A season for hunting doe deer in the Trans-Pecos area and particularly Terrell County has been advocated by some ranchmen of the county. The information was received last week-end and the source was quoted as from members of the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District. which includes most ranchmen of the county

Vandals Hit 44 Light Globes **During This Month**

Vandals have cost the county 44 light globes and lots of trouble to the Community Public Service Co. this month, according to R. S. Wilkinson, county judge, and

Jimmy Caroline, CPS manager. The county buys the bulbs from the utilities company at their cost and employees of the company install the bulbs as needed, according to Wilkinson.

Caroline stated that the company had installed 44 light bulbs in the residential area of Sanderson already this month, with several days to go, setting a record for this type of vandalism withi the town.

Caroline stated that it was evident that the bulbs were being shot out by air rifles or .22 calibre guns, because the reflectors were damaged and many had holes in them as a result of the high-powered rifles or pellet

One of the mercury-arc type lights on U.S. 90 or Oak St. had also been shot out. This type light and bulb cost about as much as all the 44 regular bulbs which were broken.

With the coming of many new air rifles at Christmas time, county officials and the utilities company employees are concerned over possible future losses of this

The lights were installed in the esidential area of Sanderson at no expense to the county and was for the convenience and safety of residents. Lack of streets lights on several corners in town during one night is inconvenient and a loss of a safety factor for the residents of that area. There is also a loss to the taxpayers of the county in the broken bulbs.

Parents are asked to caution their children of the harm of such actions and are asked to be on the lookout for such vandalism by possibly older boys.



TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

BARON de BASTROP

Every Texas school child knows the inspiring story of Moses and Stephen F. Austin, but few remember that these

inspiring story of Moses and Stephen F. Austin, but few remember that these two champions of freedom had a friend whose wisdom, skill and diplomacy made their great colonization project possible. This first friend of the Austins was Felipe Enrique Neri, Baron de Bastrop. Historians disagree as to who he was. Through the intervention of the Baron, the Governor reconsidered. After Moses Austin's death, failure again confronted his son, Stephen F. Austin. But again

the advice and active assistance of de Bastrop cleared the way. Stephen F. Austin was able to prove the quality of his leadership and to become the "Father of Texas." Throughout a life of public service the Baron de Bastrop championed the rights of the settlers who were to build a great republic and a great state.


