Water Board Seeks Information From **Bonding Firms**

The board of directors of the Terrell County Water Conservation and Improvement District No. 1 has had several meetings in recent weeks for the purpose of interviewing representatives of bonding firms of the state in preparation for the possible selling of bonds. If the bond issue for the purchase of the local water utility carries, when it comes to a vote, the board will have the responsibility of selling the bonds to a bonding company at the best terms available.

The water board, besides hearing applications from bonding firms, has been gathering information on the best method of handling the bonds, etc.

The water board hopes to be able to bring the issue to a vote of the people as soon as possible and steps toward that occasion are being taken as expediently as is possible.

Members of the board stated that an issue as important as this should have all the preparation and all the information available so that there will be nothing left to the imagination of the voters when the issue comes before

Plans For Diablo Dam Told: Hopes High For Approval

Agreement between President Eisenhower and President Mateos of Mexico to proceed with the construction of the \$100 million Diablo Dam astride the Rio Grande upstream 11 miles from Del Rio has had the effect of an electric shock of energy in Del Rio and its entire area, with excitement running high in anticipation of the accelerated growin expected as a result of the agreement.

Construction of the dam, which will be 253 feet above the river bed below the confluence of the Rio Grande and Devil's River where the streams flow between canyon walls of rock. wil lflood a vast area, making relocation of railroad lines, highways, bridges and hydro-electric plants necessary. There will also be some re-location of certain utility lines.

An estimated 20 miles of railroad will be re-located and a similar span of highway. Estimates

are that the lake made by Diablo Dam will cover the San Pedro bridge on US 277 about 100 feet: cover the Devil's River steam plant. Devil's River Bridge on the highway on U.S. 90; both dams on Devil's River; the railroad bridge on Devil's River: and back water up for 25 miles up Devil's River. Water will be backed up some 80 miles along the Rio Grande. past Langtry, and the water level will be raised some 100 feet in the Pecos River. It is estimated that the Pecos River highway bridge and railtoad bridge will be only near 200 feet above the water when

Diablo 's filled. It is estimated that five years will be required for the construction of Diablo Dam following its approval by the Bureau of the Budget and Congress. Passage of the measure is expected to be much easier after the public approval given by the presidents of the two countries affected at their meeting in Acapulco last

At the peak of construction, between 500 and 1,000 men are expected to be employed on the dam which is to be 61/2 miles long with a total capacity extending the reservoir water 80 mtles with a shoreline of some 200

Engineers of the United States and Mexico made the site location above Del Rio for Diable The United States' share of the cost, estimated at \$100 million. will be 56.2 per cent or \$56,200,-000. The center section of con crete will be 1,950 feet in the river with the earth sections extending two miles in the United States and four miles in Mexico. The concrete section in the channel includes the spillway with a

capacity of 1,550,000 second feet. Flood control capacity is 1,775, 000 acre feet with additional flood super-storage sete at 335,-000,000 feet. Mexican conservation storage capacity is 1,314,000 acre feet and United States conservation storage 1,686,000 acre feet for a total of 5,660,000 acre feet.

The dam will have three penstocks at each side and the lake area at storage level of a million acre feet will cover 24,000 acres: at two million acre feet, cove, 44,000 acres and at three million feet, 59,500 acres. Filled to the top of conservation the storage level will cover 62,000 acres, engineers estimated.

Power generated from the dam will be a large item, but greatest benefits of the big Diablo will be for flood control. Without it. 18 major floods are possible within the next 57 years. Five years ago, Rio Grande floods cost the lives of hundreds of Piedras Negras citizens. Damage from the 1954 flood was estimated at 181/2 million dollars on the United States side of the Rio Grande alone.

Fish and wildlife benefits deriving from the dam are estimated at \$1,50,000 a year from commercial fishing, in addition to sportsman benefits, and recreational benefits have been estimated at \$720,000 for a total of \$5,385,000 annual benefits.


