#### **Deer Season Boosts Economy Near Million \$**

The 8-day deer season recently closed boosted the economy of Terrell and Pecos Counties nearly one million dollars, according to sportsmen's organizations and game wardens of this area. There was an estimated 2,500

deer killed in the two counties by approximately 5,000 hunters. according to the game wardens. They also estimated that an average of \$200 was spent per hunter. Day leases ran from \$15 to \$20 per day on most area ranches, the game wardens reported, and this amount accounted for approximately half of the expense

of hunting, it was stated. The wardens also thought that this was the most successful season ever, with good weather accounting for much of the success of the hunters.

Figures kept by leasors, showed tht nearly every county in Texas was represented in the Trans-Pecos hunt this year.

Local hunters were not included in the above figures, it was

With so many hunters in the country this year, wardens and others were surprised that there were no accidents reported in the two-county area.

They also stated that violations were excessively light for such a large number of hunters.

Many ranchmen of the area leased out their property for hunting for the first time this year, and other ranchmen have expressed an opinion that they would lease their country next year if conditions warranted it depending also on the number of deer available, and their condi-

After Mrs. Warnock had been introduced by Mrs. E. E. Farley program chairman, she told of her interest in research in making a study of the parallels and contrasts in musical compositions and had chosen her pro-

gram numbers on the latter.

The seven numbers included: The Pines; Noturne II from Liebestraume; Balade, Op 16, No. 1; Clair de lune; The White Peacock from Roman Sketches; Four Little Poems. Op 22; and Spoon River, from American Folk Music.

# Cause of TB In Young Girls Being Studied

Treatment and prevention of tuberculosis in children — and the reasons why young girls break down with TB—are being studied under Christmas Seal medical research grants from tuberculosis associations.

Dr. John W. Middleton, president of the Texas Tuberculosis
Association and associate professor of medicine at the Medical
Branch, The University of Texas, announced today that four centers in Texas were cooperating in a large-scale study designed to improve care of children with tuberculosis. Those centers are in Corpus Christi, Dallas, Houston and El Paso.

Exact purpose of the study, according to Dr. Middleton, is to find out whether serious complications can be prevented by giving a drug, isoniazid, to children when first infected by tuberculosis.

The study was organized and coordinated by the U.S. Public Health Service. A medical research grant from the National

Tuberculosis Association supplements federal funds.

Almost 3,000 children are now under observation. Some of the children are receiving isoniazid; some are receiving dummy pills. Preliminary reports indicate that fewer complications are arising among children receiving ison-

"The study is one of two on tuberculosis in children being aided by Christmas Seal grants," Dr. Middleton said. "Another clinical study concerns tuberculosis in adolescence."
