LUKE

Mark 10:13-15 — And they brought young children to Him, that He should touch them: and His disciples rebuked those that brought them. But when Jesus saw it, He was much displeased, and said unto them, Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the Kingdom of God. Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the Kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein.

The excitement of realizing that there is a powerful and good God concerned with our lives is working beyond human knowledge first came to many of us as children at Christmas time. Santa Claus and gifts, the tinsel and Christmas trees, the dinner and fun with friends and family set the stage. Experimental Conversion Plant For Saline Water a Possibility

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson received a letter from Congressman J. T. Rutherford this week stating that the Department of Interior plans the construction of five saline or brackish water experimental conversion plants in West Texas.

The purpose of such plants, according to Rutherford, will be to experiment at first hand on the feasibility of converting saline or brackish water into fresh, useable water. Only one of the plants will be assigned to the "Southwest area of the United State" according to the letter, and the five plants will cost \$2 million each.

He stated that the selection of the sites will be made within the next few months and money probably will be appropriated in the first session of the 86th Congress which convenes in January.

Enclosed with the letter to Judge Wilkinson was a form to be filled out as application for such a plant in this area.

Cold Weather Lingers Here

Cold weather has lingered in this area for the past several days and thermometers have been lower than usual for this time of the year, according to some residents.

Reports have come in of 12 degrees on one morning with warm weather during mid-day some of the days.

A few of the days have been near-freezing all day with little or no sunshine, but most recent days have been much warmer.

Heavy frost has been prevalent most of the mornings, assuring the killing of growth of weeds, brush, trees, and shrubs during the winter months.

Some light snow flakes fell for a few minutes one day last week end, but were hardly noticeable as they fell.

Vasquez was a former Fort Stockton High School athlete and played short stop on the baseball team from that city during recent years.

The accident was the second fatality for Terrell County during the current year as a result of traffic accidents.

Exclusion Hearing Set For January 15 By Water Board

January 15 is the date set for the exclusion hearing by the board of the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1.

The purpose of the hearing is to offer any property owner the privilege of stating his reasons for his desire to be excluded from the district.

The hearing will be at 10 a.m. in the county court room at the court house in Sanderson.

Roughly, the water district in-

cludes all houses considered to be in the town of Sanderson or on the plat of the townsite. It also includes some property west of Sanderson near the Texas Highway Department maintenance yard.

Any person who has property which he thinks might be included within the boundary of the district and feels that he might want to be excluded from the district, is advised to ascertain the location of the boundaries and of his land and ascertain certain facts concerning petition for exclusion in order to conform to the laws governing and controlling the exclusion hearing and petitions for exclusion.

New Location In B-B Field Staked

Magnolia Petroleum Co. has located its No. 1 State-Brown, a 6,000-foot Wolfcamp test, 1 1/8 miles southwest of its No. 2 Banner Estate, recent Ellenburger producer in the Brown-Bassett (Silurian and Ellenburger) field in eastern Terrell County.

Location is on a 640-acre lease and is 550 feet from the north and 2,390 feet from the east lines of section 32, Block 161 in the GC&SF Survey.

The No. 2 Banner Estate indicated production in the Wolfcamp sand with the flowing of gas at the rate of 4,290,000 cubic feet daily while drilling at 5,127.

The new test is also approximately 2 1/4 miles southwest of the shut-in wells in the Hoge Ranch area, which when completed at approximately 3,150-440 feet were identified as Pennsylvania producers.

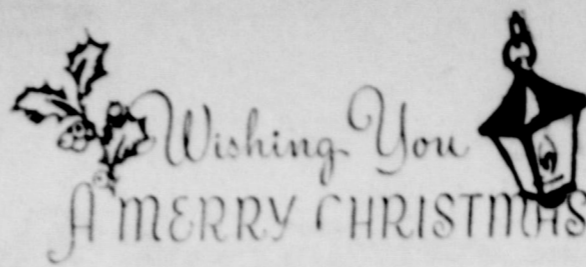

Home Mortgage Credit Program Aids FHA Loans

The Voluntary Home Mortgage Credit Program has demonstrated its ability to assist the low and medium income families in small towns to obtain FHA financing. The Program statistics reveal that a very high percentage of the loans placed were for persons in the \$2500 to \$5000 per year income group. The majority of loans were for purchase of homes in the \$7000 to \$9000 price range. These figures were furnished by C. J. Hermann, executive secretary of VHMCP. Region IV which comprises the states of the

mid-South, including Texas. The Regional Office is located at 1114 Commerce St. Dallas 2, Texas.

"At this time," Hermann said, "due to the unrealistic VA interest rate, we have no lenders participating in the Program making GI loans." Hermann commented, however, that there were many lending institutions participating in the Program making FHA loans.

"I'm afraid people in the small towns are not taking advantage of the splendid mortgage plan offered by FHA," Hermann added. "It is possible and even probable that many do not understand that FHA mortgage loans can be obtained in the smaller towns provided they meet FHA minimum

standards."

VHMCP is a Program designed to assist individuals in small towns (under 25,000) to obtain FHA insured loans if there is no local source for such funds. The Program does not make loans but merely serves as a clearing house to bring together willing lenders and qualified borrowers. Application forms or additional information may be obtained by writing to Hermann at the above address.

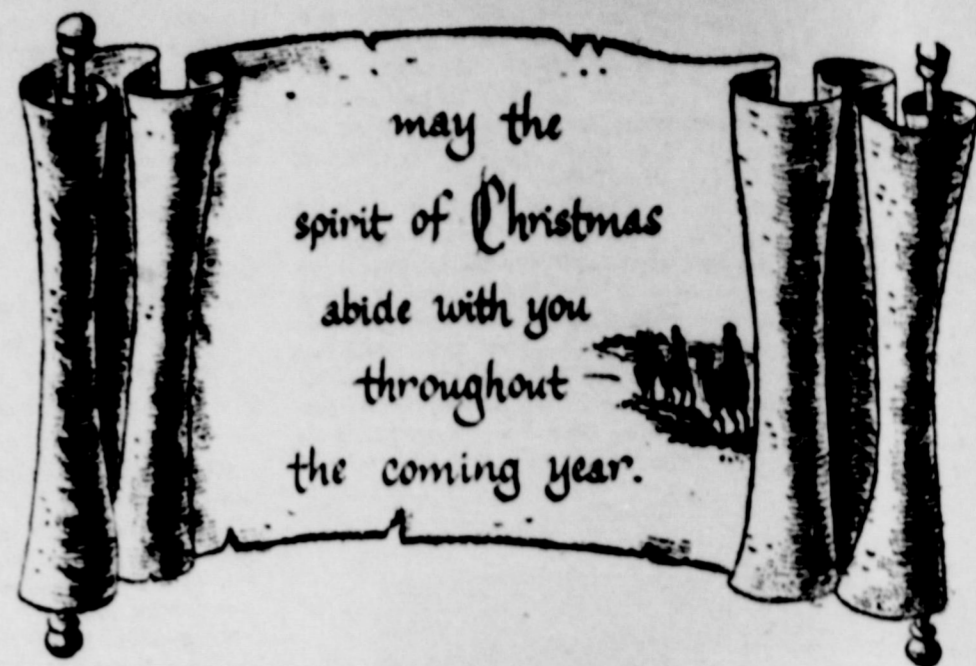

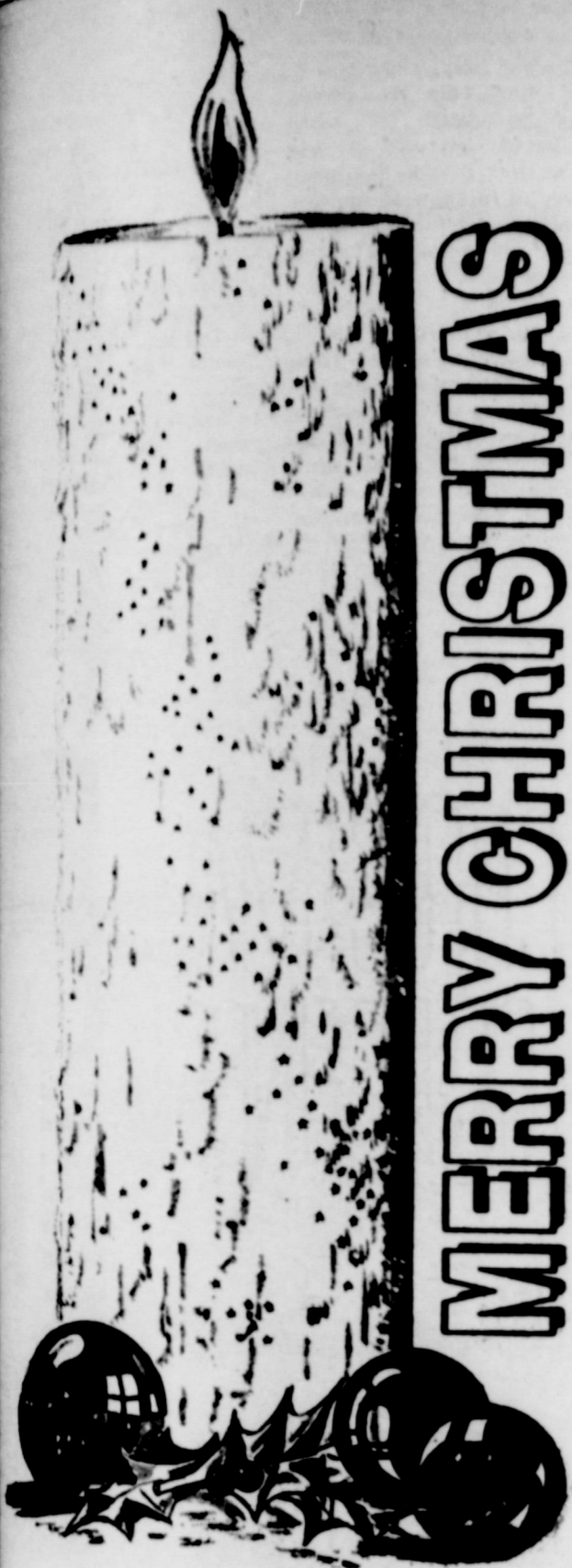

Cause of TB In Young Girls Being Studied

Treatment and prevention of tuberculosis in children — and the reasons why young girls break down with TB—are being studied under Christmas Seal medical research grants from tuberculosis associations.

Dr. John W. Middleton, president of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and associate professor of medicine at the Medical Branch, The University of Texas, announced today that four centers in Texas were cooperating in a large-scale study designed to improve care of children with tuberculosis. Those centers are in Corpus Christi, Dallas, Houston and El Paso.

Exact purpose of the study, according to Dr. Middleton, is to find out whether serious complications can be prevented by giving a drug, isoniazid, to children when first infected by tuberculosis.

The study was organized and coordinated by the U.S. Public Health Service. A medical research grant from the National

Tuberculosis Association supplements federal funds.

Almost 3,000 children are now under observation. Some of the children are receiving isoniazid; some are receiving dummy pills. Preliminary reports indicate that fewer complications are arising among children receiving isoniazid.

"The study is one of two on tuberculosis in children being aided by Christmas Seal grants," Dr. Middleton said. "Another clinical study concerns tuberculosis in adolescence."

More Americans Learning of Lamb At Food Delicacy

Americans are learning more about lamb, thanks to a program of advertising and promotion that the sheepmen of the United States are sponsoring with their own funds.

Many of the misconceptions about lamb are being disproved as lamb producers seek to build up the market for their products through their own promotional organization, the American Sheep Producers Council.

G. N. Winder of Denver, Colo., president of the Council, said that much has been done to combat the false impressions many consumers have about lamb. He cited the mistaken impression that many veterans received overseas "What they were eating was not lamb as it is produced in this country, but some kind of meat

prepared under the worst possible conditions," Winder declared.

Another condition which the Council is attempting to correct is that almost 75 percent of the lamb consumed in this country is eaten in the New England states, New York, and California. "There are many areas of this country," Winder declared, "where lamb is not available." We hope to broaden the demand so that many of these short supply areas will begin to use lamb, thus giving the sheepmen a broader outlet for lamb.

"This in turn," Winder said, "should improve returns to sheep growers and stabilize prices, which is a goal of the sheepman's self-help program."

The Council is also encouraging retailers and consumers to use all the cuts of lamb, not just the legs and chops. "There are more than 20 cuts of lamb that can provide a tasty and nutritious meal," Winder stated, "and as persons begin to use these cuts, it will ease the burden of profit from the legs and chops."

"We have had excellent response to the program," said Winder. "The sheep industry can be proud of its efforts to promote its own products."
