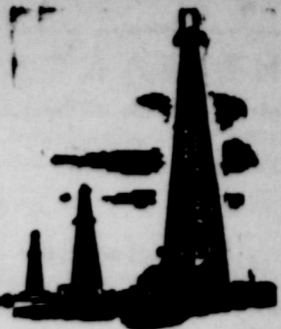

LISTEN TO LUKE

We received slightly disheartening news this week of the postponement of the hearing of oral arguments for the granting of the certificate for the construction of a pipeline from the Brown-Bassett Field. That postponement was for only eight days but we were eagerly anticipating the outcome of the meeting of the Federal Power Commission that was slated originally for Tuesday.

We will be happy now to wait a few more days for the news, or possibly longer.

Our hat's off to Rep. J. T. Rutherford for being on the ball so many things at once. He is one of the postponement of the FPC hearing Tuesday morning when he must have been busy at other things, too.

We appreciate the help that we got from him and appreciate his remembering us and our interests in bringing news to the people of this area.

Your attention is called to the story about the school bond issue coming up July 25. The story printed in this week's Times is the election.

There is little time remaining for us to give as many details of the issue as we would like to give. There will have to be some research done individually by the people who like such details.

We are often called upon to go into all the minute details of a thing, which we don't do, but we don't want to be responsible for doing all the talking around for all the readers, school patrons, tax payers and what-not.

We have tried in last week's issue, and this week's story, and will have one other opportunity at week to go into as many details as we deem advisable, necessary and possible of all the particulars of the bond issue.

The articulate and most discriminating person will have to find for himself the size of the classrooms, the size of the rest rooms, the size of the electric lines, the size of the lots, etc., included in the plans of the school building.

Whether can we pass judgment whether or not the prices given for the building are too high or too low. We have not been in the habit of making such costs and knowing the fair costs of such construction.

We have to have some faith in the people who are duly elected to office after our best interest in the building proposed is any like the high school building in wearability, then probably cost per square foot might be high, but if the value received for the dollar spent is in comparison with the cost and durability of the high school building, then it is cheap.

We think that there is a ceiling on what the taxpayers can do should be expected to do — we think that if there is to be a new school building, it should be as good a building as we can afford to have built.

We can afford to have a well-built building easier than we can afford to rebuild one in another ten years.

Personally, we think that the school board has done a good job in getting together the information and plans for their expansion and improvement program.

Believing that the school system is one of the most important of community life and being that we do need improved and expanded facilities, we are going to go along with the school board on the proposal.

Your News To The Times

Pipeline Hearing Put Off To July 23 By FPC

The hearing of oral arguments before the Federal Power Commission on the certificate on the Trans-Western Pipeline Co.'s petition for the granting of permission to construct a pipeline, has been postponed until July 23, according to information received by The Times Tuesday.

The information came by wire from Rep. J. T. Rutherford of Washington, D.C., representative

from the 16th Congressional District of Texas.

Previously Tuesday of this week had been set as the date for the oral arguments to be heard.

The Times received word last week that virtual assurance of the granting of the certificate by the Commission was possible and probable because of the recommendation for approval by the chairman of the hearing.

A great economic factor is involved as far as Terrell County is concerned in the pending action by the Commission is concerned and local citizens, those who have direct financial interests in that section of the county the pipeline owners, and the county and school district are directly involved.

It is felt that with the pipeline's providing an outlet for the gas that can now be produced in the Brown-Bassett Field and with the potential of that area, that there will be increased and renewed activity by the oil companies as soon as the certificate is granted.

Elmo R. Searcy authorized The Times this week to announce his candidacy for the office of sheriff of Terrell County, subject to the action of the Democratic primary next spring.

Searcy served as deputy sheriff under Sheriff Lee Billings for about six months. He had some experience as a law enforcement officer as a military police during WWI.

Searcy has lived in Sanderson since 1949 and stated that he felt he knew the people of the county well and felt qualified, willing and able to serve as sheriff if elected.

He stated that he was announcing for the race early so that the people of the county would all have an opportunity to ascertain his qualifications for the job and so that he could talk to all voters as a candidate for the office between now and primary time.

Searcy authorized two promises for publication — that he would stay on the job and devote as much time as was necessary to fulfill the duties of the office, and he would enforce the law to the letter as far as was possible for him to do, with malice toward none and equality in law enforcement toward everyone.

County Ranchers Get \$367,819.55 In Incentive Payments

Terrell County ranchmen received a total of \$367,819.55 in incentive payments, according to F. M. Wood, Jr., officer manager for the local ASC office.

The payments were for the 1958 marketing year which ended March 30, 1958. The figure was the result of a 70.3 per cent incentive payment rate on shorn wool and \$1.02 per cwt on unshorn lambs sold during the same marketing year.

Of the total figure, \$331,322.44 was the net total paid to Terrell County ranchers on the wool incentive payment. There were 1,716,922 pounds of wool which received a gross total of \$490,994.89 from which \$12,082.76 was deducted for wool promotion.

In the lamb incentive payment to county ranchmen, there were 3,763,783 pounds of unshorn lambs sold, from which proceeds \$1,881.22 was deducted for wool promotion, so that a net payment of \$36,497.11 was received by the county ranchmen.

It was pointed out that the national wool price for the last marketing year was 36.4 cents per pound — the lowest since 1941 — and 17.3 cents per pound less than the 53.7 cents average for the 1957 marketing year.

The incentive wool price level for last year was 62 cents per pound — a price guaranteed to the producers under the National Wool Act of 1954.

If the national average of wool sold had reached 62c or more, no incentive payments would have been made to the producers.

School Bond Election Called For July 25

The Board of the Terrell County Independent School District in a special meeting Monday night, called an election for a bond issue on July 25, 1959. The bond issue is for \$360,000.00.

According to the call for the election, voting will be in all four precincts from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. on that date and all qualified voters owning taxable property and rendering same for taxation may vote in the election.

Election officials for each of the four precincts were appointed by the board as follows:

Precinct 1, Troy Druse, Mrs. G. E. Babb, Mrs. A. H. Zuberbueher and Mrs. W. E. Grigsby.
Precinct 2, Mrs. Roy Deaton, Jim Powers, Mrs. Alice Ross and Mrs. Noel James.

Precinct 3, Mrs. Sid Harkins, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Jessup, David Mitchell.

Precinct 4, Mrs. Charlie Turk, Lin Hicks, Charles Everett and Mrs. Willie Banner.

The board called the election after receiving a petition from the required number of voters for the election for the issuance of bonds.

The call for the election gives a table showing the retirement of the bonds, sets the maximum interest rate allowed and also sets the amount of the bonds to be issued.

According to Supt. Bader, the \$360,000 will be spent to construct a new elementary building to house grades two through five. The building will have 20,428 square feet of floor space, twelve class rooms, principal's office, teachers' lounge, all-purpose room, janitor's supply room, boiler room and rest rooms and is estimated to cost approximately \$260,000.00 by the architect.

The shop building is estimated to cost approximately \$22,000 by the architect.

The balance of the bond issue is to pay for equipment, furniture for the new buildings, site cost and work, repairs to existing facilities, architects and fiscal agent's fees, and a contingency fund.

It has been pointed out that the plans and specifications for the new elementary building are on display several places in town and most of the board members have architect's drawings of the plans. They also have details of all phases of the bond issue and all associated plans.

Commissioner Warns Local Residents Of Possible Cessation of Trash Hauling

Frank M. Weigand, Commissioner of Precinct 1, issued a warning to the residents of Sanderson this week that unless there is some plan devised soon, there possibly will be a cessation in the present system of hauling trash from local residences and business houses.

Weigand stated that there was no fund set up in the county government for trash hauling and the practice had been carried on over the years only as a courtesy to local residents.

He added that recent increases in the number of residents, the higher cost of labor, vehicle operation, and other expenses, had caused the precinct funds to go further and further in the hole. Money from other precincts had subsidized the program up to now. Mr. Weigand said, but the burden could go no further without local residents helping to pay for the service.

Supt. Bader stated that: "Based on the present estimated valuation of \$6,676,360.00 for the school district, the tax rate for the coming year will be approximately \$1.90 or \$1.91 per \$100.00 valuation or would not exceed an increase of 8c per \$100.00 valuation over the tax rate of \$1.83 per \$100 that was in effect last year. The proposed tax rate would be in effect pending acceptance of the bond issue and the proposed rate increase will take care of all local maintenance costs, and retirement of all old and new bonds."

It was pointed out that absentee voting on the issue will begin Friday, or as soon as the ballots are in the hands of the county clerk, and will continue through Tuesday of next week.
