## Water Bond Issue Vote To Be Held Here Tuesday

An election for approval or disapproval of a bond issue within the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 will be held Tuesday at the county courthouse. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. and, according to the Notice of Election, all qualified resident taxpayer voters who have property and have rendered the same for taxation will be allowed to vote.

The proposal is for a \$200,000 bond issue to purchase the local water utility now owned and operated by the Community Public Service Co.

Included in the sale will be all property and equipment now connected with the acquisition, storage, distribution, metering of water locally. It also includes the inventory of equipment and supplies incidental to the utility, including extra pipe, valves, fittings, well pulling equipment, and other related items.

The present owners have agreed to handle the billing of water users for a period of time to permit the water district to equip themselves with the necessary equipment for handling the billing and they have also agreed to permit Jimmy Caroline, present manager, to manage the utility for the district. The board has made arrangement with Mr. Caroline to manage the utility if the bond issue passes.

The present owners and the water board have also made arrangements with the T&NO railroad for leasing their water services which include wells, storage pipe, etc., at a \$10 per month basis and the railroad company has agreed to pay for water used at a rate which will bring more revenue to the district than the amount of the rental.

It was also pointed out that the acquisition of the railroad's wells would nearly double the present total water supply and that the operation of about three of the railroad's wells would furnish an amount of water to exceed the output of many more of the CPS wells, thus lowering operation and maintenance costs to the district for an equal amount of water.

Water Board President Greene Cooke stated that the acquisition of the water utility, in his opinion and in the opinion of the engineering and bonding firms was a very sound business venture and one most desirable to the residents of Sanderson.

He stated that with conservative management, the utility's operation could be without any burden to the taxpayers and would possibly lower water rates or make more water available at the present cost to local consumers in the future.

Mr. Cooke stated that it was the desire of the present owners to sell the utility and that in his

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## Ellenburger Shows Seen in Ohio Hole

Ohio Oil Co. No. 1-TA Ohio-Pure-University, located in section 14, Block 37 of Terrell County, recovered 2,000 feet of gas and 56 feet of gas-cut mud with a rainbow show of oil on a drillstem test in the Ellenburger. The test was made last week.

Operator was using a 5-8 by inch chokes on the 2-hour test taken between 13,345-447 feet. The flowing pressure was 1,168-1,191 pounds; 30-minute shut-in pressure was 1,566 pounds.

In later drillstem tests of 45-minutes between 13,352-632 feet, recovery was 626 feet of very slightly gas-cut mud, no shows. Flowing pressure was 1,640-680 pounds, 30-minute shut-in pressure was 2,105 pounds.

## FHA Modifies Program For Urban Building

It was announced by the Federal Housing Administration recently that the Certified Agency Program which has been handled on an experimental basis in various sections of the country for more than a year, is being expanded on a nation-wide basis.

It was stated that the program now is awaiting grant by Congress and mandatory training classes.

The purpose of the CAP is to enable FHA to serve the public better particularly in outlying areas which heretofore have not been reached by the established facilities. The method is to appoint carefully selected lenders, appraisers and construction inspectors to serve in their local areas in substantially the same way that our FHA offices presently serve the areas adjacent to the insuring offices.

CAP is also somewhat similar to the FHA Title I Property Improvement Loan Program.

Under CAP the FHA approved lenders will be appointed as authorized agents and working with qualified private appraisers, construction inspectors, builders, etc. will process their own loans, qualify borrowers and issue their own commitments under FHA regulations, loan ratios and terms.

When a loan is closed, it will be submitted to FHA for mortgage insurance covering 100 per cent of the loan.

The program is intended as a means of providing higher ratio, long-term mortgages to families who might otherwise be deprived of their benefits.

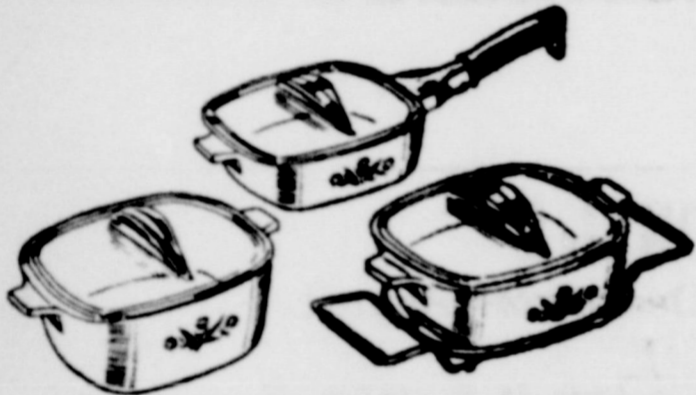

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — With just about a month left between now and May 15, the adjournment date is now or never time in the Texas Legislature.

Bill sponsors are challenging their members to "pass it or kill it." No more playing the waiting game. Less juggling of the parliamentary ball.

House Speaker Waggoner Carr gave this "get with it" mood a strong shove by taking a firm stand on tax goals. "There is no Santa Claus," Carr told House members Texas must raise \$300,000 in new money to meet its obligations," he said. On "how to do it," the Speaker made these suggestions and observations:

1. A bill is needed "which will include a broad array of selective taxes including, but not confined to — selective sales taxes."
2. A general sales tax is "out." Lawmakers will and should keep their promises not to pass one.
3. "Broad" taxation would include upping levies in areas suggested by the governor — natural gas, liquor, cigarettes, corporations — but at a lower rate than suggested by the governor. In addition, many new items would be added in keeping with the broad thin, hurt little" principle.
4. "Piece-meal taxation" is inadequate to the present challenge. State government should not "reward political favorites." New taxes should be spread across as much of the Texas economy as possible.
5. Likewise on appropriations, college professors and state employees get a raise, public school teachers should, too.

Carr's speech was regarded as a public announcement that he is taking the reins of leadership to a tax program passed.

Gov. Daniel's comment on Carr's statement was in the vein of "why didn't you say so before?" Daniel said, "I am in agreement with much of it and only wish it had been made 30 days earlier."

House Taxation Committee Chairman V. L. Ramsey named a five-man committee to write a tax bill and have it ready early next week.

Given the task are Reps. Wesley Roberts of Lamesa, H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock, Joe Burkett of Kerrville, Ben Atwell of Dallas and Warren C. Cowen of Fort Worth.

**Abandoned Property Bill**  
Governor's abandoned property bill has been reported favorably by the House Tax Committee, but sponsors claim it has been "gutted" by committee action.

As originally proposed, the bill would have allowed the state to take over bank accounts and money and property held by the banks, insurance companies, oil and gas companies, etc. if unclaimed for seven years.

As amended, the measure cut out all holdings except bank accounts and upped the waiting period to 20 years.

Rep. Marshall O. Bell of San Antonio sponsor, said this would take away 60 per cent of the revenue raising possibilities.

**Party Registration Fight**  
A watered-down party registration bill is in line for House consideration after approval of the Elections Committee.

Original proposal by Rep. Jamie Clements of Crockett would have required that a voter state his party preference and have it stamped on his poll tax at time of purchase. Thereafter, the carrier of a Republican receipt could not vote in a Democratic primary and vice versa.

Attorney General Will Wilson ruled this unconstitutional. He said it set up requirements for voting not authorized in the constitution.

As amended, the measure provides that a voter would have his receipt stamped when he voted in a primary or participated in party conventions. This would prevent his participating in the convention of a different party

until he bought a new poll tax.

Liberal Democrats, particularly DOT spokesmen, were very dissatisfied, even called the attorney general's opinion "dead wrong".

**Help for Buses**  
In this "two car in every garage" age, public transportation companies say they've fallen into hard times, and need tax relief.

A bill to lower the license fees on motor buses to a rate equal to trucks of the same weight has Senate Transportation Committee approval.

City transit companies are asking to be relieved of motor fuel taxes.

Transit companies are caught in a squeeze, say supporters, that makes it hard to continue serving working people at reasonable rates. San Antonio transit lines had to give up, were taken over by city government.

**Sunday Sale Ban**  
Senate has given final approval to a measure that would prohibit selling, buying or trading motor vehicles on Sunday.

Exempted would be persons who observe some other day than Sunday as the Sabbath, such as Seventh Day Adventists.

Bill had lively opposition from several senators whose argument was that it would "restrict competition in the name of Christianity."

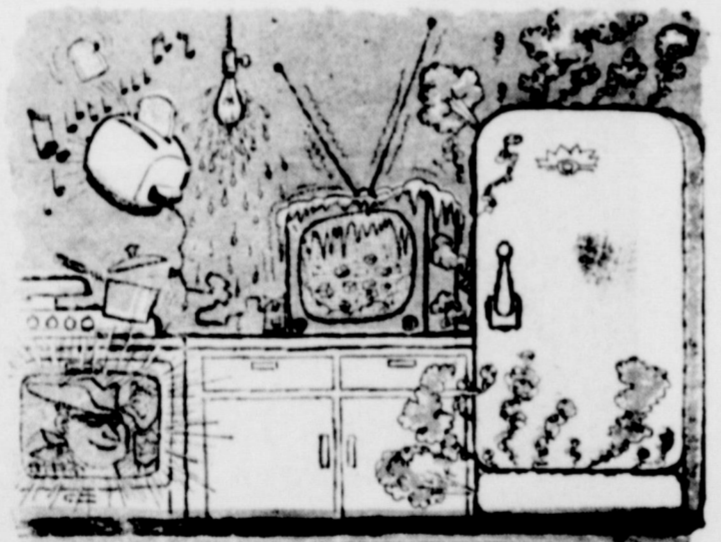


