Water Utility Title Transfer Completed Here Thursday

All preliminaries are complete for the transfer of the ownership of the local water utility from the Community Public Service Co. to the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, according to Greene Cooke, chairman of the board.

Transfer of the ownership is expected to be this week-end and could be before area readers get this news.

The closing of the transaction is the culmination of the efforts of several citizens who have been interested in the deal and who have worked for this end.

Representatives of the Community Public Service Co. will be here to receive the check for approximately \$168,000.00 to turn over the deed to the properties connected with the water utility to the local water board.

Jimmy Caroline, local manager of CPS and also manager for the water utility for the water district, stated that there would be some details worked out and the local consumers would be informed of the manner of getting security deposits for the water district. He said that many local water users had a security deposit with the CPS and they would be refunded that deposit which could be applied to the deposit required by the water district.

School Bond Approved By Large Margin Sat.

Terrell County voters approved the \$360,000.00 school bond issue by a three-to-one margin Saturday in a county-wide vote.

The bond issue was for construction and improvement of existing facilities and purchase of land for building sites. The fee for architects, and fiscal agents was also included in the bond issue.

In precinct 1 there were 129 votes for and 27 against the bond issue. In precinct 2, Dryden, 19 voted for and 14 against. In precinct 3, Harkins, eight voted for and two against. At the Independence road camp, precinct 4, three voted for and none against.

The total for was 150 votes and there were 43 against.

The school board plans to expedite the completion of plans for the construction and preliminary phases so that construction can begin in late October if at all possible, thus giving a greater probability for the completion of the school building for the 1960-61 term.

The main expenditure of the bond issue will be for the construction of an elementary building to house grades two through five. The building will be in the

north part of Sanderson on the block north of Kerr St. and between Fourth and Fifth Streets.

Other plans for the money from the sale of the bonds is for the purchase of the building site for the new elementary school, grading and leveling of the site, purchase of additional land for use by the local school system; improvements on the first grade building and repairs to the elementary and high school building; and construction and equipping of an industrial arts building

There will be a Bible school next week at the First Baptist Church sponsored by the Latin-American Methodist Church and the First Baptist Church, according to Rev. Noe Montez, pastor of "El Buen Pastor" Methodist Church.

The school will be from 8:30 to 1:30 a.m. daily Monday through Friday, with a picnic to follow the services Friday morning and Commencement services Friday night at 8 o'clock.

Rev. Montez said that the purpose of the vacation school is to furnish an opportunity for the children to worship and learn and enjoy handwork, recreation and refreshments together.

Besides Rev. Montez and Rev. Irl Richardson, pastor of the First Baptist Church, there will be two home missionaries working with the school, also workers from the two churches.

Children from five to 12 years of age are invited and urged to participate in the school, Rev. Montez stated.

Well, my friend, you're not alone. Seems like most everybody feels that way — including many members of the House and Senate.

New Buildings

While the Senate and House are busy trying to find a way to finance the state's future operations, governmental buildings still are being erected around the Capitol. In fact, they are beginning to dwarf the major edifice.

Occupancy of the first of these buildings to be completed has just been made by the Texas Employment Commission. Its six hundred employees now are housed in the \$2,400,000 structure.

A total of 11,000 pieces of office equipment were moved out of eleven downtown Austin locations into the new six-story edifice.

TEC began some 24 years ago with a staff of 25 employees in the state headquarters and 50 local offices. Now employed are 2,300 persons with 93 local officers throughout the state.

Governor Signs Bills
A bill extending the time for removal of the offices of the State Board of Insurance from the International Life Building in Austin has been signed by Gov. Price Daniel.

The Commission rents some 13 floors of the building. However, the rent is paid by the various insurance companies in Texas.

Earlier passage of the bill was secured calling for the removal

of the Insurance Commission from that building and for the construction of its own office headquarters. Work has not yet begun on the new building.

Other bills signed by Gov. Daniels include one authorizing certain water districts to waive immunity from liability for negligence of its agents; two bills dealing with hunting and fishing; and a bill relating to monies appropriated to the State Board of Barber Examiners. One would authorize the Game and Fish Commission to allow fishing and hunting of migratory waterfowl on lakes and rivers located upon a common boundary with other states.

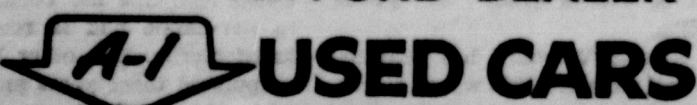

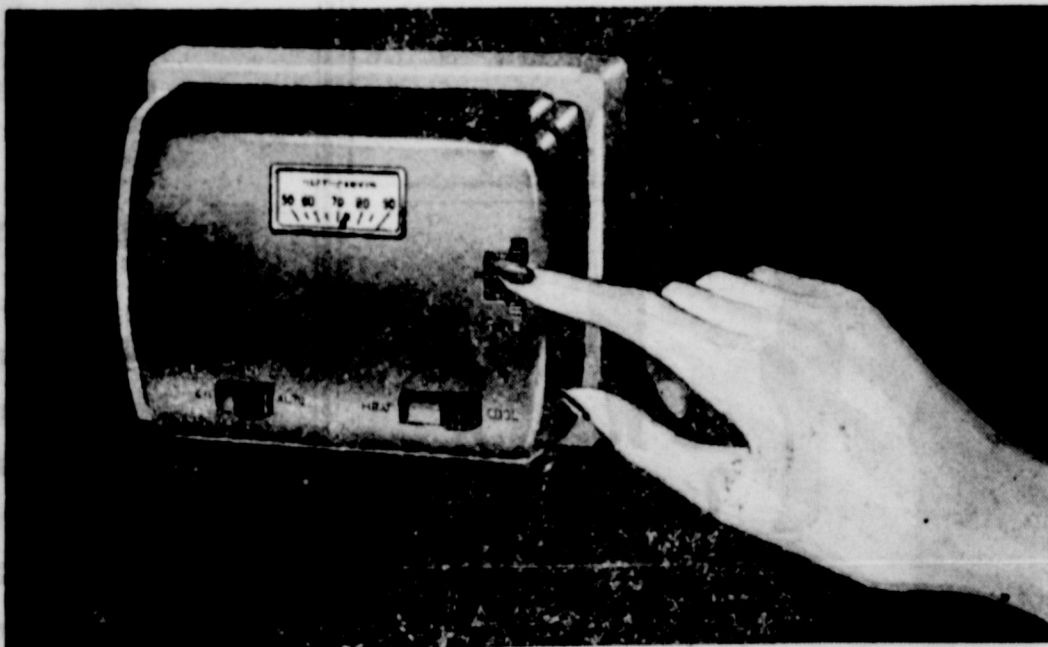

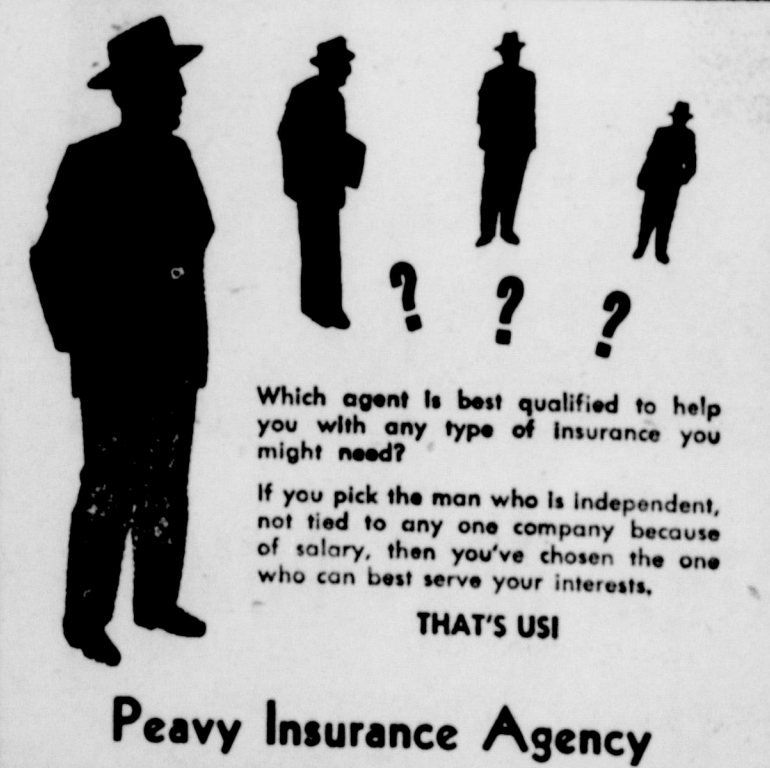
